
One Great Hour of Sharing Offering Sunday, March 29th

Purpose

The One Great Hour of Sharing is an offering that makes the love of Christ real for individuals and communities around the world who suffer the effects of disaster, conflict, or severe economic hardship, and for those who serve them through gifts of money and time. Today, projects are underway in more than 100 countries, including the United States and Canada. While specific allocations differ in each denomination, all use their One Great Hour of Sharing funds to make possible disaster relief, refugee assistance, development aid and more.

History

Since its beginning in 1949, One Great Hour of Sharing has been an ecumenical effort. Currently, the One Great Hour of Sharing committee officially comprises nine Christian

Church World Service, a division of the National Council of Churches, with overseas partner churches and church councils, is often the first on the scene following a disaster of natural or human origin. Session Update

Your Session has been busy over the past two months! In addition to their regularly scheduled meeting on the first Wednesday in February, on Saturday, January 24th, at the Church of the Covenant in University Circle, the elders had a visioning retreat, where in addition to learning more about one another, they also agreed upon a new vision statement for our congregation that will be unveiled in the Spring. This new vision statement, along with our core values, will shape our congregation's ministry and mission in the years to come. At the retreat the Session also set goals for the coming year. They are:

To formulate a plan for the building and grounds that supports the church's new vision for ministry and mission.

To communicate with the congregation regarding the new governance structure and its implications.

To grow the church's mission programs.

To plan Fairmount's 100-Year Anniversary celebrations for the Fall of 2016.

Please keep your called and elected leaders in your prayers as they continue to discern God's will for our community. Also, be on the lookout for more opportunities to participate in the new governance structure through the ministries of the Care, Faith Formation, and Serve councils.

Saying goodbye to a staff member is never easy. At a special Session meeting in February the elders concurred with the personnel committee's recommendation that we terminate Anthony Sorace as our Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries. The reason for Anthony's dismissal is simply that he failed to reach the stated benchmarks for performance that were identified as necessary to ensure the vitality of our youth and young adult ministry programs. Anthony's love for the youth and passion for God were evident from day one, but it was discerned that a change was needed. Session will continue to pray for Anthony's transition and for the future of our youth and young adult programs, and they ask that you do the same. The foundation is strong and the potential is great for a dynamic, vital youth and young adult ministry at the church, and your leadership is already in discussions about what's next for these two important groups.

Budget Update:

Dear Fairmount Friends and Members,

I'd like to take an opportunity to share some news about our 2015 Operating Budget. We continue to refine and adjust our budgeting process to better reflect the diverse and dynamic life of the church. Our goal to create an accurate, easy-to-understand, and thoughtful budget, is being realized more and more. The Session has approved a 2015 Operating Budget, and I would like to point out a few of the features that were included. A detailed budget can be found on-line at www.fairmountchurch.org, under the link 'session resources.'

Expense Budget Groupings: We have realigned our expense groupings based on the new governance structure. To the extent possible, budget lines will be owned by the Council that controls those expenses. This should help our new Councils to collaborate and communicate more efficiently about results of operations. These groups are: Administration, Personnel, Care, Faith Formation, Faith Formation – Music, Serve, and Session.

Critical Cuts: Our overall expense budget *decreased* from 2014, based on the staffing changes and greater efficiencies in our Administration costs. This is noteworthy, in consideration of...

Values Based Increases: From 2014 to 2015, we have *increased our Serve budget by over 80%* (from \$31,200 to \$56,550)! This amount represents 4.2% of our total expenses in 2015, as we move closer to Session's goal of 10% of the annual expense budget being allocated for mission. In addition, we have made targeted, incremental increases in the areas of Care and Faith Formation, which represent our commitment to supporting the well-being of our Fairmount community.

Current Year Funding: This year, we chose to simplify our revenue prediction into a "Current Year Operating Income" item. Our goal for this amount will be based on our non-operating income (e.g. – the recommended Endowment draws) less our anticipated expenses. Based on this method, we require \$900,000 in total operating funds for 2015. Rather than refer to this as our "deficit," we hope that discussing a single, transparent funding goal will help us to challenge ourselves to fund our current needs in the current year.

