

Why the Play in Godly Play?

and I didn't really see anything undesirable about it. If anything, I thought it was a good thing that the pastor would sometimes summarize the adult sermon, just in case my mind wandered during that event

Well, PD had other ideas about what a children's sermon should look like. His idea was that instead







of listening to adults tell them about God, kids should play. So he told them to hide their eyes, and he went and "hid" in the back of the church by the baptismal font. The kids were just so delighted, and so was I. There was God. Not in the delivering of the message from on high to down below, like Moses bringing wisdom down from Mt. Sinai, but in the discovery of the presence of God through play. The way our Godly Play Sunday School curriculum talks about God's presence is "God came so close to them, and they came so close to God..." God comes close in Godly Play; God does not remain remote and inscrutable, something only adults understand and access.

I am firmly committed to the idea that the presence of God be accessible to Graceland Sunday School students. And Godly Play demonstrates a way to make God accessible through play. It seems to me that if you think about

it carefully, you'd probably agree that our liturgy is a ritualized form of play for adults. We dress up, we decorate with beautiful art projects, we sing, we have a special kind of walk, we tell stories, and we have special words and ritual songs. If preschool is a recent memory for you, your children, or your grand-children, think about how many elements of the rituals of preschool parallel the rituals of Christian

liturgy. We even have snack time in a circle, thanks to communion. Of course, if you are remembering one of those preschools where they were trying to teach long division to three-year-olds, worship at Grace is really not going to be like that preschool.

Like preschool and like worship, Godly Play is also highly ritualized. All the parables begin with the same set of words, I've already mentioned how Godly Play talks about the presence of God; there is a prescribed placement for different kinds of stories; and we always begin by asking, before a child enters the room for Godly Play, "Are you ready?" It's fine to be "not ready," and those who are not can sit with the doorkeeper until they are. Naturally, it's not all that fun to be sitting in the hallway while everyone else is close up to the play, so readiness usually comes on fairly soon.

We've had a fantastic year of Godly Play, with some great new teachers and people ready to volunteer at the drop of a hat (thank you!!!), a group of kids numbering anywhere from 10-40, and lots of creative, inspiring "work" happening. Godly Play is play, but there's also "work." Work time is once the children have heard the story, and they take time to reflect on the story on their own or in small groups. Sometimes they take the play materials from a story and reconstruct the story. Sometimes they "work" with Legos or clay or paint. The "work" of kids is to play; to create and to discover and explore.

By using Godly Play as a curriculum, Grace commits itself to this notion of children's work as play, of ritual as group bonding play. And I think it's a good thing. After all, adults get to play every week through the liturgy.

To that end, the Finance Committee will re-convene and is looking for another member-at-large. In the interest of being as open and accountable as possible, the Council also decided to include an article in the Harbinger that would inform the congregation of where we currently stand financially. The meeting also included a report from Laura on the Welcome Committee and a report from Nate on an upcoming Sound System meeting.



Reconciling Works: Lutherans for Full Participation is reacting with joy to today's [6-26-13] Supreme Court decisions on same-gender marriage: to strike down the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) and the majority opinion that affirmed state marriage laws seeking to protect people "in personhood and dignity." The organization also rejoices in the freedom to marry that same-gender couples in California have been granted again in the court's ruling on Proposition 8 in that state.

"We as Christians consider people of all sexual orientations and gender identities worthy of dignity and respect," said Emily Eastwood, Executive Director of ReconcilingWorks. "As people of faith, we believe that with dignity and respect should come the freedom to marry and equal protection under the law. We celebrate today's

decisions." Eastwood declared this a landmark day for legal and civil protections of LGBT people and recalled another landmark in 2009 when members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) changed its policy to allow gay and lesbian people to marry in ELCA congregations in states where legal.

Just last month, the ELCA's Southwest California Synod elected a bishop, the Rev. Dr. Guy Erwin, who is openly gay and Native American, both firsts for the denomination. Bishop-Elect Erwin's life-partner is Rob Flynn.

With the court's ruling on Proposition 8, there are now 21 (of 65 total) ELCA synods located in states recognizing same-gender marriage. These synods represent 38 percent of the total ELCA membership.

