

Mission Camp: Seven years of service and still growing by Laura Widstrom

The last week of June marked Christ UMC's seventh annual Mission Camp, this year in Valparaiso, Ind. Mission Camp is a "another" work camp Christ UMC sponsors for high school youth and adults from other churches—not to be confused with the Senior High Work Camp that took place July 14-21. Mission Camp was the

dream of Pastor Patty Anderson after a request from a friend's church for Christ UMC to share some of the best of what they do in expressing the love of Jesus by making homes safer, drier, and warmer.

Concerned about our numbers at the time and overloading Senior High Work Camp, Patty came up with the idea of running a second camp for smaller churches to attend and using it as leadership training

for our college students who are in that in-between phase moving from camper to leader.

Christ UMC still provides the core staff with support from other Mission Camp churches. The camp is directed by myself, Linda Bjur, and Steve Hudgin. Phyllis Melenas and Judi Thorn are the heroes in the kitchen, and Dennis Thorn is the troublemaker—oops, I mean troubleshooter—to help work crews when they run into a challenge at their sites. This year, Christ UMC's Dan Robinson and Derek Hudgin joined six other college students from Mission Camp churches to offer leadership for the week, prepare lunch supplies, run materials to work sites, take pictures, and run the technical aspects of chapel.

We have participants from churches in Illinois, Iowa, and Wisconsin, many who have come for the past seven years. In the time we have had together, the campers and adult leaders have become a community, staying in touch throughout the year and supporting one another.

This year we served at 10 different sites, painting, cleaning, weatherizing, installing doors, clearing brush,

repairing gates, drywalling, roofing, and living life alongside our residents for the week. Although the temperatures were in the 90s most days, the crews worked hard and completed all of the promised work.

At site 3, the resident had been in an industrial accident, leaving him as a double amputee. A poor attic insu-

lation job at his home left the ceilings sagging dangerously low. Our crews removed the old drywall, laid new insulation, and hung new drywall. One day, the crew also enjoyed the fabulous Puerto Rican cooking of their resident!

Site 5 was home to a disabled man who relied on an electric scooter for his mobility around the house and his transportation into town. Every week this resident "scooters" several miles

to and from church, despite weather conditions. The crew at his home scraped and painted the badly peeling paint. One of their favorite stories to share was when the resident snuck away and scootered to the store to bring them cherries as a treat during lunch and devotions.

On Thursday at camp, we host "resident night," inviting our residents and their families to join us for dinner and chapel. This year, we had more residents than ever as crews made strong relational connections with their residents and, in many situations, rekindled a love for Jesus through their gift of service and in conversations at the work site. Worshipping in a packed sanctuary with about 20 of our residents was easily the highlight of the week; we pray that those sparks of faith will grow into flames.

On behalf of the eight participating churches, we extend our thanks to Christ UMC for their prayer support and for loaning the work camp equipment. We welcome new groups into the Mission Camp family; if you know of a youth group that would enjoy this experience, please have them contact the Christ UMC office.

What re-connects you to your soul?

"Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters" (Isaiah 55:1a, NRSV)

In our busy lives and also in times of desolation, it can be easy to lose track of our deepest knowledge of who God is in our lives. Upsetting events may knock us off our centers; times of illness or unemployment can leave us feeling shaky and uncertain. When we feel lost or separated from God, it's good to know what will help us reconnect.

What re-connects you to your soul? Is it scripture? Relationship? Nature? Music? Quotes?

Which scriptures bring you alive? When I was a teenager and going through hard times, I clung to John 14:18, "I will not leave you desolate; I am coming to you." (RSV). In my college years and 20s, I discovered Micah 6:8: "What does the LORD require of you, but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (NRSV). During theological struggles after my missionary service in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, I read Isaiah 43:18-19, and these words jumped off the page: "Stop dwelling on past events and brooding over days gone by. I am about to do something new; can you not perceive it? Even through the wilderness I will make a way, and paths in the barren desert" (REB). And the longer passages of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5 – 7) and Romans 8 make me whole again.

What about relationships? Are there people who help you know that you are loved? Do you need to visit with a treasured family member? A favorite neighbor? A wise soul? In every church I've served, there have been wise older members whose compassion flowed from them. I would visit them to bring comfort, and I would go away feeling restored. Sometimes on a bad day, a trip to the nursing home to see one of these saints is just what I need.

What about nature? Do you need a walk through the woods? Time out in the fields? A lazy day of fishing? I'm a water person, with my childhood shaped by the Pacific and Atlantic oceans and an adult love affair with Lake Michigan and Lake Erie. A couple of days ago I walked with a friend through Anderson Gardens and drew

strength from the ponds and waterfalls there. Time by water restores me.

For many of us, music is one of the key ways we hear God's voice. Years ago I heard a tenor sing, "If with all your hearts ye truly seek me," from Mendelssohn's oratorio Elijah. My heart melted then, and it still melts every time I hear that. We may receive a boost from Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus." We all have favorite hymns or contemporary songs. I love "God of grace and God of glory" for its Social Gospel emphasis, and Sara Groves' "The other side of something" fills me with hope. Years ago when I was feeling blue, I heard "Blessed be the name" by Matt Redman, and I loved the reminder to bless God in good times and bad. What music speaks to you?


