ABOUT AMELIA ISLAND

The southernmost jewel in the Sea Island chain, Amelia Island beckons with 13 miles of uninterrupted, pristine Atlantic beach, arrayed with the lush natural beauty of giant oak trees draped in Spanish moss that highlight the maritime forest canopy.

Just over 18 square miles (the size and shape of Manhattan) it is the only place in America that has lived under the dominion of eight different flags. Along the way, this barrier island has drawn lively characters including adventurers, pirates, princesses, robber barons,

and artists of all varieties. When you visit, you'll understand why this small island has exerted such a powerful pull throughout the centuries.

The island is home to Civil Warera Fort Clinch, the refuge from segregation that is American Beach, and to a 50-block National Historic District that is a thriving neighborhood rich with eclectic shops and restaurants. The modern shrimping industry began here, and shrimpers still ply these waters. To taste the difference, ask for wild-caught shrimp, available at many Amelia Island restaurants and grocery stores.

Amelia Island accommodations include luxury resorts, charming B&Bs, welcoming hotels, a variety of vacation rentals and even campsites. World-class golf, spas, and restaurants stand at the ready. It's easy to create a trip for any interest. Whether you're looking for a family vacation, a romantic getaway, an unforgettable wedding, or just the chance to reconnect on the beach or under

the live oaks, you'll return with great stories. (And do keep your eyes open for the wild residents: dolphins, sea turtles, egrets, deer, manatees, and more.)

Throughout the seasons, the island is alive with theatre, dance, openair art walks, and its acclaimed Chamber Music Festival. Among the events that draw international crowds include the Amelia Concours d'Elegance vintage car show and week of auctions, Pétanque Amelia Island Open, the legendary Isle of 8 Flags Shrimp Festival, and Dickens on Centre.

Amelia Island is located thirty minutes from JAX International Airport, ninety minutes north of historic St. Augustine, two hours south of Savannah, three hours from Orlando, and four hours from Charleston.

With a culture of hospitality, Amelia Islanders love welcoming travelers and sharing in their enjoyment of the special place they call home. See for yourself, and, just like the sea turtles who hatch here on summer nights, you'll find yourself drawn back to this enchanted island.

BEACHES NATURE

Amelia Island's shores have long been a source of beauty, enjoyment and wonder, and unlike many Florida beaches, Amelia Island offers virtually unlimited access to its coast. Visitors will experience an unparalleled sense of calm and peace as they stroll along the 13 miles of pristine quartz sand. And Amelia Island's entire length along the Atlantic Coast is open for running, walking, or just relaxing and enjoying.

FIVE FAVORITE BEACH SPOTS



Amelia Island State Park

Set at the southernmost end of Amelia, a secluded spot for fishing, strolling and birdwatching. During winter, look for the endangered right whale.

American Beach

Founded as an African-American beach community during the time of segregation, history lives on this beckoning beach. Look for the sand dune NaNa.

Fort Clinch State Park

Beach looks across to Cumberland Island. Accessible via state park and has bathhouse. A favorite for shark tooth hunting.

Main Beach Park

Playgrounds, picnic areas and putt-putt frame this family favorite. Skate park and restaurant nearby, site of special events throughout the year.

Peters Point

Popular beach spot with large parking lot, bath house, and covered picnic areas. Limited beach driving. Departure point for horseback riding tours.



ISLAND TREASURES

Find treasure that doubles as a souvenir during your visit. The hunt for shark teeth on the shores of Amelia Island is a fun year-round beach activity. You may find the teeth of a great white shark, hammerhead shark, lemon shark, and other species. Search along the high or low-tide line for best selection. Should you come away with empty pockets, it's still a beautiful walk (and you can definitely find shark teeth at downtown Fernandina Beach stores including Hunt's Arts and Artifacts and the Ship's Lantern).



GREAT WHITE SHARK

From the mackerel shark family. The extant white shark has been recorded up to 36 feet in length. The huge and heavy teeth of the fossil C megalodon have serrations on both edges and are triangular in shape.



SAND SHARK

With broad, tripod-like bases, this species' distinctively shaped teeth are similar to those of the porbeagle shark.



HAMMERHEAD SHARK

These sharks are late developments, possibly from carcharhinid stock. Sphyrna mokarran is the only hammerhead shark with serrated teeth.



LEMON SHARK

Teeth of this species of sharks are distinguished by the combination of a long, smooth-edged cusp and, in the upper teeth, a wavy-edged base.



