## PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Summer and the hazy humid days of August will be in full swing when you receive this newsletter. When I was a child, late summer seemed to go on forever -- those last few weeks before school started were the worst. You knew summer was coming to an end, and the sleeping in would only be reserved for weekends. The days just seemed longer as we waited for school to start and get back into a routine and see our classmates. Now, as an adult, I can understand what people mean when they speak of time flying by. Where does the time go? Maybe as adults we keep ourselves so busy that we don't take time to get bored, or even to reflect on these long hot summer days.

I find myself really enjoying summer this year. I have been reconnecting with friends that for the past few years, I haven't taken the time to nurture our relationships. In my experience this summer, each time the reconnecting has felt like we were picking up where we left off and felt comfortable. Yesterday I visited Johnny Cash's grave in Hendersonville, TN near Nashville. On the bench next to his grave are the following words, "Happiness is being at peace, being with loved ones; being comfortable. . . . But most of all, it's having those loved ones." — Johnny Cash.

Most likely you will receive this newsletter the week before I attend a clergy renewal retreat just outside of Philadelphia at Pendle Hill, a Quaker retreat center. In preparation for our time together, my clergy colleagues and I have been reading daily devotionals on finding serenity among our hectic high-speed lives. I would like to share one with you in the hopes that you too find some serenity in your fast-paced lives.

"The Kingdom of God is also said to be like a treasure that someone finds and hides in a field. Then, in his joy, he sells all he has and buys that field. If you are capable of touching that treasure, you know that nothing can be compared to it. It is the source of true joy, true peace, and true happiness...

That treasure of happiness, the Kingdom of Heaven, may be called the ultimate dimension of reality. When you see only the waves, you might miss the water. ### **COUNCIL NOTES**

A Council meeting was held Tuesday 18 June at 7:30Ppm The Council did not meet in July and the next Council meeting is scheduled for 19 August at 7:30pm.

- •The Treasurer reports giving and expenses year to date are about equal.
- •The Council approved funds to hire someone to handle the church finances. Russ is not able to continue handling the daily financial activities of DUMC. Between DUMC and CrossRoads the tasks have reached the point that hiring someone has become necessary.
- •There have been some ongoing discussions regarding the sale of the parcel of land currently being leased to the Neal family being used by the Country Store, and it looks like this may move forward. The main reason for considering the sale is the concern regarding liability, especially considering the underground gasoline storage tanks. If a sale takes place, the plan would be to include a granted right-of-way to the DUMC Cemetery so there would be no effect to the cemetery operations. Any decision regarding this matter would be brought to the church at the Charge Conference.
- •There has been some discussion regarding combining the Worship and Evangelism teams.
- •Blair Smith volunteered to put together a group to assist with individuals who come to the church office seeking assistance. This group would work with the church office and Social Needs and Outreach.
- •Security for anyone in the office by themselves was discussed and will be addressed. The Council will continue to offer Council Notes updates and welcomes input from the congregation. Please let us know if there's additional information that you would like to see included in future Council Notes.

#### FINANCE REPORT

The financial results for DUMC for the first six months of 2013 are favorable. Offerings and other revenue exceeded budget by \$3,802, and with expenses over budget by only \$2,583, a net gain of \$1,217 was realized. This is significant because usually at this time of year, we are facing a deficit. Last year we had a net loss of \$22,017 for the first six months. As encouraging as this is, summer months are a challenge for many to stay current with offerings, as vacations and other activities can easily divert attention to other areas. Hopefully, we can stay on pace to maintain the budgeted level of giving, control our expenses, and focus on our ministries rather than financial concerns.

CrossRoads Child Development Center ended the first six months with a net gain of \$39,783. This amount has been distributed to DUMC accounts in the following manner:

•Scholarship Fund \$ 2,000 (assist two senior students)

•Trustee Special Reserve \$ 22,670 (funds current building improvements)

•Building Fund \$11,335 (future building projects)

•Social Needs Committee \$ 3,778 (community charitable needs)

As of this date, all known financial and government related reporting has been completed. A special thank you goes out to the audit team who reviewed the accounting of all committees in the church to ensure that we are in compliance with legal and church conference requirements. The audit team consisted of: Jacque Tomlinson, Bob Tomlinson, Caroline Day Scruggs, Marilyn Fate, Dave Schwenker, and Chuck Moeslein.

The next major function for the Finance team will be the planning and budget process for 2014 which begins in the fall. Operating committees of the church should begin discussion of their 2014 goals in their current meetings, including how their objectives will fit within our financial resources.

