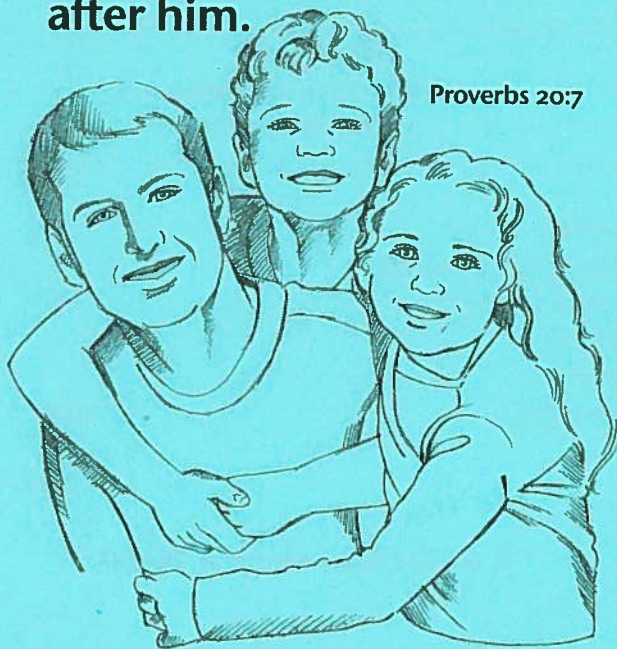

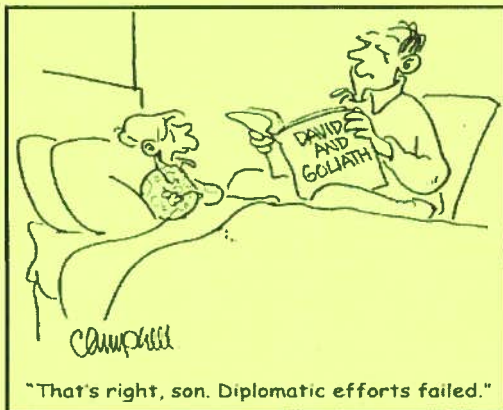

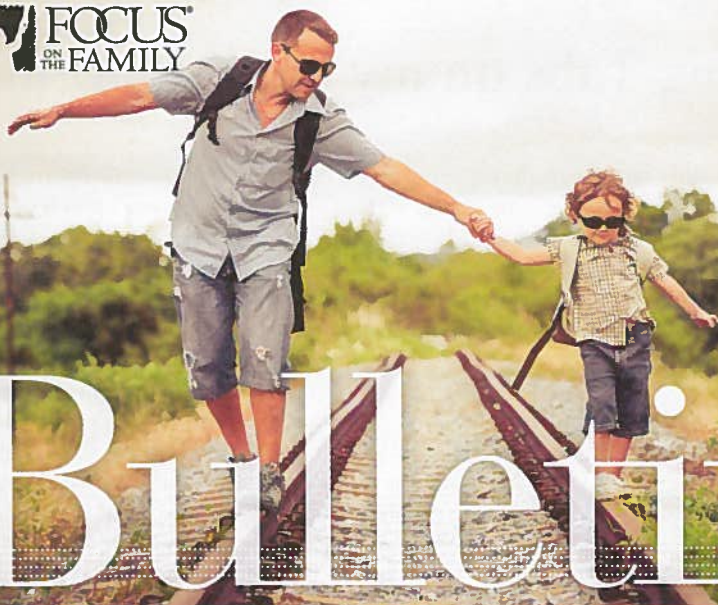

## Dads Are Different

DADS ARE DIFFERENT FROM MOMS, AND THIS DIFFERENCE IS GOOD in many unexpected ways. Men don't just *parent* their children; they *father* them.

One difference of fathering is that dads tend to be more dangerous, at least according to moms, who tend to be more protective. Mom's way is best, right? It's not that simple.

For example, when a child starts climbing things, Mom's words are, "Be careful." Meanwhile, Dad is saying, "Keep going! I'll be right here." Mom's way promotes safety, obviously important. But Dad's way promotes confidence and the ability to take calculated risks. The balance between Mom's and Dad's ways creates healthy, well-balanced kids.

Dads have a great deal to do with a child's relational confidence and health. Girls who get plenty of safe and proper physical interaction from Dad are usually not girls who fall for the improper physical advances of boys later in life. And when a boy sees Dad treat his sisters and mother respectfully, he learns to do the same.

There are many important differences between mothering and fathering that benefit a child's healthy development and maturity. When Mom and Dad embrace these differences, it not only does much for their children, but also for their marriage and the peacefulness of the family's everyday life.