Grace Speaks....About Worship

The Worship Committee thanks the 24 Grace members who took the time to complete the worship survey in recent weeks. The compiled responses provide great wisdom and insight about this key aspect of our community life. As the committee reviewed the results an initial observation was that—for every strong opinion expressed, another person expressed the opposite feeling! An example of the diversity of the Grace family—there will typically be positive and negative feelings about any part of worship.

In general, the elements of worship that are experienced most positively are: preaching; Communion; musical leaders; and the appearance of the sanctuary. Elements which get more mixed review are: starting time; community time; and coffee hour. There was strong affirmation for our ongoing attempts to balance familiar traditions with the new in worship, while acknowledging that we may tip a bit far one way or the other on occasion. There was also strong affirmation for singing as a key element of worship, while noting the difficulty of appealing to a variety of musical preferences and abilities.

The Worship Committee will review and discuss the survey responses in the coming weeks and incorporate some of the suggestions into our worship. About RIC and Grace Lutheran Church of Evanston

Lutherans Concerned/North America is an organization independent of the ELCA that was established to work for the full inclusion

of gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender Lutherans in all aspects of life in the Church and its congregations. LC/NA calls for the blessing of committed and covenanted same-gender relationships and for the ordination of LGBT believers who are called to ministry.

In 1984 LC/NA introduced its Reconciling in Christ Program to recognize Lutheran communities that publicly and specifically welcome LGBT worshipers. The roster of RIC congregations, synods, colleges, seminaries and organizations now exceeds 450.

Congregations often ask why a general statement of welcome is not sufficient for RIC recognition. Sadly, it still takes a special effort to communicate a sincere welcome to the LGBT community. To this day the voices of fear and ignorance dominate the public discussion of human sexuality issues. LC/NA continues to learn of Lutheran churches that shun LGBT worshipers, and sometimes their parents, siblings, children and friends also are vilified. A general statement of welcome is heard by most LGBT people as "everybody but me," so the RIC program strives to make clear the policy of those Lutheran communities where all people truly are welcomed as full members, regardless of their sexual orientation, their gender identity, or that of their family or friends.

Here at Grace we began our journey in earnest to become an RIC congregation in 2003, when a group studied the ELCA's "Journey Together Faithfully, Part 2: The Church and Homosexuality." That study document was part of the process for the ELCA to learn together and decide on recommendations to be presented to a future Church-wide convention, particularly relating to ordination of LGBT candidates for the ministry. The members of Grace's study group concluded that:

- There should not be any extraordinary barriers to the ordination of LGBT pastoral candidates.
- The church at large should develop formal ways to recognize and bless committed same-sex relationships, even if civil authorities may not recognize those unions.
- Grace should consider becoming an RIC congregation and adopt an Affirmation of Welcome that would affirm our core values of treasuring diversity, striving to be a caring community, and seeking ways to put our faith into action courageously.

Following the study group's recommendations, our entire congregation had opportunities to join in the conversation and to explore the relevant issues in small groups or in private reflection with our pastors, Revs. Stefan Rickman and Kaari Reierson. We especially were blessed that Pastor Kaari, as the Associate Director of the Church in Society at ELCA, was working with the diverse committee that was sanctioned by the ELCA to produce the deliberative documents and recommendations for action, so we had the benefit of her understanding of the issues and the pulse of the ELCA.

A proposed Affirmation of Welcome was submitted for consideration at Grace's May 23, 2004 annual congregational meeting.

Our congregation voted to adopt the proposed Affirmation of Welcome, which now is proudly proclaimed on our Web site and is included in our bulletin every Sunday. Our congregation also voted to register as an RIC Congregation, and Grace is listed in the LC/NA database for anyone who is searching for a local ELCA RIC congregation.

Grace's Micah 6:8 ministry came to be when a group of sisters and brothers felt called to take the next step in carrying out Grace's Affirmation of Welcome. The ministry's name comes from the simple yet profound appeal of the prophet Micah to respect and honor all members of God's creation: "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God?"

In May 2009 Grace took a bold step beyond our RIC identity. The Micah 6:8 ministry proposed an amendment to Grace's constitution, which the Grace church council recommended to the congregation, that would allow Grace to call a qualified minister with gifts that would be a best fit for Grace, regardless of his/her sexual orientation or gender identity. That same recommendation would be considered – and, remarkably, would be passed - at the Churchwide Assembly in August, but when Grace considered adopting it, it meant that we would be in principled non-compliance with the ELCA and in risk of sanctions by the synod. To add to our crazy gamble, at the time of the vote Pastor Daniel had only completed the second year of his service to Grace, so a clergy call wasn't even in our cards! Nevertheless, our congregation felt called to acknowledge that so many of the best candidates for ordained ministry were denied that path of service in the ELCA, and Grace unanimously adopted the proposed constitutional amendment.

