#### **DON'T BE A SILO!**

Fall is my favorite season. There are so many fall traditions that I look forward to each year such as taking the girls to pick out pumpkins and carving jack-o-lanterns, watching "Charlie Brown Halloween" and college football. One of the most enjoyable fall rituals for me is a one-day drive to the mountains to witness the rich color of a North Carolina autumn. Now I am closer to those mountains then I used to be!

When you take those drives, you begin to notice the landscape, and especially the farms you pass. The structures that are scattered on the land of a farm have a nostalgic affect. Rustic barns make beautiful displays on a vibrant fall stage. Long spans of wooden fencing with cows grazing in the crisp fall air make for a comforting scene. Maybe you notice an old tractor that is stationed like a sentry on guard, its rusty bronze complexion blends into the yellows, oranges, and reds of the trees. One of the most beautiful sights in these vivid pastoral scenes is a silo. Silos can be found standing alone, or in clusters of two or three. These tall cylinders could be full of stored grain as they stand out on the landscape of a vibrant autumn day.

Recently, the term "silo" has come to reference more than just gigantic storage bins. It is also used to describe a way people relate, or don't relate, to one another. Silos are people, or small groups, who do not connect with the larger organization of which they are a part. When people engage in "silo behavior" they stay isolated from others, they don't take risks; they don't become vulnerable with the group. When they are involved it is only for self-serving purposes.

We can become silos in our approach to the Christian life. A few years ago in *Parade Magazine*, it was reported that new polls show Americans getting more isolated in their spiritual life. People frequently say that they are "spiritual but not religious". Church attendance is one of those things classified as "religious". The article stated, "*Twenty percent of respondents said they go to services anywhere from once a month to a few times a year. Combine them with the 50% who rarely or never attend, and an interesting contrast appears. Although 45% of respondents considered themselves religious, 70% of them said they participate in organized religion sporadically or not at all. That means one-third of the people who identified themselves as religious were only minimally connected to traditional worship."* 

We are all aware of family, friends, or neighbors who claim to know Christ, but not the church. Many of these folks never seek out Christian community and thus become silos, but what about those *in* the church? Silos on the farm are often clustered in twos or threes. On any given Sunday, a group of people attending worship could be nothing more than a cluster of silos. These silos enter in with smiles and friendly "hellos", they sit near each other as they take in some 'seed' and maybe tuck it away in their own self, and after some more smiles and friendly "goodbyes" they politely leave the building. Anyone of us can become a silo, cut off from others and protective of ourselves. Often the root cause of this is fear, and it cripples the churches' full potential to fulfill its mission. This is not what Jesus had in mind when he told his disciples, "My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you." (John 15:12). When we live such self-contained spiritual lives we not only miss the guidance and support of a body of believers, we miss out on a means of grace. God touches our lives through others.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "Therefore, the Christian needs another Christian who speaks God's Word to him. He needs him again and again when he becomes uncertain and discouraged, for by himself he cannot help himself without belying the truth. He needs his brother man as a bearer and proclaimer of the divine word of salvation. He needs his brother solely because of Jesus Christ. The Christ in his own heart is weaker than the Christ in the word of his brother; his own heart is uncertain, his brother's is sure" (from Life Together)

There is a new landscape in our culture today of privatized spirituality. We must have serious conversations about this trend, and how it can affect our outreach here at Deep Creek, but we also must have conversations about how silo religion can affect our "inreach", our life together. This is one reason we will be beginning a study of the book *I Am A Church Member* this month along with a sermon series. There is a lot we can all learn about what being a church member can mean for our community, our church family, and ourselves. One thing this study and sermon series will emphasize is that we are not meant to be Christians alone.

Silos must be broken. In fact, it often takes brokenness for our guarded, controlled lives to flow out into the lives of others. So, reach out to another Deep Creek friend this week. Make a habit of doing it every week. Talk about our wonderful Savior together and commune with Him together in prayer. Get a copy of *I Am A Church Member* and start reading it. Then when you take that trip to the mountains this fall, enjoy the silos, but vow not to be one.



