COUNCIL NOTES ~

Since the last newsletter, the Church Council has held meetings on April 16th and May 29th. These are the combined notes from those meetings. The next Council meeting will be held July 16th at 7:30pm.

The Council approved modifying Kyle Durbin's position to full-time status with expanded responsibilities. I believe Pastor Lisa will be expanding on this matter elsewhere in the newsletter.

The Trustees continue to work diligently to maintain and upgrade the DUMC facilities. The Council thanked the Trustees for their efforts and Don Wilson especially for his leadership and commitment. Here are a few things presented to the Council by the Trustees.

- The restoration of the concrete stairs next to the Sanctuary has become more complicated than originally expected but the work is progressing.
- Planned painting the exterior of the new Fellowship Hall.
- Repair cracks in the parking lot and restripe the parking lot.
- The Sanctuary renovation project is still in the planning stage. Once the plan is formalized, an open meeting will be held to present the plan to the congregation.
- A proposal is being considered to construct a storage building and fenced area at the end of the parking lot for security of "Goldie" and the trailers.

Finance reported that the CCDC is reporting revenue above expectations but the church is a little behind. The Council recommends members of the congregation consider signing up for Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) for their offering. It's a great secure system for assuring the fulfillment of pledges especially during the summer months when travel is more prevalent and members may not be in church each Sunday. Please contact the office or Russ Smith for further details.

The Council discussed ideas related to formalized coordination of the logistics for DUMC festivals. This is not intended to take anything away from what Debby Wasson and Dot Wood do related to the Strawberry and Peach festivals respectively. The discussion revolved around ways to support their efforts. It was determined that there should be a single go to person serving as the coordinator to organize things like outside set-up/clean-up, parking and communication between the various ministries involved. There will be continued discussion on this in preparation for the Peach Festival so please share your thoughts if you have ideas.

Special note: The Council had a discussion about the focus of Sunday mornings and as a result has decided to try to minimize conducting church "business" on Sunday mornings. It was determined that Sunday mornings should be focused on worship, Spiritual growth and Christian fellowship.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee met on May 3 to review operating results for the four months ending April 30, 2012. Revenue and Expenses for the four month period were generally in line with budget with only a \$1535.00 deficit being reported. However, the forecast for the next several months looks less favorable. May contributions were only \$23500 and we need a monthly revenue stream of \$33000 to defray budgeted expenses. This figure does not include any additions to the budget recently adopted by the Council. Also, we historically experience a 13% decline in revenue during June, July, and August when compared on a monthly basis to the average of the first five months of the year. This situation can lead to a deficit of \$20000 by the end of the summer.

In an attempt to offset some of this decline, Finance will be mailing contribution statements in early June to contributors with the hope that everyone will continue to contribute and to serve as a reminder to those who may be behind on their pledge to bring their pledges up to date. Elsewhere in this newsletter, Lee Matousek (our Lay Leader) provides a reminder of the annual stewardship program with an emphasis on using the EFT program that is available. The EFT (Electronic Funds Transfer) is a program whereby we can transfer funds set by you from your bank account to DUMC on a weekly or monthly basis. You can start or stop or change amounts at any time. This method provides for a constant flow and the contributor stays on target when out of town or just forgets to process the envelope. Forms to initiate the program are available from the church secretary.

Kristy Moseley has been approved by the Council to assist the Treasurer with up to 15 hours weekly to handle some of the bookkeeping functions. Carolyn Wilson will continue as a volunteer assisting the Treasurer by reconciling all bank accounts under our control. We still need a trained accountant as the Treasurer to process the accounting functions which are beyond the clerical scope. A Financial Secretary is also needed with the departure of Pam Matousek.

The Audit committee will complete its work in June and meet the due date set by BW Conference.

CrossRoads Child Development Center continues to operate with a positive cash flow. For the first quarter of the year, \$28631.00 was distributed to DUMC funds as directed by the Council.

