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"The Freeing Truth of the Reformation!"

"If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." (John 8:31)

Pastor Johnson was right, "Free lunches aren't free!" Free rides aren't free – someone has to pay. Free prizes aren't free- someone has to pay and perhaps taxes need to be paid. Free love isn't free – the chains of brokenness and heartache are present in every earthly relationship. Free thinking isn't free – mankind thinks the same tired, self-idolizing, sinfully bound consequence causing thoughts, generations after generation. Freedom is not free- someone has to pay. But if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed.

When sinful hearts try to define freedom, thoughts of doing what you want, when you want it, often come to mind. Freedom is sometimes seen as internally taking charge of yourself and your life to gain happiness and control things around you. Freedom is often seen as being your own person and making your own rules.

Jesus and His apostles do not agree with this view of freedom. They taught that even by turning inwardly, man is **not** free. They taught that man's existence is not threatened so much by things on the outside, but more so by self-lordship on the inside. To take one's life in hand is really to grab onto a sinking ship. For the wages of sin is death, no matter how free thinking or self-reliant one imagines themselves to be. Rather, Jesus and His apostles used the word freedom to mean freedom from sin and freedom from the law and freedom from death.

Martin Luther entered the monastery in hopes of finding freedom from sin and from God's wrathful judgment. Floundering in his sins, he sought freedom by attempting to follow Jesus as an example of holiness. He remained isolated in his cell and fasted for days at a time. He beat himself with a whip. He laid naked on the monastery's frigid floor until his health was severely threatened. He prayed and prayed and prayed. Yet the more he sought to be a slave to good works, the more he saw that sin still bound his heart and mind. The more He sought to please God perfectly, the more clearly he saw his imperfect fear and love and trust in

True freedom in this dying world comes from God's Word alone. Freedom comes <u>not</u> from our inward individualism, but God's revelation outside of us. We really do need to be set free again every day. We really do need to be set free again each week by the risen Christ in His service to us. That freedom comes only from God's Word. That's why Satan constantly and cleverly offers false freedom and happiness apart from abiding in God's Word. He dresses up slavery to look and feel like liberty. He dresses up sin and our inner impulses to look like liberty.

Whether we feel like it or not, we are in bondage to sin. Whether the world acknowledges it or not, it is in bondage to death. Death, in fact, may be the one thing that shows an unbelieving world that they themselves are not God! God calls out to wake us up from our self-deception even as He called out to wake Luther up. He seeks to cut open our dull hearts with the sword of His law. As St. Paul wrote, the law speaks so "that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world held accountable to God." (Romans 3:19)

Luther was a man whose mouth God stopped. He saw himself as accountable to God. This view is becoming more and more scandalous in our post-modern society where everyone has their own personal perspective on "truth." Our sinful hearts and self-motivated flapping gums would rather gloss over scriptural truth for the sake of false outward unity. Luther was a sinner just like you, just like me, who finally and fully saw that "by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin." (Romans 3:20) He was a monk who, despite following all the self-help steps of his day, saw that "there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23) When God shut his mouth by showing him the fullness of his accountability to God, then God opened His own mouth in His Word by showing Luther something else. "If you abide in my word...you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

Luther continued to abide in the Word of God. He studied it with zeal and rigger. The truth that God led him to rediscover was a truth that had been clouded over with centuries of false teaching about indulgences and works righteousness and misuse of the Lord's Supper. The devil is fully behind breaking down the truth and right doctrine. Don't let the devil or your sinful nature make you settle for shallow truth that turns out to be no truth at all. The full and liberating truth that God led Luther to proclaim includes more than the fact that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23) It also includes the fact that all "are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith." (Romans 2:24-25)

This is the truth that caused the Reformation! Here is freedom from the condemning law! Here is freedom from sin! Here is freedom from death! You are justified (made perfectly right with holy God) by His grace as a gift. Jesus proclaimed that whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will not enter it. Children are so good at receiving gifts! The kingdom of God can only be received as a gift of God's grace.

