## **UMCOR SUNDAY**

(formerly One Great Hour of Sharing)
March 31, 2019

For more than 50 years, United Methodist congregations have been taking part in a special **UMCOR Sunday** offering, which will be **March 31, 2019**, thereby laying the foundation for UMCOR's ministry of relief and hope.

The Methodist Committee on Relief was created by the Methodist Church in 1940 in response to refugee needs arising from World War II. What began as a temporary relief program became a permanent part of The United Methodist Church in 1972. Renamed the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), since that time it has remained a unit of the General Board of Global Ministries.

Today, UMCOR supports work in more than 80 countries. UMCOR's work includes programs and projects in disaster response, health, sustainable agriculture, food security, relief supplies, and more.

Yes, 100 percent of contributions designated by donors go directly to the designated program. UMCOR uses other funding channels to cover non-program related activities such administrative overhead or communications. One source of that type of funding is the UMCOR Sunday offering.

Donations received by UMCOR through the UMCOR SUNDAY offering, along with other undesignated gifts made throughout the year, cover our costs of doing business. Gifts like yours make it possible for UMCOR to use 100% of all other contributions on the projects our donors specify, instead of on administrative or fundraising costs.

**UMCOR** does not receive United Methodist World Service or apportionment funds, so without your offerings, UMCOR would not exist.

Because we keep operating costs under 10% of our total budget, undesignated gifts may actually exceed UMCOR's administrative needs. When that happens, your support is channeled to underfunded programs, where they're most needed. They also may be used to allow UMCOR to respond to disasters immediately after an event and before funds can be raised.

Because of your donation today, we're ready to respond in times of crisis. UMCOR HAS BEEN REBUILDING HOPE FOR NEARLY 80 YEARS, AND WE THANK YOU FOR BEING A PART OF THIS LEGACY.

Do No Harm.

Do all the Good you Can.

Keep the ordinances of God (also often known as, "Stay in Love with God").

These are the three general rules of The United Methodist Church. They are guidelines that should influence every decision we make, every ministry we are a part of, every step of our growth and discipleship. They are intended to work in connection to one another: we cannot do good, if we are doing harm. We are not working in and sharing the love of God, if we are not actively seeking to go over and above to do all the good we can. To live in faith, and to practice that faith through our United Methodist lens, is to seek to faithfully live in accordance with these rules.

There are countless ways we live into this. We seek to grow and stay in love with God through our weekly studies and Sunday/Wednesday school, through worship, and through countless other ministries including United Methodist Women, our congregational care ministry, mission/service projects, and more.

Our commitment to doing all the good we can is closely tied to our mission statement, "To make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

In order to make disciples — we first have to *be* disciples. How are you living into your disciple-ship? How are you doing no harm, doing all the good you can, and loving God, in order to bring about positive transformation to the world?

This Lenten season, I have been reflecting on these three rules. I have been reflecting on the hurt and pain and harm that we experience — and take part in. I have been praying through and wondering how my actions — and inactions — contribute to the corporate sins that happen all around us. I have been praying that God would give me courage and wisdom to step up and be a voice against the pain and harm in our world.

That's why when I heard of yet another fatal mass shooting in a house of worship — most recently in Muslim mosques in New Zealand, I couldn't help but to think... we — you and I — are a part of the harm. Every time we hear someone use hateful rhetoric and don't speak up, we are doing harm. When we encounter racism, sexism, ableism, classism, or any other sort of -ism... and we do not stand against it: we are doing harm. We are allowing those who believe some persons are different and better than others. Yet Jesus teaches us that we are to love <u>all</u> of our neighbors. He teaches us that we are to care for "the least of these" — whoever that may be in our lives, communities, or world.

Since Jesus uses the word "love" in an active way (as a verb), I cannot help but to see that to do no harm is not about *inaction*. Rather, it is about how we choose to pair doing no harm, with *active-ly* doing good. To do good is to act — and often, it is to act with courage and boldness. With God as our guide, I can imagine no better way to do good than to take some risks by speaking up with and for the persecuted in our midst. Those who are different from us, those who are in need, those who are being persecuted (such as Muslims in the above mentioned hate crime).

To stand against hate, is to stand for love. To love God, to act against doing harm, and to do good. With this in mind, I invite you to join me today in renewing your commitment to living into these three rules. One way to do so, is to start by praying to God and seeking forgiveness for places we

have fallen short in the past. Please pray with me:

Holy God, forgive us for all the ways we have fallen short. Forgive us for times we have done harm, have not honored you, and have turned away from you. For all we have said and done, O God, and for all we have failed to say or do: forgive us.

As we seek your forgiveness, help us to use this gift to turn anew toward you. Guide us onto right paths of action as we seek to be faithful with our words, actions, and deeds. May these our prayers not be empty words, O God, but acts of repentance that lead us toward actions of great love in the days to come. Help us to care for our neighbors, to stand against hatred, and to see all we encounter through your eyes of love and grace. We pray all these things by the power of the Holy Spirit, in the name of Jesus Christ, your Son. Amen.


