Late Night Eater?

Are you a late night eater?? Eating late typically consists of low protein, high sodium and high caloric foods. This leads to obesity and heart disease. Some helpful hints include:

- Reduce after dinner carbohydrate intake- it would be better to snack on protein such as nuts, tofu, yogurt, or cottage cheese.
- Get sufficient sleep- it is best to get more than 6 hours but less than 9 hours- people who are tired over eat to compensate for fatigue.
- Keep a food diary- keep after dinner calorie intake to less than 300 calories.

Health Notes

"But as for you, be strong and do not give up, for your work will be rewarded." II Chronicles 15:7

Dietary factors influence susceptibility to sunburn, recovery from sunburn and risk of secondary complications associated with sunburn. Several dietary antioxidants including essential vitamins have been shown to have some effectiveness for protecting against sunburn and skin damage associated with UV radiation. Vitamin E (sunflower seeds, spinach and peanuts) and Vitamin C (fruits and veggies) have been shown to reduce the amount of sunburn after a controlled amount of UV radiation exposure.

Vitamin A, beta carotene (sweet potatoes, carrots and apricots) has a protective effect against sunburn if you have high amounts of vitamin A in your system for the last 10 weeks! Lutein, a carotenoid (kale, spinach and mustard greens) was shown to protect mice against UV induced inflammation and immunosuppression. If you do get sunburn, your body needs more fluids and nutrients to heal. Protect your skin by wearing sun screen!

Dogs Can Detect Cancer

Now this is interesting!! The diagnosis of prostate cancer has been controversial. The use of the PSA test results in many false positives and some false negatives. Biopsy can cause complications and is also not as accurate as researchers would hope. Specially trained medical detection dogs in the UK can identify men with prostate cancer at least 90 percent of the time.

They are four times more accurate than a PSA test. The dogs can distinguish between urine samples of healthy men and those of men with prostate cancer before men begin to experience symptoms. Medical detection dogs can also detect cancers of the kidney, bladder and breast. Who will suggest this to their physician?

It's All about Pots

A great big THANK YOU to our Church family for supporting the Jackson Center's *Walking for Dreams* fundraising event. With your help, we raised just under \$43,000!! Approximately 40% of this amount will be credited back to individual students in the form of scholarships. This event is so important as it allows some of our families to continue their child's enrollment in the program but also helps support Jackson Center operating expenses.

We also appreciate everyone who came to the Canal to walk on our behalf. It is always an impressive sight to see 163 people, most of them families, walking down the Canal in those bright orange shirts! It is a very graphic reminder of how many people love these special children enough to give of their time and treasures to help them reach their potential!

God continues to richly bless the Jackson Center. So much of what we accomplish would not be possible without your prayers and words of encouragement!

It all started in early June. I sent my monthly financial report to the Administrative Council members. The email included a short note about our general fund's being overdrawn. It's not the first time I have seen it overdrawn and probably won't be the last. After all, religious organizations tend to keep operating funds rather sparse. The more you have in the general fund account setting around, the less you have to spend on God's work.

Well, a couple days after my financials went out, I get an email from an administrative council member. She had heard a comment a few days ago. It was, if we are overdrawn in the general fund how did we pay for an irrigation system in the courtyard? Well, it is all about the pots, attached strings, and how much money each pot has. Our church has about twenty five pots at this time, which we call designated funds. Each pot has a string attached. Follow the strings to use the funds is a necessity.

To simplify things, let's reduce our pots, or funds, down to three for this article. Pot one, the general fund, is a designated fund. Yep, it is simply designated to relate to our annual budget and operational costs like the utility bills. Our tithes and offerings are used for this fund. Call it the roof over your head fund. Just like at home, we take some of our paycheck and pay the mortgage and utilities, thus the roof over our heads account.

Our second fund we will call our never ever touch fund. It could be an IRA, annuity, bond ladder, etc. You don't touch the bal-

ance. FUMC has some of these as well.

Our third fund is the courtyard pot. With lots of free labor, the trustees started to work. They got the drainage fixed, installed curbing and rocks plus a low maintenance rock fountain that works, and got rid of some weeds. Now the fund is used down to accomplish these things. With the equipment and labor of one of our congregants, the trustees were able to get the court yard cleaned up, and since grass isn't too expensive, decided to plant grass. Then a discussion comes up. What if we could irrigate this? Irrigation has been a topic on and off for years, but our pot will be empty with grass seeding soon. But, what if we irrigate? The time frame is good; the vendor will give us a cost break; after all it has only been three or four years since we got a cost estimate from him. In addition he will make room in his schedule to install the system before we seed. Only one problem exists; it's a dreaded light pot! Then, with some conversation between constitutes, members, church groups, etc., donations are received to eradicate the light pot and pay for the irrigation project. Not to pay a utility bill, just to install irrigation in the court yard.

That's how we can pay for an irrigation system while being overdrawn in the general fund.

Oh, I think Dave Stinson and the trustees have some more ideas for the court yard. Must be the court yard pot is empty again.



Wow! Words can barely begin to describe our Mission Possible trip to the Western Caribbean, but let me give you an overview. In Miami, we painted the exterior of a 2500 square foot building. In Cozumel, we painted a 3600 square foot building inside and out. We spent time hugging and praying over the abandoned men and women who live there. We watched God stretch our donated funds to provide a new washer and dryer for the home. We passed out backpacks to at-risk children, and we shared crosses, crafts, and soccer balls with them. In Belize we worshiped with children at two different schools. Then we painted, installed security systems, replaced rotting doors, and held the orphan children who so desperately needed to be touched and loved. In Honduras we completed 9 soccer goals to be used in an outreach ministry, we shared the love of Christ through crafts, drama, and activities, and we provided medical screenings and basic medical care to those


in need. We sent a team to a literal dump where we delivered food, hygiene kits, 100 gallons of water, and ice cold refreshing drinks. In Grand Cayman we sent an army of believers door-to-door to promote a new Christian church and to pray with anyone and everyone God brought us into contact with. On the boat we extended several invitations for fellow passengers to worship with us each evening, we prayed with people, and we blessed the crew members with generous tips, sincere gratitude, and prayers for their families. We even blessed a crew member who leads Bible study and worship by presenting him a new guitar. As much as we blessed the people on and off the ship in the Western Caribbean, God blessed us tenfold. I’m eagerly anticipating the fruits that will sprout as a result of the seeds that were planted on this trip!
