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Observing Lent Through Action

The season of Lent, that begins on Wednesday, March 1, is traditionally a time of preparation when through a variety of spiritual disciplines Christians open themselves up to God's presence and power. Over the forty days of Lent that commemorate the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness, Christians from all traditions typically give up something to remind themselves of the great sacrifice God made for us.

And this is a faithful way to prepare for the life-altering events of Holy Week, but I wonder, with all the tension and anxiety of the present time, if we can afford to retreat in our quiet places to pray or fast, waiting for the good news of Easter morning. This Lent, as people struggle to find joy and hope in all the conflict and uncertainty, I wonder how the resurrection might take on new meaning if we chose to live these forty days with a renewed sense of hope and optimism that was grounded in the belief that God is in the business of bringing life out of the shadow of death.

This Lent I invite you to find one way to live into hope, one way to show the world that with God all things are possible. Volunteer at your local school or library. Write letters to your elected officials. Attend rallies for causes you believe in. Pick up trash in your neighborhood. Invite people over for dinner, even people you don't know. Write thank you notes to your friends and enemies. Buy a stranger a cup of coffee every day. This Lent commit to making a difference through tiny acts of compassion that proclaim loud and clear that we worship a God who makes all things new.

Prepare for the events of Holy Week by living into promise they proclaim. Live into hope and show the world that with God, life, and not death, always has the last word.

Session Update

On the last Saturday of January, your Session engaged in lively conversation, faithful discernment, and meaningful fellowship at the Lodge at Geneva on the Lake. The day began with a review of the church's vision and values, with elders giving examples of how we are living into each of them, and there was much to celebrate: improved efficiency in our new governance structure, a new refugee ministry, the creation of a Bridges to Batey Ministry Team, and a successful 100th anniversary to name a few. The two values the elders found most difficult to give examples for were "authentic" and "relevant," so they pledged to discuss what living out these two values looks like in our community of faith.

We then read the Parable of the Good Samaritan, noticing how the passage mirrors our values and provides context for our vision. What begins as a spiritual question addressed to Jesus turns into a command to love and serve our neighbor. Do we model the Good Samaritan's willingness to see an interruption as an opportunity, and do we fully appreciate how important personal connection is as we seek to make a difference? After lunch we discussed church growth - both in numbers and vitality - identifying different reasons why growing our community matters, from ensuring our future to becoming better equipped to meet the needs of a hurting world.

To focus their work in 2017 the Session adopted the following priorities:

- Following the completion of the mission study that is part of an associate pastor search, identify and implement a staffing model (with the new associate pastor position) that best supports the church's vision and values.
- Identify ways to improve and adapt our worship services, both in format and practice, with consideration of multiple intelligences and the diverse needs of the congregation.
- Work to ensure clear and effective communication with the congregation (both speaking with and listening to) with the goal of creating a more vibrant and engaged community where the councils work together to energize and empower individuals and families to be more engaged in the ministries of the church.

Some of the regular business that took place at the meeting was reviewing and approving the Personnel Committee's responsibilities, assigning the two Elder representatives for the Nominating Committee, and approving the communion and worship schedule for the year.

As we begin a new year, the Session welcomes your participation at the council meetings on the third Wednesday of the month. The following members of Session, grouped by councils, can be reached with questions via each council's email.

Associate Pastor Transition Update

Throughout the associate pastor transition the Session will provide updates for the congregation through a variety of platforms - the website, the bulletin, and the newsletter. At their meeting in February, the Session met with members of the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry who outlined the required steps in the search for a new pastor. One of those steps calls for creating an opportunity for congregation members to provide input and feedback. Stay tuned for more details about this opportunity! In the meantime, if you have questions or concerns about the transition, please contact Pastor Derek. His door is always open.

During the transition, the Session and the Rev. Susan Holderness have agreed to an increase in Susan's hours from fifteen to twenty hours per week. Susan's job title has changed to "Pastor for Congregational Care" from "Parish Associate for Pastoral Care." Susan's position is made possible through gifts from the estates of Mary Doll and the Tippit Family. The Session is also exploring other staffing options during the transition, including inviting guest preachers once a month to provide staffing support and to give us an opportunity to hear the Word of God shared from a variety of voices and perspectives.

Update from Stewardship Committee

A hearty thank you to those of you who gave so generously in 2016 and to those of you who fulfilled your pledges for 2016. If you aren't sure if you fulfilled your pledge, call the church office or login via our new online system (*Realm*, more on that below) to check. It's never too late to fulfill that pledge.

We also sincerely appreciate the pledges made thus far for 2017. So far we have received 189 pledges for 2017! However, this is about 60 pledges shy of where we ended up last year. Five Tips for Achieving Lasting Change in Congregations by Edie Gross

In each newsletter, we will share one church related article the staff and leadership have found helpful and informative, as they seek to do the work of the church in the 21st century.