That gift of God's grace comes through the blood of Christ. As St. Paul said "whom God put forward as a propitiation (a covering) by his blood to be received by faith." Your real freedom then is bloody. Maybe as Lutherans, we are spoiled to hear the simple, beautiful, bloody gospel of Christ crucified as often as we do. But don't let Satan tempt you to become bored with the bloody and brutal business of Jesus' suffering and death. Your real freedom is due to the life of the one man sacrificed for all others. That's what the word "propitiation" means. It is a sacrifice, a bloody offering that satisfies the righteous wrath of God and covers over our sin. That's why Luther considered the crucifix such a beautiful Gospel sight and continued to teach the making of the sign of the cross on one's self. In Jesus' sacrifice, we see the cost of our freedom. We see the righteous judgment that Luther was terrified of and that we sinners deserve fall on Jesus Christ.

The rediscovery and clear proclamation of this truth is what caused the Reformation. It is the truth by which God always reforms His Church. This is also what caused your new life of faith in Holy Baptism and keeps it alive. To set you free, Jesus became the most shackled man in human history! Every sin of every enslaved heart was chained and nailed to Him, including yours!

Past, present and future! God justifies you freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus. It is His gift to you! You are justified by faith apart from the deeds of the law.

You are therefore **free** from all sins of your past that causes you guilt and shame! You might remember it, but God does not. You are therefore totally free to stop remembering past sins as if they are still hanging over your head. You are free to stop following some self-help spiritual program to become more righteous. Jesus is your righteousness. Jesus has enough righteousness for the whole world and He's given it to you as a gift. For His sake, you are no longer a slave to sin or the memory of it.

You are free to open your mouth to confess your sins because God cleanses you from all unrighteousness in Christ. You are free to let God's truth lead you and not be chained to the false freedoms of the world. You are free to abide in the Word of God and not to be chained to your feelings. You are even free "not to fear though the earth gives way and the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea." (Psalm 46:2) The freedom Jesus gives you reaches beyond the grave. Death could not hold him. Christ was a slave to our sin on the cross but Easter morning, it was seen that the risen Son remains forever. The enemy of death therefore cannot hold you. There is so much more to life than what we can see and feel with our senses. Freedom in Christ has us look into the security and beauty of eternity.

Freedom is not free. God's blood was shed in Jesus and it paid the price of your eternal freedom! IF THE SON SETS YOU FREE YOU WILL BE FREE INDEED! **AMEN.**



Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost October 2, 2016 – Luke 17:1-10

"The Miracle of Forgiveness"

In your own experience, you may have been in a situation where forgiving someone was a downright daunting task. The disciples recognized this as they cried out to Jesus, "Increase our faith". They surely thought to forgive without limits would require more then what they were equipped with. The fact is that forgiveness is a great and grand miracle of God! You can forgive the unforgivable and love the unlovable because that's exactly what Jesus did for you. You are the receiver and bearer of utterly undeserved grace and mercy.

Today Jesus warns that the moment we become proud of ourselves, proud of what we have done, proud of our forgiveness toward others or even proud of our faith, we are denying Justification by grace for Christ's sake. Rather, we are to do all our duty faithfully and responsibly, without thinking that we have earned any credit or approval before God. Faith doesn't look at ourselves and our record of good works, but faith finds our full and complete approval in God's eyes through Jesus Christ. Faith takes hold of Christ as the one and only reason we find approval from God.

Avoiding sin and temptation, rebuking others from sin in an attitude of humility, turning away from sin ourselves, forgiving our brother 7 times a day, and doing all this without expecting that we deserve something in return? If it seems too great a task, and it is greater than we can accomplish—then pray "*Increase our faith!*" God will grant us to do even more than this—Faith is as powerful as the object in which it trusts—Jesus the world's faithful forgiver.

