CRS Day of Faith in Action in Springfield

Last week, Grace sent several members to Springfield, IL for the Community Renewal Society's Day of Faith in Action. More than 460 adults, youth and children from more than 75 member congregations jumped on the bus to lobby our elected officials, to rally and to pray.



This year we stood up to secure second chances for people with nonviolent criminal records, and won passage of House Bill 3061. After four years of staying record-free with a nonviolent felony charge, this bill ensures a citizen can apply for work without fear of being turned down because of their past. Of course, the police and federal government will still have access to these records. No police or law enforcement agency fought this bill, nor did any business group or chamber of commerce, especially after we made reasonable changes to it. Now it goes to the Senate, where we believe it has a very good chance of advancing. If it passes, it will immediately change the lives of tens of thousands who have already been out of jail for four years or more, allowing them to re-integrate back into society by applying for jobs, to support and raise their families, to pay their taxes-not enter back into the prison system which, as you know, costs taxpayers more money and further destabilizes communities all over the state. Also, Governor Quinn is issuing an executive order that will remove criminal background pre-screening questions on state employment applications, which is an incredible victory in and of itself!

All of this is a great lesson in persistence, hope and the power of working together as people of

faith to inspire change. Bob and Gail Lamont, Bob Carroll, Joe Flint, Ginny Ayers and I were up 'dark and early' (4:30am or thereabouts) on Tuesday, April 16 so we could make our bus departure from Irving Park Baptist Church. We piled in with many north side Community Renewal Society members, and settled in for the

long ride to Springfield. Before we arrived we were briefed on the specific bills and meeting topics for the day. Most of us were placed with an Evanston group made up of Grace and the Evanston Unitarian Church. We had great spirit and organization, already having won meetings with Senator Daniel Biss and Representative Robyn Gabel earlier in the week. We met two other reps outside of our district at the rail (the area next to the entrance of the House). Our mission was to ask all representatives of the state to fight for HB 3061 and also include the titling of guns, background checks, and penalties for lost and stolen firearms in an upcoming bill already put forth by Speaker Mike Madigan.

It wasn't until we went to the cafeteria for lunch that I realized how many of us in orange CRS shirts were there: more than 460 made the trip this year, and it was an impressive sight (the first year I went we had about 150 people). Almost 500 CRS members met with dozens of reps from all over the state throughout the day, standing in line at the rail for hours, trying to catch reps as they left their offices, tirelessly calling and texting their offices to get some face time. One of the pastors who led the final prayer vigil spoke about how he mistakenly believed for years that if he just voted, he was taking care of his civic duty. "But no," he went on, "you need to add your voice to your vote!" That's what we experienced together in Springfield this year.

Once we were finished with our meetings, we held a nonviolent action in the capitol rotunda. When we

arrived in Springfield we were all given a name of someone who had been killed by gun violence to wear on our backs, so when the call went out in the rotunda, all 460 of us (how tragic that with more than 500 deaths in 2012, even we couldn't bear the total name count on our bodies) lay down on the ground showing our tags. It was a kind of 'die-in', meant to ritualize the darkness of what guns and hatred continue to do in the City of Chicago. We then held a brief prayer vigil near the Lincoln Statue and boarded the buses for home. It was an exhausting day, but an energizing one.

I hope you might consider joining us next year, as we build more people of faith into a powerful and loving advocacy bloc to inspire change in our communities. Add your Christian voice to your vote! The treatment plan at this unique 209-acre facility includes training on a fully functional farm and equips the residents with the work skills they'll need to find gainful employment once their recovery is stable. Our group will participate in the Farm's Youth Servant Project, helping out with the farm, kitchen and any area of need. After our work, we've built in some time for play, and will be spending two days at Sky Ranch Lutheran Camp in the mountains outside of Denver. We may even be able to squeeze in a whitewater rafting outing! We'll be raising funds throughout the summer and thank the congregation in advance for all of their support.