#### Meditation by Jared Warden

Last week I did something that I used to do and have not had the chance to do in a while. I went to lunch by myself. It is a great time to notice things that you don't normally see when other people are in your party. One of my favorite things to do is to observe people and their interactions. As I sat and ate lunch, I noticed two elderly couples in the booths beside of me. I had been in line behind them while ordering my food. I watched as they received their food and then proceeded to assist each other to get their drinks and condiments. It was neat to see that in their frailty, they relied on each other to accomplish the "simplest" of tasks.

After we had all received our food, I found myself seated at a small table directly beside each of the couples' booths. We all began to eat and I observed their actions. I noticed that they strangely ate their lunch in complete silence. At first I saw an awkward lunch setting that involved no human interaction and it appeared that neither of them was present in the moment. After further observation, I quickly realized I was wrong. They were more in the moment than met the general on-looking eye. They looked at all the world around them and would often meet back in the middle to see each other eye to eye. In that moment there was a gentle and ever so subtle smile and they would return to eating and observing.

The Lord taught me much through this very routine portion of the day. First, there is more to life than what meets the general observing eye. We often see only surface level and don't take the time to really observe anyone on a deeper level. It is there that we find the diamonds! Second, the Lord showed me that there were content hearts at the meal. They were completely content with each other and did not need unnecessary chatter in their time together. They were completely in tune with each other and comfortable enough to just be there. Third, he showed me that in our weakness, we must lean on others, much like the elderly couples relied on each other.

As I pondered the things the Lord showed me through this everyday encounter, I was convicted of my time with the Lord. I began to wonder if I was completely content just being with the Lord in silence. Did I still make time for the silence with him? Was I content and happy in the silence? Had I learned to use silence as a time to lean on God? All of these questions ran through my mind at the lunch table that day. The answer to many of the questions was "no!" I had not given him the time to be silent with him, I had rarely been content for more than a quick prayer thrown up to him and I wasn't leaning on him like I should. As I was convicted, the Holy Spirit gave me the scripture from Psalm 46:10 to "be still and know that I am God." I hadn't been completely still in my time with the Lord and that needed to change. I began to think about his works and his word and the Lord reminded me that Elijah heard the Lord in a "still small voice." If we are to be completely content with the Lord, we have to be completely silent at times and he will reveal more of himself to us. He will help us during these times when we need someone to lean on and he will show us more than we see on the surface. He will speak to us.

### Will They Let Me Play?

At a fundraising dinner for a school that serves children with learning disabilities, the father of one of the students delivered a speech that would never be forgotten by all who attended. After extolling the school and its dedicated staff, he offered a question: When not interfered with by outside influences, everything nature does, is done with perfection. Yet my son, Shay, cannot learn things as other children do. He cannot understand things as other children do. Where is the natural order of things in my son?

The audience was stilled by the query.

The father continued... I believe that when a child like Shay, who was mentally and physically disabled, comes into the world, an opportunity to realize true human nature presents itself, and it comes in the way other people treat that child.

Then he told the following story:

Shay and I had walked past a park where some boys Shay knew were playing baseball.

Shay asked, "Do you think they'll let me play?" I knew that most of the boys would not want someone like Shay on their team, but as a father I also understood that if my son were allowed to play, it would give him a muchneeded sense of belonging and some confidence to be accepted by others in spite of his handicaps.

I approached one of the boys on the field and asked (not expecting much) if Shay could play. The boy looked around for guidance and said, "We're losing by six runs and the game is in the eighth inning. I guess he can be on our team and we'll try to put him in to bat in the ninth inning."

Shay struggled over to the team's bench and, with a broad smile, put on a team shirt. I watched with a small tear in my eye and warmth in my heart. The boys saw my joy at my son being accepted.