### Your Missions Team Update

Greetings from your Missions Team, this year's Volunteers In Mission (VIM) participants, and the Tongues of Fire Barbeque Ministry Team. The former is the group that plans and tracks the various mission efforts at DUMC, while the latter helps to fund these efforts. VIM participants do the physical labor associated with mission outreach.

The Missions Team met on 24 July to assess the year to date, review finances, and plan for the future. Although always feeling the need to do more, so far there has been a successful Youth VIM trip and a local mission effort is underway. There is \$5,692 in the Missions account. Damon Ostis is looking into the possibility of sending a roofing crew out to Oklahoma in the fall, with a decision on doing that to be made before the next meeting on Missions on 3 September. The next adult VIM trip is currently scheduled for the first full week in April 2014. The destination is not yet set and may be determined by what nature throws at the east coast this summer. Missions has also decided to fund and build a concrete pad for Bob Waddell's keyboard and Dixon Wood's organ down in the Green Cathedral.

In response to parishioner interest in doing more locally, DUMC has established a relationship with Mt. Zion UMC and has joined with it to work with Partners In Care, an Anne Arundel outreach organization. Current efforts assist those in the various trailer parks along Sands Road in South County. Last month Rusty Lamar and Ted Hirakawa installed a new front door for a home in Maryland Manor. A new roof for the trailer will be constructed later this summer. This month Tom Roh, Chad Moeslein and I demolished and then replaced an entry deck at another trailer home in Patuxent Manor. Missions also hopes to help DUMC's Care and Nurture Committee with its Breakfast Club program. Its purpose is to help feed needy children in South County during the summer months when school meals and the Backpack program are not in place.

Missions donated \$1,500 to DUMC's Youth for this summer's VIM trip to Vandemere, NC. Of course the major funding for this trip comes from the UMM's Fairways of Faith Golf Tournament, and the youth themselves also assist. Thirty nine youth and adults were divided into three teams to repair, install, paint and re-roof homes in the area that was devastated by Hurricane Irene in 2011. One of the best aspects of this trip was its evangelistic outreach to non-DUMC youth, giving them a church connection.

Tongues of Fire is a fundraising arm of Missions, holding BBQ sales five times each year. Sixty-five percent of profits from sales by the group go to Missions, ten percent is a tithe to DUMC, with the remaining twenty-five percent staying in the TOF account for worthy causes. For instance, this year TOF donated \$1,000 to the William Scrimgeour Memorial Scholarship Fund. There are some 31 members of this active and fun group that has as its motto, "Spreading the Gospel, One Bite at a time." The last two sales of the year are scheduled for the Peach Festival and 28 September 28, and new members are always welcomed.

This is always an incredibly demanding yet rewarding week, and this year was no different, as the children successfully put on, arguably the best, and easily the most difficult, performance to date. A big round of applause goes to our camp counseling veterans Rebecca Gould and Kennady Moseley, our new recruits, Amanda Sparks and Amanda Nicole, and also to Arielle Hall, who after participating in every performance camp has moved into the role of Camp Counselor in Training.



Youth group continues to meet during the summer, with a lot of activities. We've already gone mini-golfing, seen a movie, enjoyed Rita's, and raided the local Coldstone Creamery. Youth activities will continue throughout the summer, combining Middle and High School youth groups as we have a significant number of youth transitioning between ages beginning in the fall. ## SOCIAL NEEDS AND OUTREACH COMMITTEE UPDATE

This summer for eight weeks, the committee is partnering with Cedar Grove UMC in Deale and St. Matthews UMC in Shadyside to bring the Breakfast Club to those areas. The club was started in Lothian in 2010 by Cedar Grove member, Ingrid Quimby-High whose son was concerned that his friend wouldn't have food when school was out. It has been highly successful in giving kids in need a nutritious breakfast over the summer months. At present, we are packing and distributing over 40 bags of food each week to families with children. A big thank you goes to each person who volunteered to help pack bags or to donate food. Supplies have been purchased with donations from participating churches. It has been a blessing to work with other churches to fill a need in South County.

The Social Needs Committee is fortunate to receive funding from the revenues of the Crossroads Child Development Center. On behalf of DUMC, quarterly donations are sent to the Lighthouse Shelter, the Good News Jailhouse Ministry in Annapolis, and the South County Assistance Network food bank.

In addition, the food donated by our church members is taken to the South County food bank by the committee. Since January, we also made other donations, one being the South Arundel Rotary Club's Bountiful Backpacks program which packs weekend food for low income children who receive free or low cost lunches at school but do without on weekends. Other donations have been made to help people in need of medical, energy and housing assistance.

