During the first 2 months of 2011, we will be holding our fourth Capital Stewardship Campaign. We will not be calling it Nehemiah 4; in fact, we don't have a title yet. We only know that Nehemiah 3 will end in November. We have a debt of \$3,703,123 and a monthly payment of \$26,826. We, as a



congregation, voted to assume this debt when we started building what we now occupy. We praise God for all we have been able to do, but we also recognize our responsibilities during these hard, economical times.

So how do we begin? I have talked to Silvio & Jessie Carrara and they have agreed to be part of the leadership. The three of us have felt that before any more discussion takes place, we as a church need to be praying for God's plan. So the first group of people we are recruiting is the Prayer Leadership Team. This team will be responsible for calling our entire church to pray. The goal I have given them is, "Let's get everyone praying!"

Why pray first? Because God has promised to lead us. We are not to plan things and then ask God to bless it. He is not our chaplain; He's the boss – and prayer is the way He communicates with us. Everyone prays.

I am sure there will be a time when the team will ask all of us to commit this campaign to prayer. How we pray; when we pray; for all the details of what to pray for will come from them, but I am asking for your prayers NOW because I need it.

This campaign is to be the Lord's, so we start by asking for His guidance. Please start praying right now for guidance for the Prayer Leadership Team as they seek how to organize us, communicate to us, and lead us in prayer for "The Campaign".

My name is **Cassie Baja Donavan**. I turned to God when I was about eight. My mom had gone crazy. She would think stalkers were in the computer so she ruined it. She would think the TV was going to grab her so she would sleep the farthest away from it. But, the thing that really hurt was she thought, since she had a bad childhood, she had to make mine horrible and she would physically abuse me — like hitting me with stuff and all that. And, I would just think, "God, tell me why. If you say you are the true God, why won't you stop this?"

Then, when I was about 10, we came upon Citylights Church and I went to it. But, I would just go to see my friends. And, one day I actually listened to Pastor Thien's [Doan] message and I thought it really spoke out to me. So, after church I went home and prayed for forgiveness and I accepted Jesus into my life. So, that's how I fully became a Christian.





Hello, my name is **Christopher John Bishop**. This is my testimony on how I gave my life to Christ. When I was in high school, I used to be a very selfish person, thinking I could do what I wanted and get what I wanted when I wanted it. I was watching a video on TV which really made me turn my life to Christ and try to follow His words as I was watching someone singing and ripping the pages of the Bible. It wasn't until the summer after my sophomore year I really decided to make a change in my life. I decided one of the days, during the summer. I would come to a Friday night meeting at GVBC. Coincidently, Melissa Frey was there that night as well. She gave an announcement about worship practice for summer camp. And, I still remember she said, "If you want to come to practice, signups are in the back. Practice is next Friday before high school group."

So I thought, "Hey why not? I'll give it a shot." But here's what I went into it with: Only two things went through my mind during the announcement — practice and music. No lyrics, no worship, no God. I went to the practice not even caring about worship or what these songs meant. I just cared about playing music. Then camp came around. I also had only two things on my mind — playing music and meeting girls. Hey, I was that guy! Looking back, both of those things were a failure. I was horrible at playing music, but thought I was the best. And, I couldn't talk to a girl for squat! But, I did get something out of it. "Actions Which Impact Lives" Profile of Ryan Shiozaki

Ryan Shiozaki's short-term mission in June with Citylights Church not only blessed the people he ministered with, but gave him unexpected blessings, too. As a new Christian, Ryan gave his testimony to 200 homeless people. It was a first for

Ryan, who had never given his testimony to such a large group. Although Ryan was nervous, he trusted God. God blessed him in a special way with an affirming comment afterwards from a former prison inmate named Kai.

Actions speak louder than words

After hearing Ryan's testimony, Kai told him about his background (how he served a 30-year jail sentence for attempting to kill a police officer), then mentioned he had just accepted the Lord. What moved Kai to make the decision? Ryan's testimony as well as the loving actions of GVBC high school youth, who were serving the homeless that week. They could have done anything else during their vacation, Kai reasoned, but they chose to serve the homeless. Their loving actions spoke louder than their words, which touched Kai's heart. Conversely, Ryan was touched by Kai's heartfelt affirmation about the youth.