What about favorite quotes? Irenaeus of Lyon, who lived in the third century, wrote, "The glory of God is a human being fully alive." On a trip to Washington, DC, I discovered this quote from Eleanor Roosevelt: "We gain strength, and courage, and confidence by each experience in which we really stop to look fear in the face... we must do that which we think we cannot. "I love the poetry of Wendell Berry, Naomi Shihab Nye, Mary Oliver (and now, Christine Swanberg). A good poem can set me right with the world.

In these waning days of summer, I encourage you to make space for God. Do those things (or make those

visits) that remind you of God's love and care. Strengthened by that gift, may you return to the world renewed.

Two familiar faces are missing at the doors of the 8 a.m. service at Alpine Center since Leland and Sandy Cottrell recently retired from ushering. They were the only ushers for that service when Christ UMC initiated the early service about 15 years ago. Another couple joined them after about 12 months, and then others through the years, but they continued to serve because, as Sandy said, "You want to be a part of your church."

Sandy came to Christ UMC after Rev. Miller spoke at Baccalaureate for her Rockford East High School graduation, and her parents liked him. She and Leland were married at Alpine Center and have been a part of this church for many years. They left for a few years when they lived in New Milford, but returned when they moved back into Rockford in the early 1970s. When asked why they have remained members since then, Sandy replied, "It's where your friends are. It's just home." It is the place where she met and married her husband, and where their daughter was baptized.

Leland and Sandy learned early on that being involved in the church is an opportunity to make new friends, and they clearly enjoy the fellowship. Through the years they have used their gifts and talents to serve our church and community together and individually. Besides ushering together, they have also worked on the Thanksgiving baskets. Leland uses his knowledge and skills to work with fellow parishioners on Habitat for Humanity homes. Sandy has shared her artistic talents with the quilting group and working to redo the stained glass windows in the sanctuary. She is also active with the United

Their daughter Jean lives in Rockford and daughter Ann lives in Virginia, while their son, Dennis, lives in Indiana. She has four grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren.

Donald worked for ComEd as a line supervisor, she said. He retired after 35 years with the company. In the later years he was transferred to Rockford, but they decided to continue living in Dixon, so he commuted.

Velva was a stay-at-home Mom when the children were small. Later she drove a school bus for about 14 years.

In Dixon Velva served as church secretary, taught Sunday school, and was on many church committees. Then she became executive secretary of a high rise for low-income families—in about 100 apartments on six floors—for about 12 years.

As church secretary, she had done some work for the Dixon ministerial association, which was trying to start a day care center, but got no response to advertisements.

"I got some people together and we visited," she said. The day care started in a Methodist Church with five

children. It grew and grew, moving into an old church and later to a building at the Ronald Reagan Museum. Later known as Open Sesame Child Care Center, the non-profit organization constructed its own building for children 6 weeks to 12 years old. Today it cares for 200 kids.

"It has a nice building, and a nice playground," she said. "I just love that all of those children are cared for." She served on the organization's board about 20 years.

At Church of the Brethren, Velva and Donald were named Volunteers of the Month for their help with immigrants and with Meals on Wheels and Feed the Children, which provided breakfast to hungry schoolchildren.

They were involved with families from the Netherlands, Germany, Italy, Hong Kong, and Laos. She remembers one family that had sewn their valuables into their skirts and another family that made tea from poisonous leaves.

She chose Christ UMC after "shopping around" for a church because it also had quilting and a day care center.

Velva enjoys reading and travel, like when the couple went to Alaska and Switzerland.

Calling All Painters!!



Getting to Know You: Velva Unger by Don Black



When several members at Christ UMC's Our Master's Center were asked one Sunday last month, "Who's Velva Unger?" nobody recognized the name.

But when she later was pointed out, they all exclaimed, "Oh, I know her!" and told how delightful and charming she is.

Velva has been attending Our Master's only about three years. She's a life-long resident of

Dixon, where she's still a member of the Church of the Brethren. There Velva and her late husband, Donald, have long been recognized for their Christian work.

"I didn't come from a church-going family," she said. "Grandma and Grandpa picked us up and took us to Sunday school.

"I've been in church all of my life since," she said. After her husband died in 2007, Velva was ready to sell her house in Dixon. At the same time her grand-daughter and husband, who lived in Rockford, wanted their daughter to attend Dixon High School. So Velva moved to Rockford and her granddaughter moved into the family home. Velva's great-granddaughter will start her senior year at Dixon this fall.

Velva now lives with her daughter and son-in-law, Jean and Tom Johnson, in Rockford.

"We lived on a farm ... in the Polo-Dixon area," she explained, "and I rode a pony to school all but one year when the ice was 3 inches and Father drove me."

Grandpa gave her a Shetland pony, which she rode through eighth grade. Later she learned to drive in an old Model A Ford, which she drove through high school.

The family had a big garden and livestock, including goats. "They ate everything," she recalled, including the cardboard-like license plate on the car. "They probably weren't cardboard, but they were edible," she said. "They also butted the shiny car, once they got their horns."

"I got kidded when I drove the car with the chewed-up license plate to school," she said with a chuckle.

Velva was the first one in the family to graduate from high school. She started studies at Palmer's Chiropractic School in Dubuque, Iowa, "the day after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor." The classes stopped because "the guys just went to war."

Later she got a job sewing Army jackets.

She's been sewing all of her life—at home and in 4H—and today with the Quilters Group of Christ UMC.

Velva and Donald attended high school and graduated