Scholarships

In 2004, the Methodist Men's organization at Davidsonville United Methodist Church decided to award one, \$1,000 scholarship to a deserving member of the Church. This same process was repeated again in 2005. As the result of a discussion at a Methodist Men's monthly breakfast meeting, It was determined that the Methodist Men had available funds to sponsor and award four, \$1,000 scholarships in 2006. It was also decided at this breakfast meeting that the these four scholarships would honor the following Methodist men for their long and tireless efforts on behalf of Davidsonville United Methodist Church; Albert Samuel Wood, Lawrence Vernon Leitch, Oscar Fay Grimes, and Rev. Paul Cummins. There were eight applicants for the four scholarships and the selection was made by the leadership of the DUMC Methodist Men's organization.

Also in 2006, the Methodist Men established a Scholarship Committee to formalize the scholarship application and winner selection process on behalf of the Methodist Men. Scholarship Guidelines were established stating that they would be awarded to members of Davidsonville United Methodist Church and/or members of the DUMC Youth Group. The purpose of the scholarships is to assist these young people in continuing their education and to "jump start" post-high school continuing education. Key information requested in the application were: High School you graduated from and year, College or Continuing Education Institute you are attending if appropriate, Grade point average (high school, vocational center or college, as applicable), Higher-education institute that you will be attending, a faith based assessment of your financial need, and a 250-500 word essay addressing the following topics:

- What church activities are you or have you been involved in?
- What community service activities are you or have you been involved in?
- What does living your life as a Christian mean to you?
- How do you expect that continuing your education will affect your life?

These Guidelines are still in use this year as the basis for scholarship winner selection.

The quality of the applications from members of Davidsonville United Methodist Church and/or members of the DUMC Youth Group has continued to be outstanding. In 2008, three \$1,000 and two \$500 scholarships were awarded. In 2009, seven outstanding applications were received and ranked. Four winners were selected by the Committee. In addition, the Tongues of Fire put up \$1,000 to fund another scholarship and Care and Nurture put up \$2,000 for scholarships for the last two applicants. In 2010, there were 7 applicants and the seven applications were evaluated and each was assigned a ranking. The top 4 were awarded the 4 scholarships named after prominent Methodist man in DUMC. In 2010, funds were also put forward by the Tongues of Fire for the William Scrimgeour Scholarship, the Brandon Weill Foundation for the Brandon Weill Memorial Scholarship and DUMC's Care and Nurture Committee for the Gwelda Price, Betty Gilbertson & Maxine George Memorial Scholarship. In 2010, the names of the four Methodist Men's Scholarships were changed to: the Oscar Fay Grimes Scholarship, the Lawrence Vernon Leitch Memorial Scholarship, the Wood Memorial Scholarship, and the Rev. Paul Cummins Memorial Scholarship. In 2011, six \$1,000 scholarships were awarded.

In 2012, eight scholarships will be presented at both the 8:30 and 11:00 services at Church on June 10. The winners for this year are:

Katharine Scruggs is the winner of the Oscar Fay Grimes Scholarship for 2012
Katy attends the University of Maryland at College Park.

Tyler Cohen is the winner of the Lawrence Vernon Leitch Memorial Scholarship for 2012. Tyler attends the University of Maryland at College Park.

Matthew Cobb is the winner of the Wood Memorial Scholarship for 2012. Matt graduated from South River High School in 2012 and will be attending the University of Delaware.

Hayley Cohen is the winner of the Rev. Paul Cummins Memorial Scholarship for 2012. Hayley graduated from Indian Creek Upper School in 2012 and will be attending Goucher College.

Chad Moeslein is the winner of the William Scrimgeour Scholarship for 2012. Chad graduated from South River High School in 2012 and will attend the U.S. Coast Guard Academy or the University of Maryland.

Griffith Howie is the winner of the Brandon Weil Foundation Memorial Scholarship for 2012. Griff graduated from South River High School in 2012 and will be attending the University of South Alabama.

Emily Cobb is the winner of the Hopkins Memorial Scholarship for 2012. Emily attends the University of Maryland at College Park.

Jenna Rice is the winner of the Methodist Women's Scholarship for 2012. Jenna has completed a year at Anne Arundel Community College and will be attending the University of North Carolina School of the Arts in August.