Eye-opening experiences

This being his first exposure to serving the homeless, Ryan was blessed in other ways during the week. "It was eye-opening to see homeless people struggling in their health and finances. Despite the obstacles, they trusted in God and grew stronger in the Lord," Ryan shared. Ryan felt humbled, knowing he grew up in the best of circumstances, a stable home, where all his needs were met, surrounded by loving family and friends.

In addition to giving his testimony Ryan, along with the other youth, hosted a Vacation Bible School and a carnival. They also helped with the food pantry, distributing food and serving at other ministry sights around Long Beach. The week turned out to be one of the most unforgettable and life-enriching experiences, one Ryan will never forget. He felt blessed to be used by the Lord.



Growing up in the South Bay

A native of Long Beach, Ryan grew up with his older brother, Randy and parents in Torrance and Palos Verdes. Along with his family, Ryan attended Palos Verdes Baptist Church from the ages of five to eight. At the Faith United Methodist Church in Torrance, where the family attended during Ryan's preteen and early-teen years, he gained an understanding of who the Lord was. He participated in Sunday school and the

middle school youth group.

Joining a very welcoming youth group

Growing up in the South Bay, Ryan attended schools in Torrance and later, Palos Verdes. This past June, he graduated from Peninsula High School, where he played on the varsity basketball team. He is grateful to Kelcie Kadowaki, a lifetime friend, for inviting him to GVBC. Beginning in September 2009, he began consistently coming out to the high school youth group. "I found Pastor Daniel Matsuda and the youth group very welcoming," he recalled.

It started out as a social thing, but as time passed, Ryan began wanting to learn more about God. As Rvan began learning from his Christian friends, Kelcie, Isaac Ide, and Reed Sata, he gained a deeper understanding about his faith. In time. Rvan's faith grew. After returning home from the Alpine Winter Retreat this past March, Ryan accepted the Lord. Friends Kelcie, Isaac, and Rvan Colwell helped him with his decision. Rvan is thankful for all his Christian friends, but mentions Kelcie, Issac, and Reed as the most influential persons in his Christian walk. From the beginning, they answered his questions about God, as well as held him accountable for his walk. They continue to do this for him, which he really appreciates.

God's plans for his life

In other ways, Ryan has been blessed personally. In a short period of time, when he accepted the Lord, Ryan also got his acceptance to U.C.L.A. A dream fulfilled, Ryan considers going to U.C.L.A. a blessing. Growing up, Ryan attended all the U.C.L.A. football and basketball games with his dad (a U.C.L.A. graduate and also, Bruin fan) and his brother, Randy.

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, And lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him. And He will make your paths straight."

As Ryan increasingly trusts in God, his actions reflect more of his Heavenly Father.

Catherine Nold wrote in her article titled "Dan Buttry plays key role in historic Naga peace agreement" which appeared in the International Ministries Come. Grow. Change. newsletter:

Dan Buttry, global consultant for peace and justice for the American Baptist International Ministries was a key participant in the historic Naga peace meetings which resulted in the signing of a peace accord between three nationalist groups in the northeast India state of Nagaland on September 18.

Dan participated in four sessions which took place in Chiang Mai, Thailand, including the session during which the final "Journey to a Common Hope" document was signed. Dan expressed his hope for a future of peace in Nagaland, "The reconciliation among the Nagas hopefully will make possible a more effective process of negotiation with the government of India to find a long-term and mutually-agreeable solution to the Indo-Naga conflict that first erupted into violence in 1955."

Since the 1990s, the Nagaland Baptist Church Council has been praying and working relentlessly with all churches for peace, unity and reconciliation of the warring Naga groups. The Council expressed the hope: "We are encouraged to see that FNR [Forum for Naga Reconciliation] is making headway toward unity and reconciliation . . . we encourage every organization to be a part of this Common Journey. May God continue to guide and bless the reconciliation undertaking."