When in August 2009 the ELCA Church-wide Assembly resolved to ordain qualified candidates in committed same-sex relationships, Grace no longer needed to take the next step to amend our constitution, and just like that we went from rogue congregation to joyous supporters of our denomination's determination for justice and full inclusion. Our celebration of what we saw as the essence of the call of the prophet Micah, though, was tempered by the recognition of the pain of other ELCA congregations. We continue to consider how to reconcile with congregations who disagree with us on the issue of full inclusion; we also continue to seek ways to be genuinely welcoming to the LGBT community.

From the Council

It is hard to believe that six weeks have already passed since Pastor Daniel left for sabbatical. During that time we have continued to worship together, cared for each other and have strived to be good stewards of our many gifts. As a congregation we are more than fortunate to have the spiritual guidance of Pastors Kaari Reierson, Jen Rude and Raquel Rodriquez and an active Worship committee under the guidance of Mark Bowman, Grace's Music Director. We also feel the support of several local pastors who made themselves available to us for emergency pastoral care. Marie O'Brien is keeping the church office humming along. Thank you all.

On Wednesday, June 19 the new Church Council convened for its first meeting. Martha Fry and Jarrod Gaither join Holly O'Connor, Dorothy Nagelbach, Jon Flaherty, Nate Johnson, Laura Wally and Les Inch. Russ Kohnken attended the meeting as Church Treasurer. Martha and Jarrod will serve as the Council's Education liaisons.

Wednesday's meeting focused mainly on Grace's finances and rightly so. At the May 5, 2013 Congregational Meeting, it was reported that Grace had fulfilled its 2012 benevolences (Partners in Ministry.) That was not accurate and the Council apologizes for the misinformation. The major deficiency was a \$9,000 shortfall to the Synod. This has been corrected and a check for that amount was sent to the Bishop on June 14 with our apology for the delay. In total, \$24,537 was provided in 2012 benevolences. These are from the operating budget, and do not include the donations made from the Courage Fund.

The error raises significant concerns, both of policy and procedures as well as Grace's commitments. On the policy and procedural front, the Finance Committee, established in April 2011 but relatively inactive over the past twelve months, will be re-convened. The Committee's purpose is to "ensure the accurate, prudent, re-

liable and transparent accounting of and oversight for all of Grace's financial obligations." Members of that Committee include the Treasurer (Russ Kohnken), and representatives from the Capital Campaign (Peter Spies), Courage Fund (Paul Bailey), Church Council (Nate Johnson) and members-at-large (Anne Laurence.)

The Committee is seeking an additional member-at-large.

Grace will return to using Powerchurch [online version], the tracking software we have used in the past. A plan to use a QuickBooks online program was not successful. Powerchurch has been ordered. It will take some time to set up and load our data for 2013. When caught up (estimated time frame is the end of summer), we will be able to prepare contribution statements more readily and accurately maintain records.

Regarding our commitment, the Grace community is very generous in sharing our gifts. While our history is one of meeting our budgeted benevolence late in the year and even dipping into the next year, we have met them. While doing so, we are also reaching the audacious Courage Fund goal of giving away \$75,000 and working at keeping up with the \$385,000 members pledged to the Capital Campaign.

The Congregation and the Council are committed to fulfilling our budgetary commitments. However, as of June 15, 2013, we are \$20,000 short of the revenue needed to meet year-to-date 2013 expenses. This includes being on track for benevolences. To-date, \$1,870 (of a budgeted \$24,200) has been distributed for 2013 benevolences.

The Council has been asked to review paying benevolences before any other obligations are met. This was discussed with Pastor Daniel at the May Council meeting and again at the June meeting. The Council reaffirms its commitment to meet all obligations. The Treasurer, with the support of the Council and the Finance Committee, will review monthly expenditures to determine payment schedules so benevolences can be paid more timely. However, we do not feel it prudent or responsible to establish benevolences above all else as policy. Our obligations to staff and obligations to the ministries which regularly use our space (YOU, Family Promise, Samaritan Center) are equally important.

