### Ponderings from Your Pastor...


In December 1945, an Arab peasant was digging for fertilizer near the town of Nag Hammadi when he unearthed a red clay jar over three feet high. After hesitating, he smashed the jar and discovered within it 13 papyrus books, bound in leather. When he returned home, he dumped the books on the straw piled next to the oven. For the next few weeks, his mother burned much of the papyrus with the straw to kindle the fire. Finally, he took a book to the priest, and a teacher suspected it had value.

The manuscripts were sold on the black market through antiquities dealers for years until most were confiscated and placed in the Coptic Museum in Cairo. The story of these texts continue much like a true-to-life academic spy novel or *Da Vinci Code* movie. In the end, the Nag Hammadi find presents 52 texts of Coptic translations of early Christian gospels that were previously unknown. The original writings were composed perhaps in the mid-second century, but some of the traditions reflect Christianity earlier than Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

In a sermon series April 21-May 19, I will share teachings from these writings of early Christian communities. We will look at some of Paul's writings and other New Testament gospels through the lens of these Gnostic Christians to hear an ancient voice that was silenced by the powers which became dominant in our faith tradition. I will also host an education hour discussion during these weeks in the Parlor between services.

I hope you will be present in worship and study to explore another tradition of the early followers of the Way of Jesus.

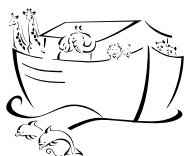


### From the Library Shelf...

Ever visit the Rose Theatre for children with your families? Check on the bookcase near the bulletin board for some of the books that are being presented this year like *Lilly's Pur-*

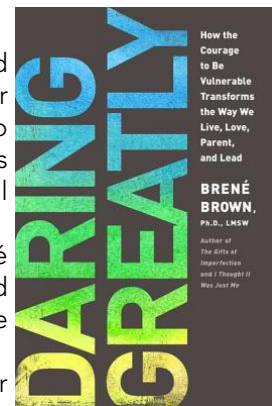

## From Debra's Desk...

One not-so-warm spring day in March, folks driving past Urban Abbey saw a diversity of young people, signs raised and spirits high. Something has happened at the Urban Abbey that was not a part of any plan we could have made a year or even two years ago. We have become a safe place.

Safe Place is a national program of care and support for the most vulnerable, homeless youth. Thinking of young people as wondering where they will spend the night or worried about having enough to eat when they should be stressing over prom season tells us something is deeply wrong. Young people often choose homelessness as safer than an abusive home and many are forced to leave by parents who do not support their budding sense of their sexual orientation or gender identity. Thank God YES! works to make safe space.



Our partners at Youth Emergency Services oversee this program locally; they invite and train local folks, like ourselves, to be safe places that can respond in critical moments of crisis in the life of a young person.



Urban Abbey is an ideal safe place not only because of its downtown location but because of its wide range of business hours. What makes it even better is this moment is the culmination of so much collaboration. The Youth Group led the way in this partnership through Box City and blanket making. As we opened the Abbey, this partnership was natural, and not only have we raised nearly \$1000 for their work in the month of December, but we have collected countless supplies from folks who may or may not be a part of this church. We have invited the community into this mission, built awareness and started a program of job training skills with Youth Clients who want to learn about the work it takes to run a coffee shop, relate to customers, and develop unique skills with our baristas. We can't wait until they are our partners again for May.

Thank you for taking a risk to be in this unique ministry together. It has meaning because so many hands and hearts are a part of its foundation and it will continue to make a difference if you will do the work of inviting folks into our safe space. **Debra**

## What's going on in the Kids Zone?

## Adult Classes

**These classes meet Sunday mornings at the church in the room listed at 9:35 unless otherwise noted.**

All are welcome to any class.

**Boomers +/-**—This class will explore themes as they relate to our faith, spirituality and progressive theology. A service opportunity in the form of a Sunday noon Fellowship Meal will be accepted on April 21. This class meets on the **Stage**.

**Connections**—Conversations around sermon scriptures and their meaning for us in this time and in our individual lives will continue into April. On April 14, Connections members will attend the education forum on Autism (see article on page 7). Beginning April 21, the Rev. Dr. Jane Florence will teach a five-session class on the Gnostic Gospels. Millennial and GenXers mostly make up this group, but anyone who is curious about the topics is most welcome. Come to the **Parlor**.

**FaithLinks**—Each week a new, stand-alone topic from a current event or contemporary problem is explored within the context of the Christian Faith. You, your viewpoint, and opinion are welcome to this intergenerational class and no preparation is required! Find them in room **111**.

**Galileans**—This class is hosting a variety of presenters which you are invited to hear during this month. On April 7, Nathan Morgan will speak about the Big Garden Project of the Missouri River District's United Methodist Ministries. On April 14, Mary Fraser Meints, Executive Director of Youth Emergency Services (Y.E.S.) will relate the good work that is done by that agency. On April 21, the unfolding changes brought about by our nation's first comprehensive health care legislation will be explained by Dr. Rowen Zetterman, former Dean of Creighton's Medical School. Sunday, April 28 will find this class going back to the Bible—way back!—as world-renowned archeologist Dr. Rami Arav of UN-O speaks about discoveries made over the last 25 years of the Bethsaida Excavation Project. **Explorers**—On April 7, 14, and 21, this group will unlock the mysteries of The Gospel of Mark with the Rev. Mark Kemling, who has been engaged in deep, reflective study of this text for the past two years. On April 28, the group will begin the study of a book that contrasts Christianity with another faith tradition, leaving the reader with a better understanding of both. That book is *Without the Buddha I Could Not Be a Christian* by Roman Catholic Professor of Theology, Paul F. Knitter. **Centering Prayer**—This prayer time begins with 10 minutes of fellowship, followed by a 20-minute sit in silence, closing with The Lord's Prayer. 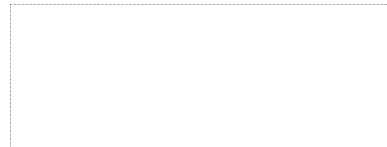
