- About The Bible. The Bible was written by human authors, under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is the supreme source of truth for Christian beliefs about living. Because it is inspired by God, it is truth without error. - About Jesus Christ the Son. Jesus Christ is completely human but, at the same time, completely God. - About Mankind. Man is made in the image of God and is the supreme object of His creation. Man was created to have fellowship with God but became separated in that relationship through sinful disobedience. As a result, man cannot attain a right relationship with God through his own effort. - About Salvation. The blood of Jesus Christ, shed on the cross, provides the only way of salvation through the forgiveness of sin. Salvation is a gift from God, and it cannot be earned through our own efforts. - About Baptism. After a person accepts Jesus as Savior, they are to be baptized. Baptism is an external sign of an internal change. This is not to suggest that baptism saves a person. Faith in Christ is what saves. However, baptism is a step of obedience that every believer is expected to take to identify with the death, burial and resurrection. It is your opportunity to "go public"! Just like a bride and groom show others their love for one another by wearing wedding bands, your baptism is an opportunity to show others that you have accepted Christ and are now walking with him. It represents that you have been washed clean! It demonstrates a believers' submission to God and their willingness to follow Him. *Some denominations choose to "christen" or "sprinkle" infants. The idea of infant baptism may be commendable as people strive to dedicate their child to God. However, infant baptism is not a religious rite found in the Bible and at times leads people to equate salvation with baptism. While we recognize the right of other churches to practice infant christening, we understand Scripture to teach that only professing believers qualify for baptism. For those who may have been "baptized" as infants, you're not deleting it, but completing it.

• **About Communion.** Communion, also know as the Lord's Supper, is the remembrance of the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross and His rising from the grave. We do this as Jesus directed us at the Last Supper by eating a piece of bread that symbolizes his broken body and by drinking grape juice that symbolizes his blood (Matthew 26:17-30).

For centuries, churches have pulled out wine or grape juice to symbolize the shedding of His blood as well as used bread in various forms. For us, it's not about how big the cup is or what type of bread it is - it's about remembering that we can't save ourselves. It's about slowing down and realizing that we have hope in One who knows our name, knows our story with all the yuck, and loves and accepts us anyway.

We believe there is no significance in the bread or grape juice itself. What is significant is what these elements represent. Although scripture says Jesus used wine, we choose to use grape juice because we know younger members will be present and to be mindful of the convictions of some believers. Currently communion is celebrated once a month at GracePoint. I Corinthians 11:23-26, Mark 14:22-25, Luke 22:17-20, I Corinthians 10:16-17
