The Pulpit: The Hardy Helm Reverend Dan Martin

I believe the roots of the church pulpit run to the core of the earth. Usually made of wood, and sometimes made of plastic, regardless of the material it is the pulpit of the church that is at the front of the world leading life and soul into the storm and foul weather that is always ahead.

Please know that these thoughts come from a recent e-reading of "Moby Dick," and of those favored early chapters where lshmael sits in worship with Father Mapple. If you have not recently read this masterful piece of most excellent English literature then put it on the top of your stack and jump into it.

However, in our world where on any issue or topic there are pundits, critics, web voices, blog opinions, twitter remarks, and scandalous attachments, there is the one pulpit of our faith that must be the "prow" of the sailing ship. The pulpit is the source of our direction and strength leaning ahead of the following main body of the world. The pulpit is the mettle required for the first contact of the waves and carefree current that would gladly rip away at the fabric of our existence and leave us as just so much flotsam in the chaotic wake of turbulence.

I offer a great defense of this societal place not because I have the sacred "honor" of weekly standing in this edifice. I write this because I, and others, "bear the sacred responsibility" of standing with this advancing and invasive connection to the sacred where the tragedy of life meets the source of salvation. The awesome opportunity found in sacred worship centered around a unique place of revelation, made of the raw created materials of the earth, is like no other place in society.

Father Mapple has put it best when he says, "Shipmates, God has laid but one hand upon you; both his hands press upon me." To be ordained to "preach the word" is no great imbuing of privilege or selfish power but is the awesome onus to forget self, to abhor popularity, to ignore favor, and to proclaim the hard truth for a world in denial of its need for reconciliation.

We have so many assumed pulpits in our society today. These other voices of authority speak with eloquence

and half truth. Talking heads on the TV, appealing side bars on the computer monitor, self-promoting blogs seeking self-justification, tilted political self-interests defenders, and public shapers of the fiber in our homes all blast their opinion usually beginning with the words, "I think." I am of the belief that the words, "I think" are never the prelude to information as important as the information that follows the words, "God says."

I recognize that Teddy Roosevelt referred to the White House as being the "bully pulpit." Today we associate this quote with the common word "bully" meaning harassment or intimidation. In reality, Roosevelt meant that the White House was a splendid or wonderful place from which a President could have a world voice. So even though the sacred pulpit may become a place of intimidation and harassment, it is when the pulpit becomes a splendid and wonderful place for the voice of God that souls are touched and hearts are changed.

The sanctuary is like no other place in our common world. The holy altar refutes the idle touch as of the base implements of casual life. The pulpit is no place for the words of the public forum but is set apart for sacred words and prayers. To finally quote Melville, "Ah, noble ship...beat on, beat on thou noble ship, and bear a hardy helm; for lo the sun is breaking through; the clouds are rolling off – serenest azure is at hand." From the pulpit we meet God: the sacred Word of life. From the pulpit the weight and healing of God's pressing hands rests on our thoughts and intentions. Our sacred worship in a sanctuary and worship area is no idle place of folly.

Water R Us

Imagine having to walk two miles several times a day to get water for all your basic needs. The water buckets you carry weigh 40 pounds each. After all this effort, the water you end up with is the same water in which others bathe, do laundry, and water their livestock. This is the reality for one-third of the people in rural Nicaragua. Water R Us is a group of First United Methodist Church members who have been called to address the lack of clean water and sanitation in developing countries. Our mission is to create an ongoing relationship with a community that has identified the need for clean water as a resource necessary to improve the lives of its people. We intend to be personally involved through mission trips and ongoing communication with the community. We have chosen to partner with El Porvenir ("The Future"), a group that has been working with rural Nicaraguan communities for 24 years to improve their lives through clean water, sanitation, hygiene, and reforestation projects.