Pastor Dawn Mass Update

A recent article in Christian Century magazine featured a former interim minister for Grace, Pastor Dawn Mass. Pastor Dawn is now senior pastor at Messiah Lutheran Church in Wauconda, IL. Her associate, Pastor Ben Dueholm, wrote about a series of sermons they developed together, featuring the lives of saints, both ancient and modern. They decided to weave these saints' lives into sermons based on the common lectionary, and they resolved to make their sermons more than mere historical lectures.

For Reformation Sunday, the sermon focused on a New World reformer, 16th century priest Bartolome de las Casas, an antislavery

activist. Another sermon compared the life of 13th century Princess Elizabeth of Hungary with our present-day princess culture. Other saints included 19th century Danish philosopher Soren Kierkegaard, 20th century martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and the 2011 Nobel Peace Prize winner, Lemyah Gbowee of Liberia.

Pastors Dawn and Ben found the congregants at Messiah became fascinated with the lives of these saints and asked for expanded discussions about them in their adult forum series.

ELCA concludes its earthquake-relief efforts in Haiti

CHICAGO (ELCA) -- The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) has concluded its relief and recovery efforts in Haiti following the January 2010 earthquake - the most powerful to strike Haiti in more than 200 years.

Nearly 250,000 people were killed, 300,000 injured and more than 1 million people were left homeless as a result of the earthquake. Through Lutheran Disaster Response, ELCA members responded by donating more than \$12.5 million dollars to support relief efforts, which were conducted in partnership with the Lutheran Church in Haiti and The Lutheran World Federation.

According to the Rev. Raquel Rodriguez, director for the ELCA Latin American and Caribbean Continental desk, ELCA members "can see the fruits of their generosity."

Funds provided by ELCA members supported immediate and long-term recovery that rebuilt communities, and restored and sustained lives.

In Gressier, located near the Haitian capital of Port au Prince, new community centers were built to provide space for training and education projects established by the Lutheran Church in Haiti. These projects include vocational training to teach workers how to build homes that are stronger and more disaster-resistant and a Montessori-based primary school.

In addition to these projects, there are income-generating endeavors such as a dairy that sells yogurt processed from locally-produced milk, guest house facilities for visitors to the church and a factory that creates and sells vibrated cement blocks. These sturdy blocks were used for the construction of each of these facilities and other rebuilding efforts.

The Lutheran Church in Haiti anticipates that these projects will generate income "not only for people in this community, but also for the church. Part of the income (to be) generated will come back to the church for mission and evangelism. So, it is really important to celebrate all the things that have been enabled by the funds that ELCA members have provided," said Rodriguez.

ELCA funds sent to Lutheran World Federation supported the federation's construction of a newly created community called The Gressier Model Village with 150 homes and a community center -- all built to resist earthquakes and hurricane-force winds and rain. Families started moving into the village this spring. Dr. Carl Stecker, ELCA director for global diakonia, attended the February 2013 dedication ceremony and toured the community.

"A lot of the rhetoric [talk] immediately after the earthquake by former Presidents Clinton and Bush and others in the international community was 'let's build Haiti back better' and this was a way we as the Lutheran church have responded with our partners in the Lutheran World Federation," said Stecker.

The ELCA's long-term relief providing housing, education and lifeskills training "is a very affirmative way of accompanying the people in Haiti. Not only in the immediate (aftermath), but in a way that will have long-lasting effects," said Rodriguez.

In the midst of the recovery efforts, disaster funds were also provided to help contain an outbreak of cholera. The church responded to the epidemic by establishing programs to teach Haitians about the causes of cholera and ways to prevent the spread of the disease. The program continues through a grant from ELCA World Hunger.

The ELCA is a member of The Lutheran World Federation, a global communion of 143 member churches in 79 countries worldwide, and is the communion's only member church from the United States. The Lutheran Church in Haiti is pursuing membership in the federation.