In 2013, the Union for Reform Judaism launched a movement-wide set of experiments with Communities of Practice. Each of the URJ's Communities of Practice wrote a report on their experience and included a list of "best principles" for achieving lasting, meaningful change within a congregation. Here are some of the principles identified by the URJ:

Empower lay leaders. Encourage your target audience, whether it be young adults, young families or both, to take ownership of the process. Establish a trusted, trained core of lay leaders who will be networking while creating the community they want to be part of. Staff can't, and shouldn't, do it all.

Play the long game. You may need to devote several years to an experiment before you see results, so be willing to invest time and patience. With experiments, anytime you're pushing the boundaries, you can't just do it once. You have to do it consistently to create structure.

Don't get caught up in numbers. Traditionally, congregations have looked at quantitative measures of success: How many people showed up to an event? Was there enough food for everyone? Did we stay within budget? All of those are fine to track, but the URJ urges congregations to develop deeper measures: Did anyone make a new friend? Are participants hanging out together outside the synagogue?

Be authentic. Temples seeking to attract young adults often assume -- incorrectly -- that if events are "too Jewish," young people won't participate. "What we found was interesting and fascinating. In every congregation, they didn't want anything purely social," said Lisa Lieberman Barzilai, the director of the URJ's Leadership Institute. "If they wanted something purely social, they could go to a bar."

Take programming beyond the walls of the institution. Engage your audience wherever they feel comfortable -- whether it's in coffee shops, offices, pumpkin patches or people's homes.

Update on FPC and COTC Race Conversations

On Sunday, January 28, fifty participants from the Church of the Covenant and Fairmount had the first of three conversations about the sin of racism. The goals of these conversations are to:

- 1. Create a safe space where the Holy Spirit can work, even in our discomfort.
- 2. Formulate a faithful response to the sin of racism, as individuals and within our communities.
- 3. Articulate a theological understanding of racism as a sin.



Using the recently adopted Behlar Confession as a guide, participants broke into small groups to begin their dialogue. Prior to their second session, participants will read "Waking Up White" by Debby Irving, following the journal prompts at the end of each chapter. We invite you to join them in reading this book. Following this three-session program, leadership from both churches will take a step back to discern what's next. Please keep the participants in your prayers as they do this important work.

Care Council News

Do you have an idea how involved our Deacons and the Care Council are in sharing the love of Christ within our congregation? It is impossible for fourteen people to cover adequately all that needs to be done. We have need for short term, long term, and intermittent commitments from others in the congregation. Please email



care@fairmountchurch.org or call Rev. Susan Holderness to volunteer or to find out more about a particular ministry.

- 1. Congregational Connectors a group who will be intentionally welcoming folks at worship and coffee hour.
- 2. Flower Delivery around once a month deliver flowers to a member at home or in the hospital.
- 3. **Hospitality** either pick up food for coffee hour or oversee the tables during coffee hour.
- 4. **Note Writing** staff the note writing table on the second Sunday of the month or commit yourself to writing a note to our sick and homebound at that time or on your own.
- 5. **Communion Set Up** come to worship a bit early and help set up the communion elements. We especially need folks for 8:30am worship.
- 6. **Transportation** more of our members need rides to church. If you could drive someone to and from worship once a month, that would help so much.
- 7. Ushers a need for more ushers on Sunday morning (once a month) and memorial services.

The Siller Deacons Fund

Have you wondered how Fairmount Church reaches out to those in need within our church family? You know that clergy and volunteers visit members at home and in the hospital, provide rides to worship, write notes of encouragement, and deliver flowers to those in need of support. But what if one of our members needs financial assistance? Sometimes there is one among us who can't make this month's rent, or has a major, unanticipated medical expense, or needs help to move to a smaller place. In cases like these we have the Siller Deacons Fund.

This special purpose fund is not replenished each year in our annual stewardship drive; it grows only when folks give directly to it. To ensure it's long-term future, the Session has approved Care Council's request to take a special offering for the Siller Deacons Fund on Sunday, March 12th at both worship services.

The pastors of the church have been given sole discretion to distribute the funds that are typically given to address a one-time, unexpected expense. While you will never know who your money helped, a gift to the Siller Deacons Fund will provide support and comfort to a person in need. Please give generously and designate your check or online gift to the "Deacons Fund."

Fairmount Earth Stewards

In February, Fairmount Earth Stewards submitted our 6th PCUSA Earth Care Congregation recertification. Fairmount initially met the criteria for facilities, worship, education and outreach categories in October 2010 and was the first PCUSA church in Ohio to be certified. There are now five PCUSA Earth Care Congregations in Ohio; out of the hundreds of PCUSA churches in Ohio.