BULL SHARK

The bull shark is the only shark found frequently living in fresh water. It also is common in shallow marine situations such as bays and river mouths.



HEXANCHUS "THE COW" SHARK

These teeth are rare fossil finds. They are easy to distinguish, as they are composed of stairstepped cusps unlike those of other sharks.

ENJOYING THE BEACH

Made up of 13 miles of seashore lines with 40-foot sea oat dappled dunes, Amelia Island is a beach lover's dream. Shelling and hunting for shark teeth are time honored diversions, and the mild climate allows for relaxing beach walks (and horseback riding) on the beach year-round.

The beaches are easy to reach via numerous clearly-marked public access points, many of which offer free parking. The Parks and Recreation Department has three beach wheelchairs available for reservations at the Atlantic Recreation Center. (Call 904-310-3350 for availability and reservations.)

For the protection of wildlife and the enjoyment of visitors, all beaches have a firm leave it and lose it policy. When leaving the beach, please double check to ensure that you haven't left anything behind. Items left on the beach overnight will be removed and discarded.

Lastly, be sure to review the posted informational signs as you enter the beach.

SWIM SAFELY

There's nothing quite like a refreshing swim along Amelia Island's Atlantic coast. Lifeguards are stationed along three main areas of beaches between Memorial Day and Labor Day. The towers are staffed during daytime hours, weather permitting. To ensure a safe and enjoyable day in the water, be sure to know your flags:



Red and yellow flags indicate the area is patrolled by lifeguards. These are the safe areas to swim.



The red flag indicates danger. NEVER enter the water when the red flag is flying, under any circumstances.



Black and white checkered flags indicate an area zoned by lifeguards for use of watercraft such as surfboards and kayaks. NEVER swim or bodyboard in these areas.



The orange windsock indicates offshore wind conditions. NEVER use an inflatable when the sock is flying.



BE SEA TURTLE SAVVY

Did you know that about 90 percent of sea turtle nesting in the U.S. takes place in Florida? Amelia Island is one of the idyllic spots where the ancient rituals of nesting and hatching unfold. Here's what you need to know to enjoy this unique time on the beach while helping to protect these threatened and endangered animals.

DIM THE LIGHTS

During nesting season, sea turtles use the light of the moon to navigate in and out of the ocean, so it's important you take a few simple precautions to keep their path true. Turn off beach-facing exterior lights, close drapes and blinds, and walk by moonlight or use a flashlight with a turtle-friendly red filter.

FILL THE HOLES

Once your day of sandcastle building is complete, be sure to fill in all holes to prevent a sea turtle or her hatchlings from getting stuck or injured.

PACK IT UP

It's hard for a 200 pound turtle to pull herself onto the shore, so make sure to pick up all your beach-going supplies and trash. Even small items can be a big obstacle for a hatchling.

SEE FOR YOURSELF

Once you've done your part to protect these majestic creatures, experience them firsthand by attending a permitted nest excavation or sea turtle release. If you happen upon a hatching, leave the hatchling to emerge and crawl on its own. Enjoy the experience and remember it always. Sea turtles that survive to adulthood go on far-ranging migrations over many years - but they always return to the exact beach where they were born to lay their own eggs.





EXPERIENCE NATURE

On The Trails

Maritime hammocks, with large Spanish moss-draped live oaks, adorn Amelia Island and are prevalent at Fort Clinch State Park, Amelia Island State Park, and Egan's Creek Greenway. These provide refuge to wildlife including gopher tortoises, deer, raccoons, bobcats and many species of birds and reptiles, including the American alligator and the painted buntings prized by bird watchers.

Fort Clinch Park's Willow Pond Trail winds around a series of freshwater ponds that offer prime habitat for alligators and turtles. Guided tours with park rangers are available on a regular basis. Egan's Creek Marsh borders the west boundary of the park, providing a saltwater estuary for an abundance of marine life. The salt marsh offers scenic vistas and views of many species of wading birds while the beaches provide colonial shorebirds and sea turtles a critical habitat.



The maritime forest ecosystem not only gives Amelia Island its unique, lush beauty; the roots of the live oak, laurel oak, southern magnolia and pine trees also serve as anchors for this harrier island.





NATURAL WONDERS ITINERARY

- Enjoy the water, your way, by renting a boat or jet ski from ABC Boat Club & Rentals.