We challenge you to put your faith into action by supporting and/or participating in our mission. We invite you to be part of a community-initiated water and sanitation project in Nicaragua. Of course clean water comes at a price. Our goal is to raise \$30,000 to fund a 3-year initiative to provide complete water and sanitation systems for several villages. We are also planning to take a work team from FUMC to Nicaragua in October. Church Donates to Help Launch Homes for Youth

The Missions Team recently allocated \$15,000 to Homes for Youth, a new nonprofit organization committed to helping homeless youth in Henderson County. Jim Heidebrecht, church member and Homes for Youth treasurer, gratefully accepted the grant. The grant was made possible through the generosity of the McCleery Fund. The McCleery Fund was established anonymously to lead the way in addressing the issue of homelessness of youth and adults in our community. This allocation allows our church to take the lead in reaching out to address the needs of under served youth, offering our time, talent, and treasures. Henderson County school officials have identified 235 homeless children this school year, 65 of whom are unaccompanied by an adult. Henderson County Churches United (HCCU) launched Homes for Youth to respond to the desperate needs of these young people. Homes for Youth is a non-profit organization committed to providing stable, safe and appropriate housing for homeless youth in Henderson County. It requested funding to support

Joseph's Center Moves Closer to Opening

"We are ready for the plumbers; they will complete the installs by next week," stated our contractor, Norm Ehrike this morning as we stood in the future Joseph's Center. The framing for the women's and men's bathroom, the kitchen, laundry room and office have been completed. This progress on the Joseph's Center is only possible because of the gifts from the congregation of First United Methodist of Hendersonville and others from the community at large. The board of Joseph's

Outreach Ministries (JOM) would like to thank the FUMC missions committee and all the individuals who have supported our getting the Joseph's Center operational. In addition we want to let you know that The UMC District Mission's Committee made a grant of \$3,000 toward getting the Center set up.

On 7th Avenue past the railroad station we often observe men standing in all kinds of weather waiting and hoping to be picked up for a day of labor. Having The Joseph's Center open will allow us to get to know these men and build relationships; relationships to better understand their lives and their needs. The JOM board believes having a personal relationship with others can open up new avenues sharing and growing for all parties. It seems to me that is what Jesus tried to do with all he met from which many were transformed.

We invite you to become one of Joseph's Centers' volunteers now that were moving closer to opening the center. We have a new volunteer coordinator working with Sandy Cavanaugh to provide guidance to



From our Amani Athi working group in Kenya, we have news of the children there who have been working the past year to raise their families out of poverty. One of these children is Erick, 18, who cares for his 11 year old sister, Melody. When he was 15, his father died, leaving the two children orphaned with no relatives to care for them. He struggled to find food for the two of them, but it was only enough to eat once a day. They had no money so Melody had to drop out of school because she didn't have a uniform or supplies. When he was invited to join the Amani Athi group last year, he got support for changing their lives.

Food security is the first focus of ZOE's empowerment program—helping children find a way to raise and/or buy food for their families. Erick's group helped him plant a farm plot last spring. He has harvested vegetables, which has improved his and Melody's nutrition and provided income through his business in town. ZOE provided a grant for him to start up his business and has taught him how to budget and manage his money. So this year he will be able to pay Melody's school expenses, as well as necessities for the family. The children have also received training on good health practices and have put them into practice. He built a dish drying rack to air dry dishes off the ground, and he dug a compost pit for his household waste. For his hard work, ZOE gave the family blankets and mosquito nets to reduce their vulnerability to disease.

Erick, like other children in Amani Athi, has come a long way in a year—a farm, a business, improvements to his home and his sister in school. In the next two years Erick will learn more about business and taking care of his family. He will also have the support of friends who care about him, pray for him and share in his successes. For these blessings he thanks God.

There are five ways to make your reservation for the Wonderful Wednesday Fellowship Meal:

- 2. Call the church at 693.4275 prior to the Monday noon deadline. You will speak with a volunteer at the front desk (or if the church is closed, you can leave as message). If you are traveling or unable to attend church on Sunday, did you know you can call or email (lou@hvlfumc.org) a week in advance?
- 3. Sign up on Monday by noon on the Church website, www.fumchvlnc.org. Go to the web site, from the menu on the left select online reservations/Wonderful Wednesday/LAUNCH FORM. Complete the form select "Register". Your reservation comes to the Food Service Director and will be added to the reservation sheet on Monday morning.
- 4. The reservation sheet will be at the front desk each Thursday through noon Monday. You are welcome to sign yourself up at any time prior to noon deadline.
- 5. You can ask a friend to sign you up before the deadline!

Why the noon deadline on Monday? Food orders and purchases are finalized on Monday based on reservations received by noon. Effective February 1, if your reservations have not been received by noon on Monday, well not be able to honor your request. Being mindful of the budget, we do not buy more food than needed. Your timely reservation is critical. Our Wednesday Dinners are a precious time for all of us to be together. Your volunteer kitchen staff and I truly appreciate your participation and your support!
