EXPECTING MIRACLES

I'm headed out to tie our Expectations of Miracles to the tree in the church's front yard. I love the Miracles you wrote on ribbons Sunday. That tree will be the most fruitful it's ever been– and right in the middle of winter, too. Miraculous.

I liked it that the sermon led some of you to share with me other evidence that Miracles can be Expected. Alert Congregant Janice shared with me a viral video about an NYPD officer buying boots for a homeless man, inspiring lots of people to random acts of kindness. Alert Reader Edmond sent me a link to an article on Huffpost.com by Sam Borenstein, with statistics showing that violence around the world is in steady decline. Fewer battle-related deaths, fewer genocides, fewer murders. Apparently, one of the main reasons for this drop is that humans are getting smarter and able to figure out other solutions. IQ tests show that the average teenager is smarter with each generation. (Bet you had already figured that one out, hadn't you?) Peace on earth is happening. Miraculous.

I also remembered the great Real Stories by Real People that we shared last year during Advent and Christmas. We were surrounded by Christmas miracles – Gary's turn from alcoholism; Nate and Sarah's reunion during a Christmas in Korea; Lilian's reconnection with her father; Wayne's story of finding music and beauty in his South Carolina orphanage. Just when we are about to give up, lo and behold – a Miracle.

You can expect an end of the world Catastrophe. You can expect to be Disappointed. You can expect to experience Nothing. But why would you, when Real Miracles Happen to Real People all the time?

FOUNDATION PLACE

Christmas is a time of giving, and the Foundation is overjoyed to celebrate the season by contributing funds to the Cultivating our Soil and SSP projects. In addition to the \$25,500 already contributed to Cultivating our Soil, we have given another \$10,000 -- \$5000 as seed money for the Children's Music Program and \$5000 earmarked for the Fellowship Hall flooring when that project gets under way.

That's an overall total of \$35,500 to Cultivating our Soil. How were we able to do that? We invested and shepherded monies contributed over the years by those past and present who purchased leaves and stones for the Tree of Life and took spendable amounts (interest and income) from those investments and were able to give the \$5000 necessary for the Children's Music Program. We took another \$5000 of spendable amounts from the Scott MacDonald Maintenance Fund, which was set up specifically for Church maintenance, and consisting of contributions specifically earmarked for, or, if not earmarked, determined by the

Foundation Board to go into that account.

But wait...there's the SSP money! The Foundation voted to create out of the Tree of Life spendable money a one-time \$1200 scholarship fund for SSP participants. This will help defray personal costs of the youth participating, and we hope that it will inspire further commitments from our youth, their families and the congregation as a whole to continue this invaluable beyond-our-community outreach.

All this talk of contributions and spendable amounts is dry, I know, but the Foundation wants you to know what we are doing and to join with us in thanking those who have had the foresight and resources and a belief in the future of CVUMC to trust the Foundation with investing and giving back. If you are one of those people, thank you is too small a phrase to express our gratitude. If you would like to be, it's not too late for end of year contributions. Please consider this prayerfully as we still our hearts and remember the birth of our Savior.

WRAPPING UP THE RECONCILING CONVERSATION

As our reconciling process wraps up, the time is coming for us to decide how radically hospitable we really are. Are our doors open to all? Will we live into the commandment to love the Lord our God with all our hearts, minds, souls and strengths and love our neighbors as ourselves?

It takes courage to take a stand, to follow your heart when asked 'What do you stand for.' This faith family has that opportunity to boldly proclaim God's love for all by adopting a statement of welcome, which includes gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered people. We teach our children that God's love has no bounds, that grace is extended to all, to do onto others as you would have them do onto you. We have the opportunity to put our words into action. It is time to embrace and celebrate God's redeeming love for all.

While it's my sincere hope that we will adopt a statement of welcome next month, it is also my hope that the conversation of love and reconciliation continues within our faith family. That those who may not agree are still willing to walk this journey with us, for while we may not all agree, we all share the foundational core of love for God and for each other.

Church Council decided at its November meeting to bring the Reconciling Conversation to a close at our Charge Conference, already scheduled for **Saturday**, **January 12 @ 10:00 a.m.** At that time, we will decide specifically whether or not to adopt a Welcoming Statement. All church members can participate in a Charge Conference. Decisions are made by those who are present.

The Welcoming Statement would be considered a first step toward GLBT openness. Our church would then live into its openness over the next couple of years, taking additional steps in mission and ministry as the congregation feels led. For now, we are only deciding on the presence and content of a statement.

We have asked our District Superintendent Cedrick Bridgeforth to be our presiding elder, and he has agreed to assist us in our discernment. With 87 churches in his District, Rev. Bridgeforth is not attending every Charge Conference. We are pleased that he can facilitate ours. You will find helpful his knowledge and perception on how a reconciling decision positions CVUMC within the UMC.

Several samples from other Reconciling churches have been compiled here for your review and inspiration. Samples:

Church of the Reconciler (Birmingham, Alabama):

Our life together affirms that "God shows no partiality" (Acts 10:34). Our congregation is diverse, and we celebrate that diversity. We challenge members to follow Jesus in multicultural, interracial community; maintain a commitment to be inclusive, welcoming all people regardless of age, gender, race, economic status, ethnic background, mental or physical ability, sexual orientation, or gender identity. God's work is the work of removing the injustices of the past that divide and limit all of us. Church of the Reconciler's special task is equipping laity for the ministry of reconciliation so that we may be "sent into the world as Jesus was sent" (John 20:21).

Glenview United Methodist Church (Glenview, Illinois):

Following the loving example of Jesus Christ, we affirm the inherent worth and dignity of every person as a beloved child of God. We welcome into the life and ministry of Glenview United Methodist

Church all persons of every age, ability, race, gender identity, ethnicity, nationality, marital status, sexual orientation, family configuration, or socioeconomic or employment status.

Asbury United Methodist Church (Charleston, West Virginia)

The people of Asbury are called to share God's love as we minister with and to all persons in the community where the church is located and beyond, providing worship, nurture, fellowship, and service. Our welcome knows no boundaries of age, race, ethnicity,
