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s it Possible?

Scripture reminds us that given what is offered to us on the world stage, a doorkeeper in the house of the Lord is the superior choice (Psalm 84:10). We live in a world of streets, interstate highways, back roads, and alleys. These lead to destinations of various sorts, accomplishments, goals and doors open or closed to us.

Every Sunday we travel familiar paths leading us to the welcoming vista of our beautiful church campus and the open doors of our lovely sanctuary. We are met by greeters who welcome us, ushers who guide us, teachers who instruct us, musicians who prepare us, preachers who admonish us, brothers and sisters who encourage us. We wrestle with hymn books (two, in fact), our Bibles (smart phones for those not technically challenged), the worship folder, the "green" book, our tithe and offering envelope, various response slips, volunteer forms, coats, sweaters, umbrellas, an occasional hearing device, and our children and grandchildren. If someone has "our" seat, it will take several moments to readjust and settle into foreign territory, our new "neighborhood" in the sanctuary: we may need to maneuver to avoid the sun's glare, to see the pulpit, and to secure a good view of "who's who" in the pew.

The music begins, leaders enter, the congregants settle down, latecomers scurry down the aisles and worship begins...or does it? As unthinkable as it is, more than a few have given up on true worship and sadly plod through the sacred gathering as if it were an irrelevant exercise, a wearisome habit, a duty during which "dues" will be paid. However, not to worry. On to this lifeless scene come well–intentioned strategists who promise to help us make worship more relevant, more vibrant, and certainly more painless. Vocations have actually developed, tasked with leading us toward "enhanced worship," "seeker–sensitive paradigms," "infused spiritual expressions," and "street–familiar worship opportunities." (I didn't make these terms up!)

While it is absolutely essential to connect ourselves and others to actual culturally-ingrained responses to Kingdom truth, we must also be aware of the tendency of our flesh to seek gratification and recognition in what is increasingly becoming a needs-oriented rather than a God-focused worshipping community of faith. Platform personalities, performance-based liturgies, worship choreography and self-affirming devotionals are not consistent with Jesus' worship instructions to aspire to honor God "in spirit and in truth" (John 4:23).

A magnificent cathedral with glorious architectural features and powerful organ, a storefront with folding chairs and an out-of-tune piano, a jungle hut with no climate control and handmade musical instruments, an available backyard with accompanying traffic noise, a prison chapel with rustling chains and slamming doors, under a tarp in Iraq amid sounds of battle, a common room in the local hospital, wheelchairs, antiseptic odors and deep pain part of the service...no matter under what circumstances and in what environment, we worship biblically when our minds are fully engaged, our wills are open to the next heavenly directive, and our hearts are deeply woven into the fabric of Christ's character.

When God's people bring these gifts to church, worship, and then service become truly relevant. When genuine mind-will-heart effort is offered to God everything changes. This kind of worship calls us to encounter the greatness of our God, to face our real selves, and reminds us of all our reasons to repent. This kind of worship restrains our self-centeredness and gives us courage to go back into the world as it is.

Independence Day: Our Christian Heritage

The Birth of a Nation

For 230 years, America has been blessed as the longest ongoing Constitutional Republic in the history of the world. These blessings are not accidental, they are blessings of God. This is evident as we look at the turmoil in other nations and contrast that to the stability we see in America. Preserving American liberty depends first upon our understanding of the foundations on which this great country was built, and then it depends on preserving the principles on which it was founded.

On July 2, 1776, Congress voted to approve a complete separation from England. Two days later, the early draft of the Declaration of Independence was signed. Four days later, members of Congress took the document and read it out loud from the steps of Independence Hall, proclaiming it to the city of Philadelphia, and afterwards they rang the Liberty Bell. The inscription on the top of the bell is Leviticus 25:10, which reads "Proclaim liberty throughout the land and to all the

John Adams said, "The general principles on which the Fathers achieved independence were the general principles of Christianity." Probably the clearest identification of the spirit of the American Revolution was given by John in a letter to Abigail the day after Congress approved the Declaration. He wrote her two letters that day: One was short and jubilant that the Declaration had been approved; the other letter was much longer and gave serious consideration to what had been done that day. Adams could already foresee that their actions would be celebrated by future generations.

A Different Holiday

Adams also noted: "This day will be the most memorable epic in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival." He felt the celebration should be in a manner that would commemorate the day as a "day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty." John Adams believed that the Fourth of July should be a religious holiday. The two top holidays celebrated in this country are Christmas and the Fourth of July. According to John Quincy Adams, the two dates are connected. On the Fourth of July, the Founding Fathers simply took the precepts of Christ and His birth (Christmas) and incorporated those principles into civil government.

The Declaration of Independence was the birth certificate for this nation, but the men who signed it knew it could be their death warrant. The closing paragraph states, "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor." The 56 Founding Fathers, 27 of whom were trained as ministers, took their pledge seriously. On the morning of the signing, there was silence and gloom as each man was called up to the table of the President of Congress to sign the document, knowing that it could mean their death by hanging.

Most wars have a motto. The motto of World War II was "Remember Pearl Harbor." The motto during the Texas war for independence was "Remember the Alamo." The spiritual emphasis, directed towards King George III who violated Gods laws, gave rise to a motto during the American Revolution: "No King but King Jesus." The Founding Fathers passed the torch to us. It is our responsibility to not let it go out.

For a short time we gather morning and evening...just specks on eternity's clock. A meditation from Scripture, reading a Christian classic, humming a hymn, offering prayers of confession and repentance, praise and intercession... these are times of worship. These are moments when we allow God's Spirit an opportunity to bathe our hearts and minds with heaven's truth. These are times, corporately and privately, to encounter our Lord and experience holy silence, solitude, and the peaceful reordering of our lives.
