# From the Pastor

## Church Membership... A Biblical Point of View

One of the responsibilities of an Interim Pastor is to work with the staff to "clean up" the congregational rolls to more accurately reflect the congregation's current membership. As part of this work, I've spent a lot of time thinking about what it really *means* to be a church "member". As you can probably guess—church "membership" is actually a topic for which many people have many different opinions.

There are some who would say that local church membership is not something you find in the Bible. They would quote Romans 12:5, "so we. who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually, we are members one of another". To many this describes the Church with a capital "C"-or what we might call the "global Church". No matter what "brand" of Christian we claim, we are all part of the Body of Christ on earth—the "big C"—Church.

Others might focus on the "house churches" that grew throughout the time of the apostles. We especially see this reflected in the writings of the Apostle Paul. Some claim that there was no formal membership in a local church at that time, but I think there may be some evidence that the early Christians had some idea of membership in these "house churches."

In Paul's letter to Philemon, he writes regarding a former servant of Philemon's named Onesimus. Paul is doing everything he can to have Onesimus accepted back into the "house church"; including reminding Philemon how much he owes Paul...

If he (Onesimus) has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul...will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. (Philemon 1:18-19)

This passage seems suggest some sort of protocol for belonging to a local church, even a first century "house church".

According to the Book of the Acts of the Apostles (2:42-47), church activities included the following practices - believers met with the apostles daily for teaching, fellowship, breaking bread, and for prayer. So if you were a Christian in the early church, you were instructed daily by someone who could teach with you some theological authority.

We also see other expectations of those who belonged to these early church communities:

- Believers sold their possessions;
- They distributed the proceeds to all, and to any who had need;
- They spent time together in worship;
- They broke bread at home, and ate with glad and generous hearts:
- They praised God, and
- They kept in mind the good will of all people.

The word Ekklesia—from the original Greek word which we translate as church—appears in the New Testament 114 times, mostly in the writings of Paul. Ekklesia literally means "a gathering of people, an assembly."

It's worth noting the word *synagogue* also means "a gathering of people, an assembly," and appears 56 times in the New Testament, 34 of which are in the Gospels.

What we need to understand is that for the 1<sup>st</sup> century Church, the *theological call of church membership* was that disciples were sent to make disciples. Believers were sent to proclaim God's Word, to baptize and teach, and to serve those in need, so that all might come to know God's love and become followers of Jesus Christ. In so doing, local churches were created as the blessed outcome of the disciples reaching out to others; which brings us to the reason God created the Church—the most important point of what it means to truly *be church*.

The real test of membership for any church is our call to **discipleship**—the **Biblical principal** for people who become believers in Jesus Christ...

- 1. Disciples are involved in the Church's mission
- 2. They participate in the church's upkeep
- 3. They adhere to the church's beliefs
- 4. They live a faithful life, and
- 5. They continue to study God's Word

(After all, "disciple" means to be a **student** who assists in spreading the teachings of another...in our case, the teachings of Jesus Christ).

In other words, disciples are those called to <u>build</u> <u>up</u> the church, both locally and globally...caring for and up-keeping both the local congregation <u>and</u> the "capital C" *Church* —in all its missions & ministries.

The Apostle Paul tells us that being a *member* of a church includes being:

- People who are caring Romans 12; 1 Cor 12
- People who share the burdens of others
   Galatians 6:2; 1 Cor 12:26
- People who encourage one another 1 Cor 14;
   Romans 1:12
- People who serve one another 1 Cor 12:7
- People who submit to Christ Ephesians 5
- People who pray for one another 2 Cor 1& 9
- People who love one another Romans 13:8
- People who give offerings to the church's work and mission – Philippians 4:18

Being a "member" of both a local church <u>and</u> the "Big C" Church is a commitment which means much more than just having our name in a roll book; much more than having been baptized or confirmed in a certain place that we call "church".

It means living a faithful life as an active part of a faith community; it means continuing to study God's Word and growing in our faith; it means living out

our call to advocate for & serve those in need, and it means accepting the responsibility, along with the gifts, that come with the privilege of being a disciple of Jesus - and a member of God's Church.



### From the Parish Nurse

As far back as I can remember, February has been designated as "Cardiovascular Month". This is the month when various health organizations focus on cardiovascular education, information on ground-breaking research, and training programs such as CPR and AED. This year the American Heart Association's campaign slogan is "Love your Heart".

They state that on Valentine's Day 2018, 2,200 Americans will die from heart disease and stroke. Many of these deaths could be prevented if people were aware of the early signs of stroke and heart disease.



