

SO MANY OF US MOMS WONDER IF OUR WORDS, ACTIONS AND prayers have made one iota of difference in the lives of our children.

If you're that mom doing her best to influence the heart, mind and soul of your children amid soiled Pull-Ups, rambunctious grade-schoolers and hormonal teens, I trust you'll remember a few truths regarding your influence as a mom. Never forget:

- You're not alone in influencing. Read Proverbs 6:20-23 and note the timeless principle of a mother's influence. For the child who embraces his mother's teaching, her words will continue to guide the heart of that child.
- You can restart today. At any time you can choose to restart the influence you're having on your kids. If you feel your influence may not be positive or your focus has waned, remember that every day starts with fresh mercy (Lamentations 3:22-23).
- Your influence will endure. Most kids require a couple of decades to recognize the influence of a mom in their life. Time and experience have a way of bringing such understanding . . . so be patient. "For it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure" (Philippians 2:13).

Be assured that God really does use our day-in-and-day-out, year-after-year mothering!

In the Shadow of Infertility

My wife, Cheri, and I were unprepared for the challenges of infertility. As treatments became more invasive and expensive, our emotions began to fray. Here's what I learned to keep our marriage going during a season of infertility:

Protect her. After struggling to answer prying questions, Cheri and I agreed upon a few stock answers about when we'd be having children. "All in God's time" was a favorite. And rather than giving in to the desperation of working against the biological clock, I constantly assured Cheri that we had worth even if we weren't parents.

Take care of control issues. Infertility gave us a sense of powerlessness. I'd often retreat to places where I had more control, namely my career. Then Cheri landed in the hospital for a week from side effects of one treatment.



While sitting with her, I realized that control was an illusion. I could, however, place my trust in the One who was in control. That truth gave me the strength to stop retreating. I started taking more time off work to be with Cheri at the doctors' offices.

Strengthen the foundation. Infertility revealed hidden cracks in the foundation of our marriage, but it also provided an opportunity to build our communication skills. We made sure that dinner conversations weren't just about our next treatment options. We continued to go on dates, even when we were dreading what the next week would bring. We learned there was no time like a season of struggle to build intimacy with each other.

We made it our mission that any baby we had—yes, we eventually became parents—would come home to find Mom and Dad in a healthy marriage.

Modeling Respect

Parenting has a funny way of throwing your mistakes in your face. Just take, for example, the incident of the Chinese accent and my family.

It happened in the kitchen. As my wife prepared dinner, she gave my daughter instructions to set the table. Meanwhile, my daughter decided this was the perfect time to hone her budding teenage sass.

"You go do it," she said, mimicking what her mom had just told her. She



smirked as she copied the choppy cadence and strained vowels of her mom's Chinese accent. It sounded every bit like mockery.

Righteous indignation arose in me just a split second before I felt something else . . . guilt. In that instant, I knew exactly where my daughter's disrespect had come from—me.

Before I continue, I should explain that I have the deepest respect for my wife's Chinese heritage, and I adore the way she expresses herself. On occasion, I have jokingly impersonated her accent. But as I heard my daughter mimic my mimicry, I realized how disrespectful it sounded. Ouch. How painful to see your mistakes reflected through your children's behavior.

Much of our kids' attitudes toward their mother come from watching their dad. As fathers, do we want our kids to respect their mother? Then we need to model that respect for them. Even unintentional signs of disrespect can make an impression on our kids. It's not uncommon for couples to delight in playful banter, but kids often cannot tell the difference between bantering and bickering.

Let's take an honest look at ourselves. Do our words exude love and respect? Or are we sometimes impatient, sarcastic or condescending? It can be hard to see (or admit) our shortcomings, but we can strive for greater awareness. A good rule of thumb is to ask ourselves this: Would I want my kids to say this to their mom? If the answer is no, then we probably shouldn't say it either.

Our kids often take their relational cues from us. Let's show them what it looks like to honor the most important woman in our lives.

Family Matters

Answers to your questions . . .

I tend to worry about the economy and my finances. Can you provide some perspective on this?

Answer:

When considering the overall economy and how it affects you, it's important to consider what you can control and what you can't. No one individual can affect the long-term stock market changes or the unemployment rate or inflation. I'm not saying those items are unimportant or useless to track. But you can't do much to influence them.

I'm reminded of the "serenity prayer" so often seen on plaques or cards. (It's not a Bible verse, by the way.)

God grant me the se-

renity to accept the things we cannot change, courage to change the things we can, and wisdom to know the difference.

I think the idea of this prayer can apply to the economy. We have to accept the overall economic conditions in which we find ourselves. But we must have the courage to change what we can about our personal financial situation. To better prepare for uncertain changes in the economy, set goals and invest long term.

You can do nothing to avoid future risks entirely. If a doomsday economic scenario comes along, even the most prudent person will be swept away with the rich. The key word in this is avoid.

Every few years, there seems to be an increase in fears of a depression. Recessions are normal; depressions are not normal. nor are they guaranteed to happen. People ask if there is a perfect investment in order to profit during any upcoming depression. There is no such animal. Nor is there a painless solution. While you can't avoid a major economic downturn, you can certainly minimize its effects. How? The good old-fashioned wayreduce your debt and build personal liquidity through saving and investments.