Twenty-First Sunday after Pentecost October 9, 2016 – Luke 17:11-19

"The Ten Lepers"

There are millions of Internet stories out there that guilt trip you into feeling more thankful for what you have.

This isn't one of them.

Lepers were classified as unclean, which means they had to live in their own little communes far away from the rest of society. But as Jesus was traveling, he came within earshot of one of these little leper colonies. "Have mercy on us!" they cry. So Jesus tells them to go and show themselves to the priests. Only the priests could declare someone with an unclean skin disease to be clean again. So reading between the lines a bit, Jesus was telling them, "Hey, you're healed. Now go to the priest, and he'll confirm it for you." So they did, but only one of the ten came back to give thanks to Jesus.

But notice that he doesn't just shake Jesus' hand or send him a note. He *falls down on his face* at Jesus' feet. That's *worship*. It's not just that this ex-leper knows how to be polite, but he knows **who Jesus is**. This Jesus is indeed his lord and master (v13). And this faith and trust in Christ, his Lord, is what saves him. (v19)

Twenty Second Sunday after Pentecost October 16, 2016 - Luke 18:1-8

"The Persistent Widow"

Back in Jesus' day, a widow is just about the most powerless person in society. If someone cheated or wronged a widow, she'd be the *least* likely person to get justice. So in his parable there's a good-for-nothing judge, who holds all the power, and there's a widow, who holds none of the power. Apparently, this widow has been wronged, and she pesters this judge incessantly night and day about this case. Even though this judge is good-for-nothing, eventually this widow wears him down and he finally sees to it that she gets justice.

This parable is a classic example of from-lesser-to-greater. If this good-for-nothing judge eventually gives this woman a hearing, then how much more can we be confident that *our* Lord, who is infinitely better than this good-for-nothing judge, will give *us* a hearing.

So when we pray, we don't need to lose heart. (v1) Sometimes it seems like the Lord is not listening or he's putting us off. But He's not. He hears your every prayer, and He will provide for all that you need.

Twenty Third Sunday after Pentecost October 23, 2016 – Luke 18:9-17

"God, Be Merciful to me, a Sinner!"

We will hear two very different men pray very different prays today. Both pray with a sincere and thankful heart. Even though the tax collector's prayer is in the form of a petition, he is thankful that there is such a thing as mercy. He's thankful that even a second-class citizen like himself can come into the temple and approach the holy God and expect that God will hear His prayer and be merciful to him, a sinner.

The Pharisee wanted God to see him through the tax collector and his sinful life. The tax collector wanted God to see him through the cross of Jesus Christ and Him crucified for sinners just like him.

The cross of Christ is the rose colored glasses through which God sees all who hide behind it. The cross is the fountain of life from which all of the mercies of God flow onto all who thirst for that living water of cleansing and forgiveness and refreshment that only God can give.

Twenty Fourth Sunday after Pentecost October 30, 2016 – Luke 19:1-10

"Zaccaeus"

We all love Zacchaeus, probably because we all sang about him in Sunday School. But rest assured; Zacchaeus was not a popular man in his day.

Tax collectors were crooks, simple as that. They took advantage of their own neighbors and notoriously lined their own pockets by price-gouging the people. But when Jesus saw Zacchaeus up in that tree, He invites Himself over to Zacchaeus' house. Of course, the people put up a big stink about this. Why would Jesus reward someone who was such a crook? But Zacchaeus repented and made amends. He gave away *half* of all his wealth, and whatever he over-charged the people he payed back fourfold.

But what Jesus says next is the best: "Today, salvation has come to this house, since he also is a Son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and save the lost." Salvation does not come to this house because Zacchaeus gave to the poor or repaid the defrauded. He is saved because *Jesus* came to seek and save the lost. Jesus was the one who saw Zacchaeus. Jesus was the one who called him down from the tree. Jesus was the one who invited himself over for dinner.