According to the National Stroke Association, people who experience symptoms of T.I.A. (Transient Ischemic Attack) often do not seek medical attention because they attribute these symptoms to other causes or the symptoms occur for such a brief period of time, they ignore them. So they have coined the acronym F.A.S.T. It stands for these symptoms: Facial drooping, Arm weakness, Speech difficulties and Time. If one is experiencing these symptoms, call 911 immediately. This is essential because there are medications, when given quickly, that can minimize the effects of a stroke and the person may have a better outcome. The Cleveland Clinic reports that by identifying mini strokes early, a person will be able to prevent future strokes by making life style changes. These changes include stop smoking, exercise, weight loss, and reduction of high cholesterol and high blood pressure.

Stroke is one of the cardiovascular diseases; heart attacks the other. The warning signs of a heart attack include discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes or that goes away and comes back. One may also have discomfort in other parts of the upper body including one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw, or stomach. One may also experience shortness of breath, cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness. Women may present differently. Women's most common symptoms are more likely to be shortness of breath, nausea, vomiting and back and jaw pain. If any of these symptoms occur, call 911 immediately.

Cardiac arrest is the sudden unexpected loss of heart function, breathing and consciousness. It results in an electrical disturbance in the heart that disrupts its pumping action and stops the flow of blood to the rest of the body. This is truly a medical emergency. To enhance the chances of survival, CPR, defibrillation (AED) or just chest compressions

must be started immediately. The American Red Cross estimates that it usually takes EMS personnel 8-10 minutes to respond to a cardiac event; however, if an AED is available and people are trained to use it, that response time is four minutes—saving around 50,000 lives yearly. The AED analyzes the heart's rhythm; and delivers an electric shock known as defibrillation that helps establish an effective cardiac rhythm.

In 2011, Emanuel purchased an AED. It is located on the wall next to the door to the church office. A First Aid Kit is attached above the AED. At the time of purchase several parishioners and staff were trained in the use of the AED and CPR. It has been seven years since we did the last training and several trained personnel are no longer with us. So it is time that we review our present emergency procedures and policies and identify people who are willing to be AED and CPR trained. 

# **Transition Times**

From Pastor Maria Hammons

Dear Friends in Christ...

Our transition journey has officially begun ... here's the latest!

At our town meeting on Sunday, January 14, we began our conversation about Emanuel's transition process. After a description of the why and how of the intentional interim and transition process, a timeline for the transition was handed out. (A copy of the timeline is included on page 5 of this



newsletter.) While the transition timeline and schedule have been set, it is possible that it may have to be adapted if weather impedes our progress, or if we find we need more time to discuss/resolve issues that arise in our conversations together.

During our conversation, some of those present wondered if there was a reason for the extended timeline and if this was something special that only Emanuel was going through. I explained that this is a process most ELCA congregations of any size have participated in over the last 15 years or so. The goal is to allow time for the Emanuel congregation to discern where God is leading you for this next part of your faith journey; to begin to define a vision - your faith-filled identity & purpose for today and for the future; and to assist with the pastoral call process in order to help match Emanuel with a pastor who has complimentary gifts & similar passions for mission.

I also introduced the topic we'll be discussing at our **next town meeting on Sunday**, **February 11**<sup>th</sup>, **after Worship**. At that meeting we will have a conversation about your hopes & dreams, as well as your fears & concerns for Emanuel's future. That discussion will then continue in small group gatherings during March and April. Look for more information regarding the dates, times, and locations of the small group meetings in the March newsletter. I hope you are able to join us for at least one of these discussions to share your thoughts, concerns, and insights.

I know the transition process is new for Emanuel. I also understand that this is a time of anxiety about your future as a congregation and who your next pastor will be. While some of you are excited about the process, the conversation, and the possibilities...others of you are less excited, and may even be frustrated. That's certainly understandable.

My hope is that you will stick with us through the process—continuing to attend the meetings and participate in the discussions. And then, when we come to the end, I hope you might feel that it was a worthwhile time of congregational self-reflection that led to your having a better idea of who you are called to be as a faith community today and in the future. I also hope that it will help you call a pastor who shares your vision and compliments your gifts and call to mission.

Please know I will do my best to lead you through this process in a faithful and caring way – and you can trust that we will all be guided by the Holy Spirit along the way.

Please join us for these conversations. Not only is it easier to relay information in person, but it gives us a chance to have a discussion, for you to have a voice in the process, and for me to answer your questions and hear your ideas and concerns.

We are blessed to be a blessing! Trusting that God will lead us and show us the way!
