WHAT IS LENT?



Lent is a season of preparation leading up to Easter. It is the forty days plus the six Sundays before Easter. For centuries, it has been observed as a special time of self examination and penitence. Lent is a time for concentration on fundamental values an d priorities, and is not a time for self punishment. Throughout Lent, the worship services of the church take on a simpler tone, appropriate to this

season. Banners are removed from the church. Crosses showing the risen Christ are veiled. The word "Alleluia" is not used in the words of the liturgy or hymns. These practices help the worshiping community to mark this season of renewal as a special time in the church year. Lent is a time to draw closer to the Triune God and see it is He who gives the most.

OBSERVING LENT

The custom is to mark the season of Lent by giving up some things and taking on others. Both can serve to mark the season as a holy time of preparation. Some examples of things people give up for Lent include sweets, meat for all or some meals, and alcohol. In most cases, giving up something for Lent can be made more meaningful by using the money or time for another purpose. For example, meal times on fast days could be spent in prayer. Another example is that if you give up meat during Lent, the extra money that would go to LC-MS Lutheran World Relief or your local food pantry. Some things added during Lent are daily Bible reading, fasting on Fridays, times of prayer, increasing our financial offerings, attending extra worship services, taking a Bible course of study related in some way to spirituality. Note that the season of Lent is forty days plus the six Sundays.

This is because Sundays are celebrations of Jesus' resurrection and are always an appropriate day to reduce the restrictions of Lent. So that if you have, for example, given up chocolate for Lent, you could indulge in a weekly candy bar on Sunday. Lent is also an especially appropriate time for confession. While confession to a pastor is not required to receive God's forgiveness, it can be a meaningful rite of reconciliation to God.

PALM SUNDAY

This Sunday before Easter is the last Sunday in Lent. The day commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem with a blessing of palms and a procession in which the whole congregation carries palms. The day is also marked by reading the story of Jesus' passion (the word used to describe Jesus' death comes from "suffering," which is one old meaning of passion). Some of the Palm Sunday palms are kept and used to make the Ash Wednesday ashes for the next year.

WHY DO I BELIEVE IN JESUS?

Jesus grabbed me by the neck in 1962 at a font in little old Bethel Lutheran Church in the Iowa farming town of Lawton. I have no recollection of a time when I did not know that Jesus was my Savior. I often think that I grew up at the "end of sanity." There wasn't much crime to speak of. No drugs really. I walked to and from school from kindergarten on with no worries of abduction or sexual predators. Culture and church, Boy Scouts, school — all for the most part supported a similar morality and a favorable view of Christianity. But things change.

Today's world is a post-modern cultural collage. And that's not all bad, mind you! Prior to the fall of the Berlin Wall, teetering modernism was in its last gasp, asserting that this or that philosophical or political theory could encompass all truth. Would science unlock the mysteries of life and the universe? People believed the answer was, "Yes!" The modernists discounted the spiritual realm, opting for this or that psychological theory to explain the human experience. They all grasped for truth and found parts of it, but the complexities of the human individual, the collective community, simply evaded encapsulation. And every new discovery, whether at the atomic level or about the universe, has unfolded complexity upon complexity. The most shocking thing is the repeated discovery of order — ordered genetic information in biology and complex order in the universe. It was famously asserted that the probability of life coming about randomly would be about the same odds as a tornado sweeping through a junkyard and assembling a 747, fully fueled and ready for takeoff. Atheism requires too much faith for me.

The question I had to grapple with — the question everyone has to deal with — is, "What do you make of Jesus?" Most people will respond with morality. Jesus was a great man who left the world great ethics, like "Love your neighbor as yourself." But Jesus' ethics can all be found in various other religions. What makes Jesus unique is His claim to be the divine Son of God who came to give His life as a ransom (Mark 10:45).

And did He or did He not rise from the dead? The resurrection accounts of the Bible have all the sober signs of reality, including the complexity of details told from different viewpoints, which are not easily harmonized. I also find it compelling that there are no records of squabbles between Jesus' living followers over what actually took place. Others discounted or contested the facts, but they were either contemporary opponents of Jesus or came much later after Jesus' immediate followers were all dead. And finally, Jesus' apostles preached the death and resurrection of Jesus and suffered all, even death, to do so. They believed it happened.

I believe it too, because "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God" (Rom. 10:17). Jesus has grabbed my black heart with forgiveness. My reason follows after, in the wake of faith, and convinces me that the universe is simply too ordered and too complex to exist by chance. And the only way that the life of Jesus makes any sense is if what the Bible says about Him actually happened.

THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION IN ASIA — MARCH 1-15 The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has been working in Asia since sending its first missionary to India in 1895. Today, the Asia region is home to both well-established Lutheran churches and fledgling Lutheran groups — all of which are hungry for solid, distinctively Lutheran instruction. At their request, the LCMS continues to assist them in various ways with theological education.

Remember God's work through theological education in Asia as you pray:

- **1.** for Christ's work throughout the world, that the Gospel might be proclaimed to all people and the forgiveness of sins be delivered through the Means of Grace.
- **2.** for LCMS partner churches throughout Asia, that God would guard them from the assaults of Satan that would lead them into despair or grievous sin and uphold them by His Word and gifts.
- **3.** for the LCMS and her work throughout the world, that Jesus Christ would shine the light of His Gospel through the work of her missionaries, both foreign and domestic, and preserve her from false teachings and despair.
- **4.** for Concordia Theological Seminary, Hong Kong, that it would be a place where pastors are trained to proclaim the Gospel to a world in need of forgiveness.
- **5.** for Martin Luther Seminary in Lae, Papua New Guinea, that God would strengthen and preserve the seminary to prepare the pastors of the Gutnius Lutheran Church to convict people with God's law and then heal them with the word of Absolution.

- **6.** for Japan Lutheran Seminary in Tokyo, Japan, that our Lord, Jesus Christ, would make the seminary a place where the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity.
- 7. for Concordia Theological Seminary in Nagercoil, India, that the Lord would preserve the seminary from all evil and lead it to become a bastion of the Gospel against the attacks of the wicked foe.
- **8.** for Timothy Lutheran Seminary in Birip, Papua New Guinea, that the Lord would use the instructors to shine His Word upon the path of students preparing to serve His Church.
- **9.** for students and professors of Lutheran Theological Seminary in Baguio City, Philippines, that they might serve the Lutheran Church in the Philippines faithfully.
- **10.** for the Rev. Dr. Daniel Jastram, LCMS theological education facilitator for Asia and instructor at Japan Lutheran Seminary, that the Lord would use him to encourage and build up seminaries throughout the Asia region.

- **11.** for the Rev. Dr. Stephen Oliver, LCMS theological educator at China Lutheran Seminary, Taiwan, that he would continue to point his students to Christ and Him crucified for the sins of the world.
- **12.** for the Rev. Dr. Michael Paul, LCMS theological educator at China Lutheran Seminary and church planter, that the Lord would bless his labors as he assists in planting a new church in Taiwan.
- **13.** for the Rev. Dr. Edward Naumann, LCMS theological educator to South Asia, that the Lord would grant him courage to teach the students of the Lanka Lutheran Church and the India Evangelical Lutheran Church.
- **14.** for the Rev. Dr. Hans Trinklein, LCMS theological educator in Seoul, South Korea, that, as he learns the language and culture of the country, the Lord would equip him to faithfully teach and preach the Word of God.
- **15.** for Luther Seminary in Seoul, South Korea, that the Lord would preserve those who teach and those who learn to hold fast to His Word in all circumstances.

JAPAN — MARCH 16-31 The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) began work in Japan in 1948. In 1976, the Japan Lutheran Church (JLC), or Nihon Ruteru Kyodan, became a partner church of the LCMS. To this day, LCMS missionaries continue to support the work of the JLC in the areas of Lutheran school education and theological education at the seminary.

Remember God's work in Japan as you pray:

- **16.** for the Japan Lutheran Church (JLC). Pray that the Lord would preserve the Means of Grace in the JLC so that they would be edified to bring those gifts to those who do not yet belong to God's kingdom.
- **17.** for those still suffering from the 2011 Tōhoku earthquake in northeast Japan, that the Lord would use the JLC to show mercy to those in need.
- **18.** for Urawa Lutheran School (ULS) in Saitama, Japan, that the Lord would guide teachers as they provide both mental and spiritual food for the children in their care.
- **19.** for Tom and Debi Going, LCMS educators in Japan who teach at ULS, that the Lord would use them to share the light of the Gospel with the students of ULS.
- **20.** for Hiromasa Fukushima, principal of ULS, that he would guide and direct the school for the education of students and the glory of God.
- **21.** for the Rev. Shin Shimizu, president of the JLC, and the rest of the JLC's leadership, that the Lord would equip them with wisdom and insight to deal with the struggles and trials of church administration.
- **22.** for the pastors of the JLC as they proclaim the Gospel, that the Lord would grant them fidelity to the Word of God and a bold confession of the Christian faith.

