

“The End of the Story”

Let me share with you three true stories. The first is a mother’s story - Mary. Like most young girls, she had dreamed about her future. She and a young man loved each other and plans had been made to be married, but this all changed when an angel appeared to her and she was terrified. He was the angel Gabriel. The news he brought would change her life forever (Luke 1:26-37). “How can this pregnancy be?” Mary was confused. How would you react to such a word from an angel? How would others ever believe a story about a visit from an angel and that the Holy Spirit would be the dad and a child that was to be the Son of God? Probably more than a few of us would ask: “Are you sure about this? Do you really want me? How about finding someone else? I have other plans for my life.”

But here is what Mary simply says, “I am the Lord’s servant. May it be to me as you have said” (Luke 1:38). Mary didn’t understand, but she obeyed. She bends her will to that of the Father. Mary would live up to these words for the rest of her life. Mary didn’t understand everything, but she listened to Jesus and obeyed. And then came that fateful day when she had to watch her son go through a mock trial, severe beatings, and death by crucifixion. The words, “Lord, let it be as you will” must have been extremely difficult to utter.

The next story is that of a son – Jesus. We pick up the story with Jesus being in a garden, an olive grove of trees on a hill called the Mount of Olives that overlooks the Temple Mount. Jesus was not surprised by the events unfolding before him. He told his disciples about his impending arrest and death, but they didn’t understand. They were more concerned about positioning themselves for seats of honor in Jesus’ coming kingdom. Jesus was deep in prayer a stone’s throw away from his snoozing disciples. Jesus knew what lay ahead, what he must do, and the cost of obedience. Jesus knew the Father’s will, but he also knew God had the power to take the cup of suffering away if possible.

Jesus prayed fervently until his sweat became blood (Luke 22:41-44). The answer came back. Jesus must drink from the cup of suffering. The response of Jesus to God: “Not my will but yours be done.”

The last story involves a man – Saul. He was determined to wipe out the followers of a false messiah named Jesus. Something must be done to silence these so-called apostles who were spreading lies that their master had been raised from the dead. Saul set out for a city to persecute the followers of this new sect full of religious zeal. All of a sudden something happened that would change his life forever (Acts 9; 26:12-20). Fighting against God’s will is like running into a cattle prod. Saul went on to do God’s will for the rest of his life.

What do the stories of Mary, Jesus, and Saul have to do with us? Much since the chief purpose in life is to figure out our own story. The writer of Ecclesiastes has been asking the important questions: Why are we here? What is our purpose? What will make us happy? What makes our lives worthwhile? There is only one correct answer: “Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of man” (Ecclesiastes 12:13). The meaning of our story is not found in the story itself; it is found in the author. We fear and obey God so that at the end of the story, we see him as he truly is.