 Travel to Cumberland to see the wild horses, put together a fishing trip, or hop on a jet ski to get a different, more adventurous perspective. Available with or without a captain.
- Enjoy the Amelia River under the expertise of a guide. Take an Eco-Tour or sunset cruise with Amelia River Cruises or cruise the backwater with George's Jet Ski Adventures on a two person catamaran.
- (stand-up paddleboard) tour of the marsh, sound and surrounding waters. Both are an excellent way to view egrets, herons, osprey, hawks, and even the majestic Peregrine falcon. Amelia Island Stand Up Paddle Surf Company, Amelia Adventure and Kayak, and Amelia Island Kayak Excursions all have guided and independent tour options.
- Bike the Amelia Island Trail, running from Peters Point
 Beachfront Park to Amelia
 Island State Park in the city of Fernandina Beach. Much of the paved, tree-lined route parallels Highway A1A, a scenic byway, and the trail is part of the East Coast Greenway, a growing trail network stretching from Florida to Maine.

- Camp. Put your tent down at Fort Clinch State Park. Join a guided nature walk around Willow Pond trail, which winds through a coastal maritime hammock down to freshwater ponds.
- Get Romanced by the Canopy.

 Amelia Island's live oaks have lived under many of its 8 flags. In fact, a big part of what makes Amelia Island so beautiful and what literally helps preserve it are the lush trees that comprise the maritime forest canopy, which tempers the effects of wind and water on the island's dunes and beaches. Amelia Tree Conservancy provides a self-guided Treasured Trees tour at AmeliaTreeConservancy.org.
- Explore the South end of Amelia island on a guided Segway tour from Amelia's Wheels, located at the Omni Amelia Island Plantation. Tours highlight the vast beauty of the island, from beach paths, the water's edge and trails through a variety of parks on the property.
- Go Wild. The Wild Amelia
 Nature Festival is fun for the
 entire family, with a free expo,
 events, and nature tours, all
 designed to showcase and
 educate participants about
 the local flora and fauna. The
 festival includes eco-tours by
 foot, bike, boat, golf cart and
 Segway some for kids only.



- Amelia Island once consisted of large plantations, famous for their luxurious cotton. To see an authentic example, head to nearby Kingsley Plantation. This ecohistoric site retains many original structures, handmade from oyster shells; a history garden with indigo and sea island cotton. Tours for all ages can be arranged from EcoMotion Tours and Kayak Amelia.
- See the Island by Air. Both Florida Adventure Sports and Air Amelia offer hang gliding tours of the island, giving guests a bird's eye view of all 13 miles of Amelia Island. If you're feeling even more daring, try Skydive Amelia Island.
- Explore the Greenway. Egan's Creek Greenway consists of more than 300 acres of protected, sensitive lands between Atlantic Avenue and Sadler Road, near the center of the island. Enjoy birdwatching, hiking, biking, and wildlife viewing along two trails within the park. Near the trails, the Residence Inn Amelia Island offers bike rentals.
- Sprawling White Oak is a conservation facility devoted to the care and preservation of imperiled species. 27 species call White Oak home, including rhino, giraffe, okapi and cheetah.

HISTORY &CULTURE

It's easy to dig deep into Amelia Island's past, thanks to a treasure trove of history, heritage, and attractions.

When Frenchman Jean Ribault raised the first flag in 1562, Native American people associated with the Timucua language had been living on the island for centuries. From the Spanish and French explorers, to the lawless spirit of pirates to the dignified air of Victorian-era socialites, Amelia Island has been home to a range of colorful characters whose stories enliven its long history.

Amelia Island's modern history can be traced back to two major turning points. The first, thanks to one David Levy Yulee, was the establishment of an important railhead on the island. The second, nearly a century later, was due to the discovery of innovations that revolutionized commercial shrimping. Both industries have left an indelible mark on the region and contributed to the tapestry that is Amelia Island.





Discover Amelia Island's Rich History:



Amelia Island Museum of History

Housed in the former county jail, the Museum showcases more than 4,000 years of island history. Highlights include the story of the Timucuan Indians, the glamour of the Golden Age, the beginnings of the modern shrimping industry, and the interactive S.S. Margery pirate ship exhibit. Tours are available for a variety of interests and age levels. AmeliaMuseum.org



American Beach Museum

American Beach was founded in 1935 by Afro American Insurance Company President A. L. Lewis for "recreation and relaxation without humiliation" during the era of Jim Crow. In its heyday, American Beach drew luminaries from art, music and sports, and generations of families continue

to enjoy it. The Museum tells the story of this place and that of one of its most spirited advocates, MaVynee Oshun Betsch, the great-granddaughter of A. L. Lewis known as "The Beach Lady." AmericanBeachMuseum.org



Marina Welcome Center and Shrimping Museum

Housed on the harborfront, this exhibit space highlights the local shrimpers, boat builders, and innovators who made shrimping the main industry of Amelia Island in the 20th century.