- **23.** for the members of the JLC, that God would use them to serve their neighbor and to share the message of the forgiveness and love Christ bestowed on them.
- **24.** for the teachers and educators of the JLC, that God would enable them to rightly apply Law and Gospel to equip students both to share the good new of salvation and to serve their neighbors.
- **25.** for the JLC's Sunday schools, that God would use those opportunities to nurture His little lambs and prepare them to grow into full maturity in the faith.
- **26.** for the congregations of the JLC, that our Lord would keep and preserve them through His Word and Sacraments, so that all who receive them would be strengthened unto eternal life.
- **27.** for the husbands and wives in the JLC, that God would use their sacrificial love for each other to demonstrate His love for sinners everywhere.

WORD ON STEWARDSHIP

Lent is a season of repentant joy. There is joy in repentance because in repentance, God, through His Word, turns us away from our sins — our failures of thought, word, and deed — to believe in the forgiveness and new life He has accomplished for us in the death and resurrection of His Son. For our God is our Father, and fathers discipline their children. He loves us enough to point out when and where we have erred, so that we are not weighed down by false belief, despair, and other great shame or vice.

Thus we do well to listen to God's Word, His own teaching, about giving. St. Paul exhorts: "Anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor" (Gal 6:6). This means that the local congregation is primary. In other words, everything else that we might give to during the year — laudable and worthy charities — are to be on top of what we give to our local congregation. For the local congregation is the place that serves us with the gifts of Christ's death and resurrection. The local congregation is where our spiritual needs are met when Christ's atonement is preached, when the forgiveness of sins is proclaimed, when we were baptized into the name of the Triune God, and when we partake of the body and blood of the risen and living Lamb of God.

But how much are we to give to this local congregation? His instructions are these: to give regularly (1 Cor 6:1–2), proportionally (1 Cor 16:1–2; 2 Cor 8:12), and generously (2 Cor 8:20) of our first fruits (Gen 4:4; Prov 3:9; Lev 27:30) with a spirit of eagerness (2 Cor 9:2), earnestness (2 Cor 8:7), cheerfulness (2 Cor 9:7), and love (2 Cor 8:23).

Thus, giving to the church is not to be an afterthought, given after everything else is spent. In this way, it is deliberate. We give it regularly, whenever we have income. We set it aside beforehand, before anything else is spent. From those first fruits, we set aside a proportionate and generous amount. Ten percent was the standard for the Israelites. Tithing was a command for them. St. Paul never mentions a tithe. Since a tithe was the bare minimum for the people of Israel in the Old Testament, perhaps St. Paul had more in mind. That aside, however, ten percent is an easy way to figure out an amount. You simply move your weekly, bi-weekly, bi-monthly, monthly, or yearly income one decimal point to the left. And that's it. That's what you put in the offering plate to support your local congregation so that you may continue to be a hearer of God's word by sharing all good things with those who teach it to you.

And how are we to give it? We give it with eagerness and earnestness. We give it cheerfully and with love, not out of compulsion. For through the preaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments, God has made us His children, forgiven us all our sins, given us grace upon grace, promised us life everlasting with Him in His kingdom, and filled us with His own Spirit, the Holy Spirit. This makes giving a jou. For it is more blessed to give than to receive (Acts 20:35).

In repentant joy, then, do we hear God's Word on giving, and we let that Word dwell in us richly. We let that word wash over our ears and seep into our hearts, to turn us away from our own selfish desires and turned toward Him in faith and love. We love the Lord and His Word. And we desire to do it. And when we have failed, that Word reproves and corrects, forgives and consoles. It calls us back to Him who is our God, our Savior, our Father.

GRIEFSHARE



The 27st series of GriefShare, a grief recovery support group, began on Saturday, February 11 however you, a friend, co-worker, etc. can still join us....just come in to the Chapel at 12:30 pm on any Saturday for welcome time and registration.

GriefShare is a Scripture based, Christ-centered ministry which focuses on grief topics associated with the death of a loved one. The DVD seminar features nationally respected grief experts and real-life stories of people, followed by a small group discussion about what was viewed. The third segment of GriefShare involves your personal workbook which permits you to jot down notes from the DVD, learn what Scripture says about grief, and includes a weekly progress chart.

Many grieving people find they are only beginning the work of healing when family and friends have returned to their daily life routines. Too often people, including Christians, tend to stuff their grief instead of allowing it to do the God-given work for which it is intended. Don't allow fear of what others may think to keep you from what could help you. **Confidentially is very much a part of this program.**

Your bereavement experience may be recent or not so recent. You will find encouragement, comfort and help in grieving the death of a loved one. You will learn how to recognize the symptoms of being stuck in grief, that you do not need to live in bondage of certain emotions as well as valuable information about facing your "new normal" life. Grief-related books/materials are available for participants to borrow from our Lending Library.

There is a \$25.00 registration fee which covers the cost of the accompanying workbook, Resource Manual and Tool Box for this peer led ministry.