This is a budget that reflects who we are as a congregation, and it builds on the hopes of where we would like to go. We are committed to living into the values that our leadership has defined. By recognizing all of the ways that you contribute to the life of the church and challenging ourselves to meet our calling, we can see our church flourish. I am excited about the opportunity to be a part of the process, and I hope you are too!

Volunteers Needed for "Apostle's Build"


This year Fairmount will be participating in an APOSTLE'S BUILD with Habitat for Humanity and up to 11 other churches to rebuild a home with a homeowner.

Participating in this Apostle's Build will provide Fairmount members many benefits:

- This is a tangible way to put our faith into action in our community with opportunities for service for our members of all ages.
- Habitat has a proven track record of empowering their Partner Families who become homeowners. Partner Families
 receive training in home construction/rehabilitation, basic home maintenance, finances and budgeting. They also
 volunteer to help other families.
- The project has a definite beginning and an end.

This Apostle's Build with Habitat for Humanity will take place in the Stockyards Neighborhood, which is between West 50th and West 52nd Streets and between Storer and Denison Avenue, which is a largely-Hispanic neighborhood.

Members Cindy Barker and Charlie Forsberg have agreed to be Fairmount's Team Coordinators for this project. We are still in the planning stages for this marvelous opportunity to serve together, but it's not too early to indicate your interest. Volunteers Needed for "Scratch"

The following is the Minute for Mission 18-year old Will Brant delivered in worship on February 8th. Please read this amazing witness and consider how you might be able to help with this new mission effort.

Will Brant is a senior at Chagrin Falls High School, and a member of the Fairmount Youth Group.

"I love to cook. When I was eleven years old, I founded and still own a BBQ catering company called Over the Moon BBQ. Cooking has opened many doors and given me many things, the most important is the confidence in myself to create.

I learned the way to learn to cook BBQ because an amazing father and son team gave me the opportunity to learn the art of cooking. I want to do the same thing for other kids, to share my experience and help other 11-year-olds gain experience and confidence in themselves to create; that is why I am here today.

In partnership with the SERVE Council I have created a little cooking movement over at the Heights Youth Club called SCRATCH. It is inspired by how cooks that are comfortable in the kitchen, got that way. By cooking, by tasting, by trying, by tinkering and by having a place to grow into smarter, happier and better cooks.

My brother, Jimmy, and I will be leading an eight week session with each class lasting about an hour. Each student will make something for themselves during the class.

The dishes and our delivery system are styled after a home kitchen and designed to be like bicycles. You can modify the color, the seat and the wheels but the basics are there. They can grow more complicated, more specific and more refined as time, skills and confidence grow.

The reality is you can't make modifications if you don't know the parts of a bike, how to get on it or how to ride it. With the right skills, the right path and the members of Fairmount there to support them there is no telling how far these kids can go.

The pace and the vibe will be styled after a home kitchen and we are going to need member volunteers to come and offer the type of guidance that kids need when they are learning to do anything: people to coach them, to congratulate them, to show them what to do when mistakes happen (and we all know they do), to help them find their patience, to value practice, and the good feeling that comes out of making something from "nothing".

I am here to ask for volunteers. You don't have to know how to cook to help with SCRATCH, all you need is a willingness to support and cheer for a young person learning to cook.

I think we all know it is so important to help get kids well fed and reconnected to lost skills.

We will need volunteers to be in the space during the classes, to help organize the weeks lessons and kits that each student will work from, to shop or pick up food and materials for our lessons and deliver them to the Heights Youth Club. Eventually, we will need help when we expand into field trips to local farms, grocery stores, and restaurants, so they can see how they fit into the equation, and how they can take what we give them and make it their own thing.

If we give these kids confidence and a goal it could change everything for them. If you are interested in learning more or in volunteering, please let Pastor Eric know and he will get you connected.
