The women who had come with him from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they returned, and prepared spices and ointments. On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment. But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. Luke 23:55-24:3



As I write, we are preparing for Easter services, and I am thinking about how we all arrive at church on Easter morning.

Some of us come on Easter with great faith and confidence in the resurrection.

Some of us come with more questions than faith, more perplexed than confident.

Some of us come because the only way to get to the big Easter meal is to go to church with family.

(And we welcome you. That's not a bad reason.)

Some of us come not believing at all but wanting to join the celebration.

While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, 'Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again.' Then they remembered his words, and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened. Luke 24:4-12

I don't think that the first visitors to the tomb believed much of anything, or had any idea what to make of what they found. The women find the empty tomb and they stand there wondering. They go to tell the disciples what they have seen, and the disciples think that it's nonsense. Peter alone goes to see for himself. And what does Peter do when he has seen the empty tomb with his own eyes? He goes home, just like us!

On Easter, instead of thinking that it's time to get all of our questions about the resurrection answered, what if we did just the opposite? What if Easter is a time for getting our thinking knocked out of joint enough that we can see the world from new angles. Instead of questioning the truth of the resurrection, what if we allow the resurrection to question us?

Where are the places in life where you have given up hope too soon? What gifts have you buried away out of fear or weariness or distraction? When have you been surprised by goodness when you expected something worse?

Sidebar

When you receive this edition of The Herald we will be in the last week of Lent called, Passion Week that begins on Sunday, April 13 with Palm Sunday. On that Sunday we celebrated the triumphal entry of Jesus to Jerusalem and we ended the service of worship with our entry in to Passion Week. During this week we direct our attention to the suffering of Jesus, the betrayal, the execution by crucifixion. Because we have the advantage of knowing the "rest of the story" we know this has a happy ending – or does it?



Over the past five weeks at the Senior Pastor's Bible Study we have read the book "Who Is This Man?" by David Ortberg, following the texts of gospels; Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Ortberg makes the point that following the death of Jesus there are two days. There is Friday the day of death, followed by Saturday the day of silence. No one knew there would be the resurrection. The followers of Jesus were traumatized, hiding in fear, and most likely attempting to form some type of grounded reason to answer the question; *What just happened?* Knowing their own life was in jeopardy they gathered together in hiding – all except Thomas.

Dr. Shelly Rambo in her book titled "Spirit and Trauma: A Theology of Remaining" reminds us that following any traumatizing event in life all that remains is the trauma. The word "trauma" means "to pierce the heart" or "to pierce the flesh." This is what remains.

Over the past 10 years I have come into an awareness of the persistent effects of trauma and our cultural denial when we say, "What is done is past, move on." The devastation of New Orleans is over but the after the storm remains. We can think of this when we remember the devastation of the eastern seaboard coast, and the BP Oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. Life does not, nor should it return to "normal." A new normal emerges from the ruins and we do well to consider how we are changed by the events.

Our Church fathers (sorry in those days women were not welcomed in the circles of ordained leadership) wrote the Apostle's Creed where it states, "He (Jesus) descended in to hell." Hell is the god-forsaken place where we are taken against our will through trauma. This is the time of waiting: Friday, Saturday, not knowing or believing there will be Sunday. This is where Jesus "went" on Saturday – this is where the disciples were. They were caught in paralyzing shock. Dr. Rambo asks the question, "What held Jesus and God the Father together in hell?" Her thesis states, "The Holy Spirit."

When we are often unaware of what will happen next, remember the story of Holy Saturday and the waiting. Jesus' descent into hell tells me that there is no where we can go, nothing that can happen to us that God is unwilling to go to find us. That to me is hope. Sometimes "Saturday" is a long, long time. I know that there are many who have suffered much and no amount of proclamation of resurrection will undo what was done. We live with the loss and we live in hope knowing that God is with us. This is the Easter message. "He is alive!"

Spiritual/Pastoral Care Corner

Pastoral: H.I.S. ministry has opened my eyes in many ways including God's commandment: Honor thy father and thy mother, that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee. I also am led to honor all our elders for they have given us reason to honor them by setting an example of their Christian walk, dedication, service, and honorable lives. They have much to share and much to teach. Through H.I.S., I have had the pleasure of visiting and getting to know some of our elder members who have become homebound or must live in a facility where they require care and daily provisions. How hard it must be to let go of independence, however, they seem to know it is best for them and they know when it is time in most cases.

It has been interesting to observe the late passages of life. My heart has been touched by the patience I have witnessed among elderly people, and yes, I have also witnessed impatience and misery at times when life becomes more difficult. For the most part, I have witnessed such bravery, determination, pride of the life they once lived and pride for the person they are and what they have to share with younger generations, setting the example of acceptance with grace. It has been my reward to have shared some time with quite a few. "They are precious in His sight", and in my sight, too.

