Bankruptcy of Mere Tolerance

Our present society puts a lot of emphasis on being tolerant. Interestingly, the words "tolerance," and "tolerant" have taken new and fuller meaning recently. But originally to tolerate someone simply meant to put up with someone without restraining them, preventing them or intervening. This is probably what most people think of when they think of tolerance. The average person would probably believe tolerating someone means to respect their opinion without belittling them in some way.

Many speak highly of tolerance.

The highest result of education is tolerance. Hellen Keller

Tolerance implies no lack of commitment to one's own beliefs. Rather it condemns the oppression or persecution of others. John F. Kennedy

Compassion and tolerance are not a sign of weakness, but a sign of strength. Dalai Lama

But even with the most charitable definition tolerance falls well short of the Christian ethic.

Why? Because tolerance is indifferent. Christians are not called to be indifferent. We are called to "love your neighbor as yourself." There is a big difference between tolerance and love. Tolerance gives me permission to non-action.

See a Muslim at the grocery store? Tolerance says, "Let him be. Leave him alone." But love says, "Pursue... rescue... engage."

A family member living in sin? Tolerance says, "Leave them alone. Don't bother them." But love does not rejoice in wrongdoing. Love rejoices in truth (1 Corinthians 13:6). We are to speak truth in love, not remain silent. While tolerance encourages non-action. Love requires action.

We must not be deceived into the secular mindset that to love someone means to be quiet. That is not love. God is love. And God is not silent. God is not inactive. The cross and the empty tomb bear witness to that.