Maritime Museum of Amelia Island

Specializing in maritime and military history, pirates and Spanish treasure fleets, the Maritime Museum exhibits Spanish treasure, US Navy memorabilia and weaponry among other maritime artifacts. Personal guided tours are available. MaritimeMuseumAI.org



Fernandina Beach

Found on the northern half of Amelia Island, the city of Fernandina Beach has been honored by the National Trust for its historic preservation and 50-block Historic District. Discover the city, popularly described as a "tropical Mayberry," on a variety of themed tours offered by the Amelia Island Museum of History, Amelia

Island Tasting Tours and the Amelia Island Culinary Academy.



Fort Clinch

Visit historic Fort Clinch State Park and step back to the year 1864, as soldiers reenact life during the Civil War. Explore the many rooms, galleries and grounds of the fort as you learn how the soldiers worked and lived each day. Today, park staff provide living history

interpretations of the life of a Union soldier, a 1st New York Volunteer Engineer, who garrisoned the fort during the Civil War. The fort is open 365 days a year from 9am-5pm.



Historic Old Town

The original location of the Town of Fernandina, Old Town was the last Spanish city platted in the Western Hemisphere, in 1811. Lying north of the Fernandina Beach Historic District, Old Town is accessible from 14th Street. Fort Carlos once stood on the spot that is now open green space (and a very small state park.) The

iconic Captain's House was used in the movie "The New Adventures of Pippi Longstocking."





DAVID LEVY YULEE



The gentleman outside the Welcome Center is David Levy Yulee, who played a vital role in the story of nineteenth century Florida and Amelia Island. Yulee helped write the original Florida State Constitution and became the first Jewish Senator appointed to the United States Congress.

In 1853, Yulee chose Fernandina Beach's harbor as the beginning point of the first trans-peninsular railroad in Florida, allowing trade to reach the Gulf of Mexico and creating a worldwide network. In March of 1861, the first train arrived in Cedar Key. Following the Confederate surrender, Yulee was imprisoned at Fort Pulaski but released 10 months later thanks to the intercession of General Ulysses S. Grant. Yulee died in 1886. In 2000, the State of Florida designated Yulee a Great Floridian.

The sculpture of Yulee outside the Welcome Center is a work by Susan Leury, whose pieces include the "Babe's Dream" statue at Oriole Park at Camden Yard in Baltimore and "Promethean Radiation," which was presented to Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer upon their marriage. When you visit, take a seat beside Mr. Yulee (and possibly a photo), and see if you can discover the map he devised to lay out the City of Fernandina Beach as it is today. EIGHT FLAGS, 1,000 STORIES

Amelia Island is the only place in America where eight different flags have flown. Explore this colorful history (and impress people by being able to name all eight in order).

FRENCH FLAG 1562-1564



French Huguenots led by explorer Jean Ribault were the first Europeans to arrive. They established a shortlived settlement at the mouth of the St. Johns River near what is now Jacksonville. The flag representing this period is called the Blue Capetian Banner.

SPANISH FLAG 1565-1763 AND 1783-1821



Marked with an x-shaped cross to symbolize the rough branches of the tree on which Saint André was crucified, the Burgundian Saltire represented Spanish rule in Florida. The island was mostly notable for its missions in the first period, and, in the second, became a thriving center for trade (and smuggling).

BRITISH FLAG 1763-1783



James Oglethorpe scouted the area and named the island in honor of Princess Amelia, the daughter of King George II. The red Cross of St. George, the patron saint of England, combines with the white Scottish Cross of St. Andrew to form the Union Flag.

PATRIOTS FLAG 1812



With secret U.S. blessings, the "Patriots of Amelia Island" overthrew the Spanish and hoisted their own flag on March 17th. They replaced it with the U.S. flag the next day, but Spain demanded the island's return. The Latin "Salus populi lex suprema" means "The well-being of the people is the supreme law."



GREEN CROSS FLAG

1817



The Scottish adventurer Sir Gregor MacGregor led a small band of men to capture the island from its Spanish defenders on June 29th, raising the Green Cross of Florida flag without firing a shot. Four months later, they were forced to leave.