Spiritual: Recently, in the loss of my mother, and the loss of my father in 2005, I was blessed to be able to communicate with them almost to the end. In the loss of each, I have had the experience of feeling very spiritually connected either with their souls or God speaking to me through symbolic occurrences that seemed very real to me. The day my father passed away on March 28, I opened the door to a beautiful sunny day and heard what must have been the first bird of spring whistling as loud as it possibly could (rejoicing) ~ coincidentally, my father was a champion when it came to whistling! I couldn't help but connect to my father's spirit and knew he was rejoicing! When my mother died January 15, the next day I was sitting at a traffic light on my way to meet with Dr. Wooster about her service. I looked up noticing two birds flying in exact unison, zigzagging through the sky in identical motion, and sailing off together almost as if their wings were connected as their changing directions were so exactly the same. I could not help but again feel connected to my Mom and to my Dad and how it seemed to be so symbolic that they were together again, and I knew they were rejoicing. Even in the midst of loss and tears, there has been joy believing in God's promise of everlasting life.

H.I.S. has given me more awareness that God has guided me and worked through me.

I never knew I had the courage or the proper words to pray with a shut-in, but I have felt moved to do so and the words just flowed. Also, I have noticed when I am putting my effort toward some form of God's work, it seems that joy is so genuine and it often seems to go smoothly as if God is right there making it happen.

Perhaps you are being lead to become involved in one of the caring ministries of this congregation. Maybe you are somewhat like me ~ God is still working on me and I am surely still a work-in-progress. Even considering that, the need is there and God will lead.

Within the Spiritual/Pastoral Care Ministry there are many directions that may be of interest to you: Elder's Fellowship Ministry, Hearts In Service, Life's Journey Ministry, Prayer Chain, Stephen Ministry, Warrior's Journey Home, and Yarning for Peace, as well as other community ministries that our members are involved with such as Family Promise, Good Neighbors, and mission trips to mention a few. Surely any one of these ministries is truly needed work and would bring rewards to one's spirit as well.

Confirmation Boston Tour - Scarves for Boston Marathon Runners

Confirmation students recently traveled to Boston and Plymouth, Massachusetts to visit the historic sites of the Congregational church. On Palm Sunday, they worshiped at Old South Church on Copley Square, as each group has since 2008. Old South Church sits at the finish line to the Boston Marathon. Each year, the church includes a special blessing of the athletes during worship on the day before the race. Last year, after the finish line was bombed, Old South Church took the lead in the community's spiritual journey. A year later, wanting to find a new way to express support and prayers for all those who are ready to run in the marathon, the church began a marathon scarf project, to give knit scarves to runners in the days before the marathon as a tangible symbol of the community's spiritual support. When news got out, thousands of scarves came pouring in from around the country.

On Palm Sunday, members of the confirmation class presented thirty-nine scarves made by members of our Yarning For Peace knitting group and from the knitting club at the Tallmadge library. They will be given to runners ahead of this year's marathon on April 21, the day after Easter. It is a visible reminder that God's Spirit holds us in community, even across great distances, and even if we are strangers.



Caring for "One Another"

The words "one another" or "each other" are used more than 50 times in the New Testament. What this tells us is that God did not create us to be independent. He created us to be interdependent. Here are ten ways to love one another:



- 1. Be devoted to one another (Rom. 12:10).
- 2. Give preference to one another (Rom. 12:10).
- 3. Be of the same mind toward one another (Rom. 12:16).
- 4. Accept one another by withholding judgment (Rom. 14:1).
- Accept one another by showing deference (Rom. 14:1–5; 15:7).
- 6. Esteem [highly regard] one another in love (Rom. 14:5; Phil. 2:3).
- 7. Build up one another (Rom. 14:19; 1 Thes. 5:11).
- 8. Counsel one another (Rom. 15:14).
- 9. Serve one another by showing deference in matters of liberty (Gal. 5:13).
- 10. Bear one another's sin burdens (Gal. 6:2).

In what ways can you, as an individual, follow through on these one another actions? You may consider becoming a Stephen Minister. STEWARDSHIP

Hello, my name is Mike Carter and I am the chairman for the Board of Stewardship. This past winter has been one of the coldest with record snowfall in recent history, which seemed to occur on Saturday evening and/or Sunday morning. The meteorologists called this "Polar Vortex" that just kept circulating! Understandably the weather affects weather and the weather affects church attendance and church attendance affects the offerings. When we give to the church we are investing in the ministries we value and care about. As the board chair I was considering several fund raising events to increase revenue for operating expenses when a couple of long term members said, "Mike, all you have to do is ask." Well, being grateful for that sage advice, I am asking that we get caught up. At the end of last year, December 31, we were about even with income to expenses. Then the polar vortex happened with January, February and March being hard winter months and gifts received dropped off. At this point, fiscal year to date, we are \$44k off our budget; or about \$15k a month, or \$3.6k a week. I am inviting you to consider the auto deduction if you are not already in that program. Last year through promoting the program our church went from \$3,000.00 a month to \$9,000.00 a month. As we enter our pledge campaign for this year please consider signing up for the auto deduct program. So, I am officially "asking" for your help in reversing the polar vortex by investing in the ministry of our church. Polar Vortex envelopes will be available through this month's Herald and available in the pews. We are hoping to "catch up" as we start our 2014 - 2015 campaign on April 27. Thank you for your time and consideration. May God bless you and your family.




