Revealing...

Ours was a clever idea, a good idea. Turns out, the idea bombed and I'm glad for it. The story begins with my wife's and my respect for behavioral economics, a subcategory of The Dismal Science that predicts human behavior based on what real humans do. I assume you know some real humans, the kind who try to maximize their happiness (and income!), but who also have biases, irrationalities that inconveniently get in our ways. I'm a former smoker. I know. Anyway, my wife not long ago read about research on real estate that demonstrated how the incentives of selling lower-priced homes aren't totally aligned between owner and real estate agent. Take, for example, my \$125,000 house. It's lovely, I think. It's also in a poor neighborhood. Five miles west of here, prices triple.

Real estate agents work for commissions. 3% of our home isn't nothing, though it's less lucrative than transactions in ritzy suburbs. As well, research apparently suggests that hardworking agents could possibly juice up a home's selling price an extra 5%, if they put in the ole extra effort. Thing is, the agent's take-home pay for that effort is less for homes like ours than others. In dollar terms, the Realtor would get just \$187 more for boosting our price 5%, whereas we'd get six grand. That's real money! For us... If our abode cost \$375,000, the commission feels more tempting. Thus, the Isners schemed. "What if," we told ourselves, "We split that potentially extra 5% with our agent?" Say we offered the standard commission to a point, then shared whatever additional proceeds the agent could negotiate 50/50. Postulating 5% above the original \$125,000, we'd realize \$3,000 we'd otherwise not get, though our agent might try harder because s/he'd be working for real money too. Win-win, right?! It's not unethical, nor would we accept an agent deceiving potential buyers. We're not trying to get Trump-style rich. We're simply aligning incentives, as I made clear to the agents I interviewed this week and shared our half-crazy idea with.

But all three turned us down! The looks on their faces went from, "Are they scamming me," to, "Are they serious," to, "I don't want this..." They understood the idea, mind you, and realized we weren't breaking laws. Rather, they declared in so many words that, "I do my job for more than money." Each declined gracefully by saying they'd prefer that any extra money go into our pockets. If that happened, they'd feel better about the service they performed. It was about more than professional ethics. It was about extracting meaning from their work. I respected that response deeply. And it showed the flaw in my original reasoning. I assumed that the relevant incentive here was profit. But these agents were also incentivized by pride, by purpose, by helping people. Which is to say that this week my faith in humanity's potential goodness was unexpectedly reaffirmed.

This is a presidential campaign year. Federal politics has the unique ability to reveal nastiness in so many of us. Those who pay close attention discover ample reason to think less of our neighbors- of ourselves- given the vitriol, demonizing and cheap thinking that emerges. Daily. Legitimate hope can drain away, making room for a cynicism that masquerades as wisdom. The Bible is clear, of course, that hope is always the truer spiritual perspective. But notice (your?) Facebook feeds, (your?) conversations and celebrations of goodness probably don't proliferate, unfortunately. Yet I just had several strangers tell me that they'd feel better about themselves if I didn't give them several thousand dollars more for their work. That 'sacrifice' would confirm their self-understandings of being a good person. And that's incentive enough to inspire their best performance.

Such is the culture we're living in, friends, if we let it rule the day. The news media probably won't bloviate about it with gusto. So let's decide, instead, to seek first God's Kingdom, believe it's already present, and let the cynics have their sad islands to themselves. Or better yet, let's invite them into this more graceful, more beloved way of being together with us. I've been converted again, and it's lovely.

Holy Season Worship

The 50 days of Easter season--the season of Lent--is a period set aside by the early church with the intent of accompanying the newly baptized or about -to-be baptized, or to remind, restore, and reconcile those who have already been baptized in the Christian faith. According to one post, "Easter Season was designed as a time to learn more about the mysteries of the faith, particularly but not only, the theology of the sacraments, especially Holy Communion, and to ... discern and respond to the gifts and calling of the Holy Spirit for ministry in Christ's name and the Spirit's power."

As you come closer to the Cross this Easter Season, you might use these small symbolic methods to align your heart, mind, and spirit in the act of worship:

Keep things simple—focus on sustenance rather than extravagance;

Pray—Begin and end each day with prayer; add a prayer to the Prayer Cross in the Great Hall and know that your prayers are heard;

Learn—Find a moment each day to read in a devotional or to pick up a sentence from the New Testament and mull it over in your mind;

Serve—only when you give of yourself for the benefit of others can you experience the joy and deep love achieved through sacrifice;

Worship—come to church and be part of "corporate" worship—find the camaraderie of the family of seekers and believers who sit with you in the sanctuary;

Sing! After all, our lord is the "Lord of the Dance."

The men will freeze in the pose of the painting of the twelve disciples and Jesus.