MEXICAN REVOLUTIONARY FLAG 1817



As MacGregor ran out of money for men and munitions, he left Amelia under the care of Ruggles Hubbard and Jared Irwin, who joined with the pirate Luis Aury to raise the Mexican rebel flag. U.S. Troops occupied the island in December and held it "in trust for Spain."

NATIONAL FLAG OF THE CONFEDERACY 1861-1862



Confederates took over Fort Clinch in April 1861, but federal troops regained it on March 3, 1862 and occupied Fernandina for the duration of the Civil War.

UNITED STATES 1821-PRESENT



Spain ceded Florida to the U.S. in 1821. The prosperity of the late 1800s prompted a building boom including two elegant hotels attracting well-heeled visitors such as the Vanderbilts, DuPonts, and Carnegies. Early in the 20th century, the modern shrimping industry was founded here.

To learn more, take the fascinating one-hour "Eight Flags Tour" held twice a day at the Amelia Island Museum of History. Included free with admission to the museum, the tour provides an in-depth, insider's view of the museum's popular Eight Flags Gallery.





GOLF

GOLF

Think of it as a 42 million square mile water hazard.

Starting with a stunning canvas, fabled golf names like Pete Dye and Bobby Weed put their design skills to work on Amelia Island's links, making the island synonymous with great golf. With 117 holes, including seven that play along the Atlantic Ocean, how could it not be? Check AmeliaIsland.com for golf packages offered by Amelia Island, with accommodations ranging from B&Bs to resorts to oceanside hotels.

Fernandina Beach Golf Club

features 27 holes of public golf. Each of the three nine-hole layouts measure more than 3,000 yards from the championship tees, with generous fairways, lots of native foliage, and impeccable greens. The club has a driving range, practice putting green, a stacked pro shop, plus a clubhouse with food and a full bar.

The Omni Amelia Island Plantation features Long Point, Oak Marsh and Ocean Links. Oak Marsh is classic Pete Dye, with tight fairways, bulkheads and seemingly tiny greens that make full use of meandering creeks and marshland. Bobby Weed's awe-inspiring Ocean Links is a water lover's dream layout, thanks to holes running through marshland,

around Red Maple Lake, and even along the Atlantic Ocean. Long Point features Tom Fazio at his best in three distinct environments—marshes, thick forests and stunning ocean dunes—all with Fazio touches like big waste bunkers and huge undulating greens.

Located on-property at The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island, The Golf Club of Amelia Island features an attractive layout designed by Mark McCumber and Gene Littler. Winding through the woods with the Atlantic nearby, this course is challenging but forgiving—provided you are lucky enough to avoid the water that comes into play on 13 of its holes.

Amelia River Golf Club is a Tom Jackson-designed course. Jackson took full advantage of the natural landscape, utilizing both water and land. It's a challenging and fair layout for players of all levels. The Club offers public play on its 18 holes of Tom Jackson-designed golf inspiration. The course features TifEagle greens in a natural setting lined with ancient live oak trees.



UP YOUR GAME

Golf lessons and the level of golf instruction on Amelia Island are some of the best in the United States. The Academy at the Golf Club of Amelia Island can help shave strokes off your score with the guidance of David DeMay's staff of teaching professionals. Lessons are individualized and The Academy offers individual private lessons, semi-private lessons (2 people), clinics (minimum 3-5 people), and lesson packages.

Mike Block, Director of Golf at Omni Amelia Island Plantation, is a PGA Certified 2 star golf professional and a PGTAA Master

teacher professional. Mike and the Omni Amelia Island Plantation Golf Academy are located at the Amelia Links Pro Shop, Monday through Sunday.

sculpted around a forest of majestic live oaks, sabal palms, pines and wax myrtles. This par 72 track, designed by Tom Jackson, plays to a yardage of 6,860 from the back tees. Its pristine shape features well-manicured rolling fairways, smooth bunkers, and greens that challenge all skill levels. Fairways on several holes are wide and open, giving the golfer a sense of a traditional Scottish links course. The signature 17th hole is a par three surrounded by water, while the 18th hole overlooks the Amelia River's expansive tidal marsh.



- Take a cooking class with former Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island head chef Bill Thompson at Amelia Island Culinary Academy.

GONE FISHING

For the biggest fish, head offshore. Legendary fishing charters including AC Charters, Amelia Angler, Angler's Mark, Amelia Island Charter Boat Association, and Ye Olde Pirate make it easy to catch huge black drum, redfish, tarpon, shark, amberjack, and snapper.