We know the challenges, so what are the solutions? We will grapple with this soon when we meet to plan the 2014 budget. We need everyone's participation as a problem-solver.

In the meantime, if you wish to make a special contribution for benevolences please do so. Mark the contribution accordingly. Also, please call a Council member with any questions. The Council meets next on July 10 at 7 PM. If you would like to join the meeting for any part please let Les Inch know.

ies. The Third Sunday of every month, Grace Lutheran provides a week's worth of breakfast foods for the Interfaith Action of Evanston Hospitality Center for the Homeless. During "Grace's" week, , Susan Murphy and her staff will provide breakfast daily for about 40 guests at the Center.

We shop for and deliver frozen waffles, 5 or more bags of citrus fruit, 60+ yogurt cups, oatmeal packets, 8 loaves of bread, butter, jams, syrup, milk, 6 gallons of orange juice, 6 gallons of other fruit juices, graham crackers, salars and grant and grant of the syrup and gr

tine crackers, snack crackers, coffee cans and cream, 6-8 cream cheese packages, teabags, sugar, cocoa canisters in quantity, needing enough for over 200 breakfasts in five days. The shopping list usually amounts to \$160 -\$200 beyond whatever non-perishable items are donated.

Report on the Metro Chicago Synod Assembly of May 31- June 1, 2013

Bob Carroll and Ginny Ayers were chosen to be the Grace delegates to the annual assembly, held this year in the Tinley Park Convention Center. The 45-mile drive each way X4 gave us time to plan our days on the easy commutes down and discuss events in the traffic jams on the way back home.

Always Being Made New was the theme of the assembly this year in celebration of the 25th anniversary of the forming of the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America), our national church body. The MetroChicago Synod is one of 65 synods that comprise the 4.2 million member Lutheran church in the United States and the Caribbean.

We heard reports from the ELCA representative, VP Carlos E. Pena, and we voted for candidates for the offices of Synod Bishop, Synod Vice President, and Synod Secretary. While multiple ballots were expected, all three incumbents were re-elected with only two ballots. The officers are: Bishop Wayne Miller, VP Nanette Dahlke, and Secretary Rev. Steven Srock.

Outstanding (in the opinion of your delegates) was the keynote address given by Rev. Herbert W. Chilstrom, the first Bishop of the ELCA from founding in 1987 to 1995. His address included very interesting highlights of the early years with humorous mention of the debate on where to locate the national headquarters, as well as personal memories of his journey of faith from youth to his present 81 years. He reminded us all to take a chance and invite people to come to church, a habit formed from his early job selling door to door.

We heard reports from all the officers, ate lunch with the churches in our conference, and then attended workshops on topics which included: Peace in the Holy Land, Boy Scout of America troops sponsored by ELCA congregations, Ministry to same-gender couples and families, and financial issues for congregations.

A confession: we did not attend the worship service at the end of the first day because we needed to get back home for family obligations. From what we heard, we missed a beautiful service.

We began our 2nd day with a brief service of hymns, Bible readings, and devotions. Elections for synod council and 2 committees were held. The highlight of this day was the address on the state of the synod given




by Bishop Wayne Miller. While he gave a good report on the past history of the synod, of special note was his idea to create Affiliate Mission Communities, groups of worshipers who meet outside of traditional church buildings under the guidance of a missionary. The goal of the AMCs is outreach to those who will never affiliate with traditional congregations. The 2014 budget was passed, and several resolutions and memorials were debated and passed.

Anniversaries of congregations and individual ministers were noted. Bob and I stood up when Grace's 75th anniversary was announced, and former Grace pastor Rev. Frederick Reklau stood up when he was honored for his coming 50th anniversary of ministry. Two new congregations, Iglesia de la Santa Cruz and Naperville Yuhlin Church, were welcomed into the synod. While at the assembly, we enjoyed meeting up with former Grace member Barb Hiller from Trinity Lutheran in Glenview and Rev. Dawn M. Mass from Messiah Lutheran Church in Wauconda.

Thank you for allowing us to represent Grace at this assembly and for the exciting opportunities to hear of the work of the synod and national bodies of our Lutheran Church. While we know that we do important work in our own community, it is always broadening to realize that we are also part of state, national, and global work as well.