# Keeping Tabs on my Kids' Emotions

As a dad, the only way I can detect unresolved emotional issues among my kids is to spend time with them. Some of the warning signs to look for include:

**Evasiveness.** One day I gave my 11-year-old a hug, and she pulled away. I broke a promise, and she reacted. Until I recognized the signal and dealt with the problem by addressing my blunder, our relationship suffered.

**Muttering.** I asked my son to help clean the house. He muttered and shuffled off to obey my request. We dads must recognize the reason for the anger. In my son's case, I had trampled on him by not taking into account that he was busy working on a special surprise for his younger brother.

**Yelling.** Our youngest daughter started screaming when she didn't get her way. We realized that in a house with several older children, she wasn't feeling heard. We addressed her volume problem and started taking care not



to ignore her little voice. Shouting may not be an act of war but a warning sign. Rather than simply disciplining the child who yells, sometimes we need to sit down and listen first.

Early detection prevents the most damage. Over the years, I've learned the importance of watching all my children for warning indicators so I can help them develop into God-honoring, responsible adults.

## The Calm-Down Rug

When my son was 1½, I introduced the “calm-down rug.” If my son became upset or angry, he sat on the rug until he calmed down. He knew that he was not in trouble when on the rug; it was not a timeout, but rather a place for him to work through his feelings. Each time he sat on the rug, I told him, “It's OK to be angry or upset, but it's not OK to hit, kick or hurt someone else or yourself.”

When he calmed down, he was welcome to rejoin the rest of the family. This method helped our son learn to control his anger without being physically aggressive.

# Our Children Are Watching

I watch Holland, my 9-year-old daughter, take tentative steps around the house in my high heels, a favorite scarf of mine draped around her neck. Later, she helps her dad, Nick, in the kitchen, observing as he cleans sliced leeks in a bowl of water. Then she assumes the task.

Our every move seems to be an unintentional lesson in how to do things and how to behave toward one another—and no relationship influences Holland more than my marriage. She watches how Nick and I interact, and again and again notes, *So that's how it's done*.

So what are the relationship lessons we're teaching our kids? One of the most important behaviors we can model is showing how disagreements are OK, but disrespect is not.

In my home, some of the most heated arguments Nick and I have occur during the news. Reports spark lively conversation and, sometimes, more lively arguments. Holland observes, and I don't think that's bad. Someday she'll find herself disagreeing with someone. I want her to do this with respect and confidence. So we let Holland witness conflict to send the message that conflict is normal—it means that both people are *human*. What helps?

- Don't let your child pick a side.
- When an argument escalates, heading out of earshot is wise. But reappear for the resolution—model asking for and granting forgiveness.
- Avoid moralizing arguments that have nothing to do with morality. Kids see in black and white, so help them recognize that not every disagreement stems from right vs. wrong.
- Don't let your child equate resolution with one particular parent always getting his or her way. You wouldn't want to send the message that one of you is a pushover and the other is a bully, right?
- Be sincere. If you sulk and avoid eye contact after “making up,” what message does that send about the hollow nature of apologies and forgiveness?

Parents, our children are watching. Along with our shoes, they're picking up our attitudes and behaviors and trying them on for size. Consider what relationship lessons—good and bad—your kids are learning from *your* marriage.

# Family Matters

Answers to your questions . . .

## Do married couples have to have a budget?

**Answer:** Here are some benefits you need to consider:

1. *A budget establishes a spending plan.* When a couple decides to go to a movie, it will come out of their entertainment fund—with no “guilt trip” attached. That’s because they’ll have decided in advance what to do.
2. *A budget encourages savings.* If a couple follows their budget, at the end of the month, they will have money for savings. Without a budget, that fund may not accumulate.
3. *A budget reduces stress.* With a budget, couples will understand how much money is available each month. When they respect the system, finance won’t be a primary focus of conflict.

4. *A budget allows for the unexpected.* Emergency expenses can be overwhelming. Setting aside funds for surprise expenditures helps reduce pressure. Emergencies are traumatic enough without the chaos that can result from not having a “rainy day” account.
5. *A budget encourages giving.* Having a budget can help couples honor God with what is already His, Jesus said. Budgeting that allows for generosity will help couples discover how giving to God promotes peace and joy and enhances their closeness to Him.
6. *A budget discourages debt.* Having a plan and sticking to it will keep couples from overcommitting themselves financially. Debt is a burden on any marriage. If you’re in

debt, formulating a plan to eliminate it could be a gift to your relationship.

7. *A budget can be flexible.* Many couples fear a budget will be a straitjacket. But financial freedom can be expanded by constantly evaluating the budget. Maybe there’s a better car insurance plan. Perhaps refinancing the mortgage to save interest is an option.
8. *A budget can encourage spouses to submit to the same authority—God.* To set up a budget, you have to set priorities. If a couple look to God and His Word for guidance, they won’t be competing to be in charge of each other’s spending habits.
