ASH WEDNESDAY AND MIDWEEK EVENING PRAYER

Lent is upon us! It's one of the most meaningful seasons of the Church year. It's a time for slowing down and assessing ourselves honestly, a time for clearing out practices and habits that are not life-giving, and choosing instead to take on positive practices that improve life for our neighbor sand for ourselves.

Lent begins on **Wed.**, **Feb. 18**, **Ash Wednesday**. We will gather that evening at **7:00 p.m.** for a beautiful service that includes Confession, Eucharist, and the Imposition of Ashes, a reminder of our frailty and mortality but more important, of our total dependence on God's good providing and gracious mercy toward us.

Then, each Wednesday evening between Ash Wednesday and Palm Sunday, Mar. 29, we'll gather at 7:00 p.m. for a simple, reflective, meditative service of **Evening Prayer**. The service will last 25–30 minutes. Those who have participated agree that it's a calming and restful time of praise and prayer and spiritual nourishment. Come and see for yourself!

FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

From Our Pastor

Grace and peace to you from our Lord Jesus Christ!

"Come and see!" It's about as simple an invitation as there is. It's an invitation that doesn't require any explanations...in fact, it's pretty upfront about the fact that you're not able to describe adequately what it is you want the other person to experience, but that you're convinced if they only experience it for themselves they will find it meaningful or enjoyable, too.

"Come and see!" It's an invitation that conveys excitement, an invitation that communicates that you care enough about the other person to ask them to experience something, as well.

"Come and see!" It's an invitation that says that you care enough about the other person that you're willing to accompany them so you can both experience it together.

"Come and see!" That is at the heart of what it means to be a follower of Jesus: the willingness to invite other people to come experience along with you this God whom we can't begin to



explain, but who encounters us in surprising ways and who changes things...this Jesus who knows everything about us and who loves us...this Spirit who moves us to feel compassion and to serve other people simply out of love for them.

Why is that so difficult for so many of us? We don't hesitate to invite someone to come try a restaurant with us that we've enjoyed, or even that we've just heard from others is pretty good. We don't bat an eyelash at telling somebody to watch the latest series on Netflix that we've gotten caught up in. We don't skip a beat in sharing a recipe on Pinterest that we've really liked, or posting something on Facebook that we've found meaningful. In each of those cases, it's a pretty natural thing, a natural part of relating to others. We don't think we have to be able to tell them what the chef's secret cooking techniques are, we don't think we have to be able to recount the entire plot and cast of characters of the TV show or recite lines of dialogue, we don't think we have to be able to describe the entire philosophy behind a quote. We just put it out there and say, "Come and see!"

But for some reason, when it comes to our faith, we get terrible stage fright. We start thinking that we have to be Bible scholars, or that we have to be able to answer all the questions someone might have about the Christian faith, or that we have to be theologians. But if you look at the Gospel stories, much of the time, when people share with others their experiences with Jesus, they have only just met him, and really don't have much to tell, other than that they have encountered him and something has happened. "He seems to know all about me!" "He touched me and made me well!" "I don't know anything, other than that something has changed!" And over and over comes that simple invitation: "Come and see!"

What would help you become comfortable with issuing that simple invitation to someone else? Maybe it's inviting someone to come with you to worship...but it doesn't have to be. That might come later. Maybe it's more about inviting them to one of the community groups, or to the Mardi Gras dinner. Maybe it's inviting them to come serve a meal with you at the Soup Kettle or the Vineyard breakfast. Maybe it's inviting them to a Youth lock-in. Maybe it's inviting them to meet you and someone else for coffee at Panera, or to walk around the track at the Center. Maybe it's



inviting them to come with you to Bible and Brew. Maybe it's issuing an invitation to come sew with you or assembly quilt tops at Quilts of Valor. Jesus can be encountered in countless places and settings. What matters is that you care enough about someone else that you want them to encounter Jesus, too.

"Come and see!" Three little words. Pretty easy to say, once we get used to doing it. But those three little words could literally change someone else's life. Will you try saying them in the next couple of weeks?