Stewardship – It Lasts All Year

As you all know we conducted our Stewardship Drive last Fall. The results are below:

Based on the pledge cards received, we knew that we were only covering 55% of the proposed 2012 budget. We were missing cards from 80 families. Finance is now projecting a twenty thousand dollar shortfall by the end of summer at the current giving levels. I am writing this to remind you of the pledges that were made and those that were not. I ask that you continue your generous giving through these upcoming summer months. One reason we may fall behind is that many of you will be going away on vacations and thus missing a Sunday or two. I know it is easy to forget to “double-up” once you are back and filling out that check or stuffing an envelope on your return. We have a program in place now that will automatically send your pledge to the Church from your checking account on a weekly or monthly basis. Forms for this are available in the Church office or from the Finance Committee. I’m sure many of you are using similar options to pay your bills from home and I would encourage you to sign up for this.

Please join the ranks of the 59 pledge cards received. Show God that you recognize that all that you have comes from Him and that He deserves your “first fruit”. Through you, our Church will continue to grow its’ many ministries and continue to serve those in our community and world.

2012 STEWARDSHIP PLEDGE RESULTS

On Consecration Sunday 59 pledge cards were received; of these, 44 or 75% STEPPED UP their giving. This is the largest percentages of Step Up givers we have had since 2008 and the largest dollar increase ever, allowing for continuation of our current ministries in 2012. Praise be to God! For those of you who have made these commitments, we thank you.

To the 80 Giving Families who have not yet made a pledge commitment, we provide this urgent appeal. Unless you Step Up your giving, the church will not be able to support proposed new ministries, So please prayerfully consider increasing your 2012 giving.

ALL ABOUT THE MUSIC

Friends,

The topic of what style of music is appropriate for Christian worship is one I deal with every day in my chosen vocation of music minister. We are blessed with both a fairly tolerant congregation and a music ministry which includes Esther, Kyle and myself who come from different musical backgrounds and are able to blend our talents in praising His name. I stumbled upon an article recently, that I would like to reprint here over the next few Lamplighters, which succinctly addresses the issue of proper musical style in church.

When Music Splits Churches

A Broadcast Presented by E. Lonnie Melashenko

Four words are ripping through churches today--four words that pit one Christian against another, dividing parent and child, husband and wife, youth group and senior citizens. And the four words are these: "I hate that music!"

All across North America, and around the world, music has become the great dividing line for Christian churches. Congregations have multiple services based on the style of music--traditional, praise and worship, contemporary--and the type of accompaniment--piano and organ, or synthesizers, guitars, and drums.

Churches are splitting down the middle. Members are yelling at each other and at their pastors. Some believers leave--for a church that has their preferred music, or they simply stay home and enjoy the music they like on their own CD players.

Bill Johnsson, editor of the Adventist Review, recently led into an insightful editorial on this subject: "If there's a topic guaranteed to make young saints angry and old saints apoplectic, it's this one--contemporary Christian music."

Dr. Michael S. Hamilton, professor of history at Notre Dame University, writes in Christianity Today, "American churchgoers no longer sort themselves out by denomination so much as by musical preference" (cover article, July 12, 1999).

More and more, people aren't deciding to attend a particular church because of its teachings and doctrinal perspectives, but because of the kind of music it does or doesn't have.

In fact, if you check the newspaper religion section or leaf through the Yellow Pages in many communities, you'll see at the very top of display ads: "Lively contemporary music," or "We sing the traditional favorites."

Will There Be Two Heavens?

One of these days, in the sweet by and by, will there be two heavens--one for those who want stained glass and a pipe organ, the other for those who want to play electric guitars on the sea of glass?

Let's note a couple of points from probably the most musical book in the Bible. King David has this to say in Psalm 147: "How good it is to sing praises to our God, how pleasant and fitting to praise Him!"

We can't argue with that. Music in the sanctuary is meant to give praise to God. Whether it's by Fanny Crosby or Jars of Clay, religious music should say to God, "We love You. We worship You. We adore You. We want to live our lives in obedience to You, Jesus." Music in church should give us joy and happiness; it should satisfy our souls and give us a spirit of heaven.

If music at church is making you angry, then something is seriously wrong.

But now go back just 14 verses to another psalm, also by David. This is Psalm 133, and he opens with this observation: "How good and pleasant it is when brothers live together in unity!"

What about that? A church may prayerfully decide to split its worship six ways and allow different praise styles and musical genres in those six new mini-congregations . . . but that decision, that vote, should be made in a spirit of happy, cheerful unity.