Earth Stewards organized two events for last year's Serve Sunday: a Doan Brook stream sweep with 38 people (!) and a tour of First Unitarian church's solar installation; a step to launch our own solar installation. During Advent, we upgraded the Andersen Hall chandelier lighting, replacing CFL bulbs with LED bulbs, improving the warmth and appearance of the space and reducing electricity consumption and expense. The Administration Council is in conversations with the Earth Stewards to explore even more ways to make our beloved building more energy efficient and earth friendly.

The Journey Ahead

A revised booklet, "The Journey Ahead," is now available to all. This booklet is designed to help members and friends of the church with the documents and wishes one may want to communicate to family members and the church before one's death. Even if you choose not to fill in all the pages, it will be a resource for discussion with your family about your end of life wishes. You may access it on our website under "Resources" or pick up a printed copy in the Welcome Center.

Refugee Ministry Update

In late December, Fairmount welcomed Assa Boudwin, a refugee from the Congo, into our community of faith. Over the past month, both staff and members of his transitional support team have worked closely with Assa to offer him support as he makes this challenging





In working with Assa over the last several weeks, we have determined that him holding the position of Hospitality Associate at the church, is not serving to facilitate his primary goal of assimilating into our culture. Assa will remain in the church apartment as we support his transition. In the coming months church leaders will discern how to best use the resources of our church to provide Assa, and other refugees, the support they need. 

Adult Sunday School Sunday Mornings 9:50am-10:50am in the Ganson Room - Level 1 The Work of Peacemaking

In the Beatitudes, Jesus reminds his followers that "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God." In February, at 9:50am in the Ganson Room, Pastor Derek will hold a discussion on 'Peacemaking'. How as people of faith are we called to work for peace? What is required of us? Is peace the absence of conflict or something more? Participants will discuss the hard work of peacemaking *in* themselves, *with* those closest to them, and *in* our nation and world. All are welcome. Prior attendance is not required.



In March, we are thankful to have Rev. Maggie Jorgensen who will be facilitating discussion around the book *Slavery to Death*, by Richard Beck. "Beck blends Eastern Orthodox perspectives, biblical text, existential psychology, and contemporary theology to describe our slavery to the fear of death, a slavery rooted in the basic anxieties of self-preservation and the neurotic anxieties at the root of our self-esteem. Driven by anxiety - enslaved to the fear of death - we are revealed to be morally and spiritually vulnerable as 'the sting of death is sin.'" Beck argues that in the face of this predicament, resurrection is experienced as liberation from the slavery of death in the martyrological, eccentric,

cruciform, and communal capacity to overcome fear in living fully and sacrificially for others. We believe that this will be an important addition to our Lenten Journey.

On April 9th, Palm Sunday, Pastor Derek will be teaching on **Why Resurrection?** What about the resurrection is so critical to our identity as Christians, especially in light of our observation and practice of Holy Week. There will be NO EDUCATION HOUR ON EASTER SUNDAY.

Greater Cleveland Congregations (GCC) - by member Gail Larson

One of the reasons I joined Fairmount Presbyterian in December of 2015 was the vision of a "Community of Faith serving together." Pastor Eric helped me determine where I might serve in the established missions of the church. He suggested I come to a meeting of the Fairmount Greater Cleveland Congregations (GCC) Fairmount Core Team in January of 2016. Thus began my journey with the wonderful people who serve God and their congregations by actively striving to find resolutions for issues that impact our community.



At Forest Hill Church in February of 2016, two issues were selected by GCC as worthy of their efforts. A Housing Task Force was formed to concentrate on the Noble Neighborhoods. As I live there, I joined that Task Force. We are currently concentrating on researching all the complex reasons many houses in this area have been vacant and abandoned for years. The goal is to once again have families in these homes - to welcome new residents to our neighborhoods.

As I am a product of public schools, was a public school speech therapist and many family members are educators, including my daughter, Eric suggested the Education Task Force of GCC would be another group I could join. That group met at St. Paul's Church in May. They decided to conduct Listening Projects at Noble Elementary, Canterbury and at Heights High. Because my daughter teaches at Noble Road School and I volunteer there, I was assigned to find out what issues are impacting our families. Besides the burdensome testing, the Principal, PTA members and kids who hang out at the library stated that there are not enough activities and places to go after school and in the summer at our end of Cleveland Heights. Increasing enrichment opportunities for elementary and middle school students is a work in progress.

The assemblies at Fairmount Temple and Olivet Baptist Church gave me the opportunity to "Stand Up" and be counted as one of many who will be holding newly elected Prosecutor O'Malley accountable for the changes he promised in his campaign to make in the courts. These included bail bond reform, reducing overcharging and striving to appropriately process residents who are battling mental illness and/or addiction.

In 2017, one of my New Year's Resolutions is to continue to participate in the important work of the GCC Housing and Education Task Forces and recruit more people for the Fairmount Core Team. The Core Team hopes to keep the congregation informed of actions we are taking and make you aware of opportunities to become involved. What's Happening in Batey 105?!