Minneapolis Institute of Art explores Martin Luther's legacy

Five hundred years after his death, is the religious rebel still a big draw? The Minneapolis Institute of Art explores Martin Luther's legacy in an exhibit of art and history.

These days the name Martin Luther most likely brings to mind the slain civil rights leader whose marches and dreams reshaped 20th-century American life.

Half a millennium ago, however, an earlier Martin Luther had an equally transformative effect on Europe.

Trained as a Catholic priest, Luther (1483-1546) rebelled against the church and founded a namesake religion that today has more than 1 million followers in Minnesota alone. His critiques of power sparked a century of religious and class warfare throughout Europe, while his embrace of new technology — the printing press — helped spread literacy across the continent.

That man is now the focus of "Martin Luther: Art and the Reformation," an international exhibition featuring the theologian's influential books and manuscripts as well as paintings, furniture, jewelry, armor and luxurious clothing associated with the religion he condemned.

Opening Oct. 30 at the Minneapolis Institute of Art, the show is the largest of three U.S. exhibitions marking the 500th anniversary of Luther's audacious rebellion against the Catholic hierarchy. Most of the art, manuscripts and books have never left Germany before. The two smaller exhibits will be held at the Morgan Library and Museum in New York City and the Pitts Theology Library of Emory University in Atlanta.

Art, history and religion

"This is a broad-based look at Luther, his times and the art of the moment," said Tom Rassieur, the Minneapolis curator in charge of the Twin Cities presentation. "It includes traditional Catholic and Lutheran art, archaeological finds from Luther's home, manuscripts, printed books, satirical and polemical prints. It's a real variety — everything from ordinary marbles he may have played with as a child to furniture in his studio and the last pulpit from which he preached in the town of his birth."

Though intended for a general art-and-history audience, the show got an early boost from its sponsor, Thrivent Financial. By mid-August nearly 6,000 people had signed up for group tours, an advance figure that is "unprecedented in the history of the museum," said Kim Huskinson, the museum's marketing manager. "I really think the show will be a blockbuster."

Concerned that Luther and the religious Reformation he sparked might be unfamiliar to some potential audiences, the museum test-marketed the show with focus groups of Lutherans, affiliates of other faiths (Catholics, Jews, an interfaith counsel) and nonreligious types.

"We wanted to assure that our interpretation is objective [because] it is not a show about the Lutheran religion, but about the importance of this individual in history," Huskinson said.

Highlights include helmets from the armor of Holy Roman Emperor Charles V and French King Francis I; an elaborately embroidered pilgrimage robe of emperor Maximilian I; golden reliquaries; 16 paintings by Lucas Cranach the Elder or his studio; a hand-colored copy of Luther's German-language edition of the Bible, and an elaborately carved and painted altar of the Virgin Mary from Naumburg Cathedral.

Luther vs. the pope

The exhibit coincides with the 500th anniversary of Luther's criticism of the Catholic church, which was selling "indulgences" to pay for the renovation of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. For the price of an indulgence, Pope Leo X would forgive sins, a transaction that Luther thought corrupt because he believed only God could forgive sins.

So Luther nailed "95 Theses," or criticisms, to a church door in Wittenberg in 1517. Within four years he was excommunicated, outlawed and forced into hiding under threat of death. Protected by dissident German aristocrats, he survived, married a former nun (with whom he later had six children) and became increasingly radical.

"What Luther does had reverberations at many levels," Rassieur said. "It triggered class war, affected church power and increased literacy because he taught scripture in the [German] vernacular.

"But we have to deal head-on with the fact that Luther also published notoriously anti-Semitic tracts and wrote a very negative preface to the Qur'an, too," Rassieur said. "Mainstream modern Lutheran churches have disavowed Luther's attitudes toward the Jews, and we address this in the exhibit. That's why we don't pose this as a celebration, because like all historic events, it's complicated."

Dear Members of Glory of Christ,

I can't think of a more exciting start to fall than the one that Glory of Christ has had, so far, in 2016.