In the bottom of the eighth inning, Shay's team scored a few runs but was still behind by three.

In the top of the ninth inning, Shay put on a glove and played in the right field. Even though no hits came his way, he was obviously ecstatic just to be in the game and on the field, grinning from ear to ear as I waved to him from the stands.

In the bottom of the ninth inning, Shay's team scored again. Now, with two outs and the bases loaded, the potential winning run was on base and Shay was scheduled to be next at bat. At this juncture, do they let Shay bat and give away their chance to win the game?

Surprisingly, Shay was given the bat. Everyone knew that a hit was all but impossible because Shay didn't even know how to hold the bat properly, much less connect with the ball. However, as Shay stepped up to the plate, the pitcher, recognizing that the other team was putting winning aside for this moment in Shay's life, moved in a few steps to lob the ball in softly so Shay could at least make contact.

The first pitch came and Shay swung clumsily and missed. The pitcher again took a few steps forward

to toss the ball softly towards Shay. As the pitch came in, Shay swung at the ball and hit a slow ground ball right back to the pitcher.

The game would now be over.

The pitcher picked up the soft grounder and could have easily thrown the ball to the first baseman. Shay would have been out and that would have been the end of the game.

Instead, the pitcher threw the ball right over the first baseman's head, out of reach of all teammates.

Everyone from the stands and both teams started yelling, "Shay, run to first! Run to first!"

Never in his life had Shay ever run that far, but he made it to first base. He scampered down the baseline, wide-eyed and startled.

Everyone yelled, "Run to second, run to second!" Catching his breath, Shay awkwardly ran towards second, gleaming and struggling to make it to the base.

By the time Shay rounded towards second base, the right fielder had the ball. The smallest guy on their team now had his first chance to be the hero for his team. He could have thrown the ball to the second-baseman for the tag, but he understood the pitcher's intentions so he, too, intentionally threw the ball high and far over the third-baseman's head.

Shay ran toward third base deliriously as the runners ahead of him circled the bases toward home. All were screaming, "Shay, Shay, Shay, all the way Shay!"

Shay reached third base because the opposing shortstop ran to help him by turning him in direction of third base, and shouted, "Run to third! Shay, run to third!"

As Shay rounded third, the boys from both teams, and the spectators, were on their feet screaming, "Shay, run home!

Run home!" Shay ran to home, stepped on the plate, and was cheered as the hero who hit the grand slam and won the game for his team.



That day, said the father softly with tears now rolling down his face, the boys from both teams helped bring a piece of true love and humanity into this world.

Shay didn't make it to another summer. He died that winter, having never forgotten being the hero and making me so happy and coming home and seeing his Mother tearfully embrace her little hero of the day!



I share this example that she taught her granddaughter.

When Harper Elizabeth Watson, great granddaughter of Ethel Smith, was diagnosed with gastroesophageal reflux, lactose intolerance and failure to thrive, Julie, her mom, used lessons learned from her grandmother Ethel.

One lesson was not to waste. Julie had been saving breast-milk by freezing it in preparation for going back to work. The reflux and lactose intolerance prevented Harper from using the breast-milk. She was placed on a special formula. After six tries, one was found she could tolerate. Special bottles designed to reduce reflux were used. Julie, not wanting to waste the frozen milk, searched and found an organization, "Human Milk for Human Babies". She donated 156 ounces of breast-milk and delivered it by cooler to a mother with a baby in need of human milk in her area of Columbia, South Carolina.



The second lesson from Grandmother Ethel was to always help others. Julie continues not to waste and donated formula and diapers to help babies in Yadkin County. Harper was one year old on August 8. She is healthy and thriving. Thank you for your prayers. Thank Grandma Ethel for good lessons taught by example.

#### NEW MEMBERS ARE WELCOMED




Sarah and Steve Hutchens received the Right Hand of Fellowship August 9. Steve grew
