The Pastor's Pen...

_earning from Dummies & Dishonest Managers

"You can learn a lot from a dummy!" So went the punch line from the old seat belt commercials that are seared in the memories of those who saw them. The line sticks. Perhaps the reason why is that it shocks our expectations. Usually you don't seek to learn the more important lessons in life from a dummy. Yet, contrary to expectation, you do learn valuable lessons about vehicle safety and seat belts from a crash dummy, lessons that can save your life.

If the parable Jesus tells in Luke 9:1–13 were to be made into a commercial, perhaps its punch line would be, "You can learn a lot from a dishonest manager!" Usually you don't want to learn the more important lessons about the Christian life from a dishonest manager. Yet, contrary to expectation, Jesus intends for us to learn crucial lessons about long-term future investments from a dishonest manager.

The parable is quite riveting and worth reading for oneself. The short of it is this. A rich man discovers that the man in charge of managing his possessions is guilty of tremendous waste. Thus, he hands the manager a pink slip, informing him that his responsibilities will soon be removed. Surprisingly, rather than coasting the last two weeks of the job, the manager does the unthinkable. He goes around to his master's debtors and strikes amazing deals, cancelling their debts for their one–time payment to his master of a fraction of what they owe. His goal is simple: he wants to have friends to welcome him when he is stripped of everything he manages. To our amazement, Jesus tells us, "The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness" (v. 8a).

Perhaps what is even more amazing—even shocking—is the fact that Jesus intends us to learn positive lessons from this dishonest manager. No, he does not intend for us to follow his actions as a model for managerial business practices. Nor does he intend for us to use the parable as justification for dishonesty in business or any other area of life. Yet, he does intend for us to learn crucial lessons for the Christian life with regard to future investments. We consider just a few of those lessons.

(1) Nothing we have belongs to us. That is a crucial lesson assumed in the parable. Like the dishonest manager, we have nothing that belongs to us. All that we have (time, energy, money, possessions, and relationships) belongs to God, our Master. We are but stewards of what is properly the possession of the Master.

- (2) We have been issued a pink slip. Whether we have 90 years or 90 days to live, in light of eternity, we have but a week or two before the Master removes our managerial responsibilities. Our Lord's brother puts it this way: "What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes" (James 4:14b). Our stewardship of time, energy, money, possessions, and relationships is stripped from us at our last breath, which is rapidly approaching.
- (3) Our management now counts for eternity. The central point of the parable is clear. Like the manager, we are to use the resources that are temporarily under our control (though not properly ours) to prepare for our future. We are to be investing heavily in our long, long-term future—heaven. We are to use the limited resources of time, energy, money, possessions, and relationships we have to "lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven" (Matt. 6:20). As D. A. Carson explains, "The idea is not that we can buy heaven, but that it is unimaginably irresponsible not to plan for our [eternal] home, when even the people of this world know enough to prepare for their future homes." How foolish and shortsighted it would be of us to invest all of our resources—or even the majority of them—in the nanosecond of the here and now, neglecting to invest in the never-ending age to come. The only sensible thing to do is to invest heavily in our long-term future. That is the crucial lesson.

- Pray that they will appropriate all that they have in Christ, being mindful of not wasting time in their work.


Summer Recess
