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

SEVEN PRINCIPLES FOR GOOD RELATIONSHIPS



Here are seven principles which can be used to cultivate and keep relationships healthy and strong. At Christian Fellowship Church, we have discovered that friendships are not held together by sincerity and love alone, but by covenantal agreements. When we agree to walk together according to godly standards and ethics, we find God's favor and truly prove that friends love at all times.

The Forgiveness Principle	
I will choose to walk in forgiveness and not easily take offense against me.	
Scripture: Acts 24:16 - "This being so, I myself always strive to have a conscience without offense toward God	
and men."	
Thought: Can you just forgive and move on?	
Questions for Discussion:	-
What causes people to withhold forgiveness?	
What happens to you mentally, emotionally, and even physically when you hang onto unforgiveness?	
What process or what are the mechanics you use to go from step 1 (unforgiveness) to actual forgiveness?	
How do you handle it when only one side of the offense wants to walk in forgiveness in a given situation?

The Frustration Principle	
When all efforts to apply these principles have failed to the point of frustration, we will commit ourselves to appeal to a higher authority for the sake of the relationship.	
Scripture: Hebrews 13:17 - "Obey those who rule over you and be submissive for they watch out for your souls, as those who must give account. Let them do so with joy and not with grief, for that would be unprofitable for you."	
Thought: Have you followed through with all the other principles?	
Questions for Discussion:	
→ When all the other principles discussed have been tried, how should you approach someone to discuss it with a higher authority?	
➤ What do you do if the other party is unwilling to seek the counsel of those whom you've placed yourself under the authority of?	
Why do people often have difficulty submitting to the direction of those in spiritual authority in their lives and following through with the counsel given?

The First Word Principle	
You will be the first person to hear about any problem I have with you.	
Scripture: Matthew 18:15 - "Moreover if your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he hears you, you have gained your	
brother."	
Thought: Have you spoken to anyone else about this offense?	
Questions for Discussion:	
Why do people feel a need to share their hurts or offenses with others rather than the supposed offender?	
How should you approach someone when they have offended you in some way?	
✓ If you do not know how to handle a particular situation, who should you talk to about the situation? Can you do it in such a way as to not expose the individual?	
Knowing we all make mistakes at times, how would you approach someone that you think you may have offended in some way?

The Final Word Principle	
I will believe and act upon the last words we spoke concerning our relationship.	
Scripture: Philippians 4:8 - "Finally brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy - mediate on these things."	
Thought: Did you forget or disregard what we last spoke to one another concerning our relationship?	
Questions for Discussion:	
→ What causes people to question the standing of various relationships in their lives when such questioning goes against the "Final Word Principle?"	
What should you do if you feel that someone's behavior seems different than what was said between you both regarding the relationship?

The Faithfulness Principle	
Faithfulness to our relationship outweighs the importance of any offense between us. I will not allow any problem to override the principles by which we live.	
cripture: Proverbs 27:6 - "Faithful are the wounds of a iend, but the kisses of an enemy are deceitful."	
hought: Is this problem a threat to our relationship?	
uestions for Discussion:	
Why do people think they have to be right in order for them to work and walk with others?	
What is it in us that will allow small issues to make us lose sight of the big picture of walking in unity with others?	
➤ If the issue must be brought up, why do people often instead "sweep it under the rug" rather than dealing with it as scripture says, or truly letting it go? What is that root?

The Friendship Principle	
t is my responsibility to approach you if I need our help. I will not expect you to interpret my	
ections or recognize my heart's condition.	
Scripture: Proverbs 18:24 - "A man who has friends	
nust himself be friendly, but there is a friend who sticks loser that a brother."	
hought: Are you offended that I did not recognize you vere troubled?	
Questions for Discussion:	
What keeps us from pursuing help in areas of our lives when we know we need it?	
which we know we held it.	
Why do some choose to isolate themselves when things	
in life aren't going well, rather than reach out for help from someone they know will listen and give them wise	
counsel?	
When the words "transparency" and "accountability" are considered what comes to your mind?	
seeing that they are going through a difficult time in life?	

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The Four-day Principle	
I will not allow any problem I have with you to go unresolved for more than four days	
Scripture: Proverbs 28:13 - "He who covers his sins will not prosper, but whoever confesses and forsakes them will have mercy."	
Thought: How long have you been troubled about this problem?	
Questions for Discussion:	
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→ James 5:16 "Confess your trespasses to one another and pray for one another that you may be healed. The	
effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much." How does this scripture apply to this principle?	
When seeking restoration of a relationship why is it important to understand the perspective of the other	
person as much as being understood ourselves?	
Can you give an example of a good approach to use	
when working to resolve an issue with someone that you haven't been able to resolve in your own heart?	
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
