How can we rejoice in our sufferings?

What is it that we know?

Three things:

• We know that tribulation brings about ______ (v. 3b)
• We know that perseverance brings about ______ (v. 4b)
• We know that proven character brings about ______ (v. 4b)

But doesn't suffering do the opposite? Doesn't it make you doubt God's love? No, not at all. Look at Paul's argument. The sequence is tribulation to perseverance to character to hope. And then Paul adds, "And hope does not put us to shame..." Why? What is the ultimate foundation on which our Christian hope rests?

Principle: suffering is the best context in which to become assured of God's love.

So now the big question is: how can we know God loves us? How can we be sure of God's love (and therefore know that our hope will not be disappointed)?

This is what **Romans 5:5-8** is all about...

Second "angle" – look at what Paul teaches us here:

1. He points to the need of God's love.

Take note of the ways that our need is described in these verses. How needy were we?

2. He points to the timing of God's love.

How does Paul describe God's timing?

- 3. Paul points to an exchange that has taken place
- 4. Paul points to the proof of God's love.

Christopher Ash: "It is the past tense proof of the love God has for us. The Spirit (v. 5) takes this past tense proof and brings it home to our hearts in the present tense, so that we know here and now that God loves us."

Michael Eaton lists a number of things that can help us if we haven't experienced God's love for us:

- 1. Begin by trusting in the blood of Jesus Christ.
- 2. Are you grieving the Spirit?
- 3. Live by the promise of **John 7:37-39**. "If any person is thirsty let Him come to me and drink...Out of his innermost being shall flow rivers of living water."

For further discussion

- How is God's love in Jesus deeper than any human love?