Many churches prepare and serve a meal once a month at the Lighthouse Shelter. We are interested in starting this outreach at DUMC, but it requires a monthly commitment of church members to do this. A rotating group of volunteers could make this work. If you are willing to help with this project, please talk to a committee member.

Mark you calendars for the annual church yard sale on Saturday, 5 October. Please save your treasures until then.

- Operation Christmas Child Shoebox collection in November. Now is a good time to buy school supplies for the boxes.

## Music Report: Performance Issues

Um, on second thought maybe the title of my article is misleading since I want to talk about variation in music. Many pieces of music can be effectively performed in a variety of styles. Different styles means different tempos, different volumes, different articulations; in other words, all the musical parameters that go to make up a "style."

A well-known example is "Mack the Knife." The original version is a German song written for "The Threepenny Opera," a German musical/opera written by Kurt Weill in 1928. It is perhaps Weill's most famous composition. The original style of the music can best be described as German beer hall.

http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=aPG9GcykPIY. It is sung by Lotte Lenya, a famous actress in her day and not coincidentally, Weill's wife. (Miss Lenya also received a Tony award and an Academy award nomination later in life; you may remember her as the knife-in-the-shoe SPECTRE agent from the Bond film, From Russia With Love.) "Mack the Knife" is sung in German, the original language of the song.

Now listen to this more familiar version created by Bobby Darin a generation later: <a href="http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=SE11HM">http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=SE11HM</a> WkXEU. Darin, of "Splish, Splash, I Was Taking a Bath" fame, wanted a vehicle to

show the public he could compete with Frank Sinatra in the high-energy swing style crooners favored in the 1950s. (Also noteworthy, Darin paid Miss Lenya a compliment by mentioning her twice in the song!)

My point is that one can have more than a single interpretation of a musical piece. J.S. Bach rarely indicated a tempo in any of his works, so it is up to the performer to choose a tempo he or she can justify musically through their performance. Of course, not every interpretation works. The Canadian pianist Glenn Gould made it a point to play some of Bach's preludes and fugues at drastically different tempos than what is considered normal; in my opinion, sometimes it worked, and sometimes it just didn't.

Which leads us to Sunday morning...

I will always choose a style or tempo that I feel is right at that moment for the hymn we are about to sing. Many factors are considered: what is the mood of the congregation, what is the topic of Pastor Lisa's sermon, are we inside or outside. The list is as long as one can imagine. You may not always agree with me, but at the very least, give me a chance to hear (literally) me out. Remember, an open heart begins with an open mind.

## Connie's Corner

Dear Friends in Christ,

The Stephen Ministry Consortium, of which DUMC is a member, will be offering a new class starting 28 September at Calgary UMC in Annapolis. This is a glorious opportunity to serve your Christian family! It is a unique expression of discipleship.

According to the manual, a Stephen Minister is defined as: a lay Christian recruited, selected, trained, and supervised to provide Christian caregiving through their congregation. Stephen Ministers commit to serving a minimum of two years, which includes the initial fifty hours of training and twice-monthly Supervision and Continuing Education sessions. Stephen Ministers can, and often do, extend their service well beyond their two-year initial commitment.

In my opinion, the Stephen Ministry Program is a natural extension of one's Christianity. Dr. Elton Trueblood so beautifully wrote,

"If you are a Christian, you are a minister. This proposition is absolutely basic to any contemporary understanding of the Christian movement. A non-ministering Christian is a contradiction in terms. The Christian faith is not made up of spectators listening to professionals and is not for individuals who are seeking, primarily, to save their own souls. It is necessarily made up of persons who are called to serve as representatives of Christ in the world, and to serve means to minister."

Participating in the Stephen Ministry program comes as naturally to a Christian as breathing and is a wonderful opportunity to express your Christianity.

We are invited to "Bear one another's burdens." Not 'bear', the cuddly noun; but 'bear' the servitude verb. The purpose of God's word is to act upon it! Reach out, bear, BE THERE! You are invited to explore the Stephen Ministry website at <a href="http://www.stephenministries.org/">http://www.stephenministries.org/</a> or feel free to speak with me or Pastor Lisa should you have any questions concerning the Stephen Ministry program or any interest in learning more. It is not within our power to place divine teachings directly in someone else's heart. All that we can do is place them on the surface of the heart so that when the heart breaks, they will drop in.

## Green Cathedral Report