It seems we just had Christmas, and already Lent is upon us! I wanted to make you aware of all the Spiritual Formation opportunities for children and youth this season. There are many types of activities; hopefully the kids, youth, and their families will be enriched and grow in the spiritual walk this Lent. Feel free to bring grandkids, neighbors, or friends to any of the times listed below!

Sundays, Feb. 1 & 8 – The older Sunday school classes will be making an Alleluia banner to be "buried" on **Sun., Feb. 15**. They will also be talking about preparing for the Lent and Easter season.

Sunday, Feb. 15 - CREATE for all ages! Kids, youth, and adults will come together to learn more about Ash Wednesday and Lent. They will be creating a Holy Week banners for home and church, making pretzels, and assembling a Jesse Tree.

At the beginning of Lent, all children and youth will be given Lenten calendars and begin creating a notebook that will be used on Sundays during Lent.

Beginning **Sun.**, **Feb. 22**, and continuing each Sunday throughout the whole season of Lent the kids and youth will receive 15 minutes of special instruction at the beginning of the Sunday school time. During this time, they will be learning about different Lenten practices, exploring stories that relate to Lent, and putting up the weekly Jesse Tree symbols for the week.



Also during Lent, each Wednesday at **7:00 p.m.** there is a moving worship that families are invited and encouraged to attend!

During March, there will be a Saturday morning Communion instruction class. If your child hasn't received instruction, talk to Pastor Keith about attending this workshop!

Sunday, Mar. 29 – Palm Sunday – Special crafts and activities about Palm Sunday and Holy Week.

GROWING STEWARDS STEP BY STEP

Twelve Devotions and Prayers

Stewardship is a spiritual issue, not a financial issue. The journey to being a good steward has many steps. For some people this starts with reading, reflection, and prayer. Here's the eleventh devotion for this purpose. The inspiration for these writings is "Stepping Stones of a Steward" by Ron Vallet (Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co; Grand Rapids, MI; © 1989). [ed: this was written during or before 1989, but still applies in 2015]

Devotion 11 Coming to Terms with Life's Realities Luke 18:1-8

This passage is often referred to as the parable of the "dishonest" or "unjust" steward.

For some this is the most troubling of all the parables Jesus told. On the one hand, a steward is discharged in response to charges that goods were being wasted. Yet in the second half of the parable, this dishonest steward is commended for shrewdly discounting the debts of others to the same master. How are these two actions reconciled?



In the first half of the parable, Jesus reminds us that we are all stewards of what God has entrusted to us. Yes, everything. If we are not faithful stewards, we can be discharged. Perhaps more appropriately, what we have been put in charge of can be taken away. Has this ever happened to you? I can remember times that I did not use my money wisely and some of it was taken away. We frequently hear in the news about people who have been poor stewards and their position and status are taken away. Yes, this can happen. We are encouraged to always be faithful and responsible stewards of what is entrusted to us.

It is the second half of this parable that may be more difficult to understand. Here Jesus is not commending the specific actions of the unjust steward, the reducing of the debts, but commending the shrewdness in taking action. Acting shrewdly means having a discerning awareness of the situation or reality and a willingness to act in skillful ways. The unjust steward assessed the reality of the crisis facing him and acted promptly with foresight.

This was not the only occasion Jesus illustrated this point. In Matthew 10:16, as he was sending out the disciples, Jesus said, "be wise as serpents and innocent as doves." The word translated as "wise" in this context is the same word as the "shrewd" in the parable. Therefore, Jesus is encouraging and praising disciples to be both devout in their purpose and skillful in their planning.

In Scripture, there are many other places where Jesus admires shrewdness in managing affairs, both in work and in love. It is our ability to face reality and skillfully deal with crisis situations that also reflect our ability to be a just and honest steward.

Let us pray: Dear Lord, help us to recognize and appreciate the gifts you have entrusted to us. May we understand their purpose and use them in ways you would approve. We know we are not always good managers. May we be prudent in assessing reality, patient in addressing a crisis and wise in our decision-making. Help us to be faithful to your calling, skillful in planning, and responsible as your just and honest stewards. Amen.
