Stewardship & Pledging



Long before my arrival as pastor, Groome Church employed the fundamental characteristics of good stewardship. One need only look at the building and its appointments to conclude that Groome has long been a "no frills" church. Frugality can be attributed to a multitude of sources: locale, personality of leadership, pastoral characteristics and even the fact that Groome was, for most of its life, a Methodist Protestant Church. This particular subdivision of Methodism has long held the reputation of being less formal in worship and much simpler in church adornments. The remnants of this philosophy of identity still exist to this day.

This is clearly nothing to criticize. Upon my arrival I discovered a church with over \$200,000 in endowment, who habitually paid all of its bills, had done a good job maintaining the facilities and had a modest "wish list" of fundamental improvements. All of this has been accomplished through congregational generosity, attentive diligence and "penny-pinching" leadership over the long history of our church. Because it has worked so well, we have become complacent with this mode of operation. After all, if it isn't broken, don't fix it!

Well, the moment of truth has arrived. This operating on what I shall call the "honor system"; a system whereby it is assumed the congregation has both the will and means to annually fund the operation of our church, without any real projection as to what the yearly income will be, has run its course. For one thing, in the past decade, the cost to operate this, and any church, has blossomed exponentially. During the same period, membership has remained remarkably flat, more members are on fixed income and programs and ministries remained the same, as the cost to maintain a full-time pastor (especially without a parsonage) has soared.

We all need to take a sobering look at the facts. The annual budget for Groome Church has remained the same during my three plus years as pastor. We have done a remarkable job of holding the line at \$178,000. However, the income side of the equation has not come close to matching our expenses. Just so, you can understand how expensive it has become to maintain a full-time pastor; my salary which has not changed since I arrived, and benefits account for approximately two-thirds of our total budget.

During this past year we incurred \$28,000 in unbudgeted legal fees associated with the sale of our New Road property. After adding in other extraordinary expenses, our total operating expense for 2017 came very close to \$210,000. Our total income was \$149,000 which included \$12,000 of interest income transferred to our general fund from our Ameriprise Investments. In short, in order to pay all of our bills, we had to transfer \$85,000 from our investment principle, which means our current investment balance is \$121,000 in contrast to the over \$200,000 we had a little over three years ago. Simple math leads to the unsettling conclusion that we have just one more year in which we can operate at this level of financial short-fall; or we will go out of business waiting for our multi-million dollar windfall.

It turns out that math is not our friend. Even if the budget had no extraordinary expense (which is impossible) Groome Church is funded by roughly 68 giving units (family units). We only have 200 members, and when you factor in the people who rarely attend, married couples as one giving unit, those with very limited income, the numbers are quickly reduced. One does not need a Ph.D. in macro-economic theory to determine that 68 giving units goes into \$178,000 about 2,600 times with a considerable amount left over. In other words, every one of our giving units would have to contribute at least \$2,600 a year to meet the budget. Obviously, that does not happen.

The good news is that we are clearly not a bunch of "spend-thrifts", the bad news is that we are clearly not a bunch of "spend-thrifts." There is no fat to cut out of our spending. We operate at a truly modest level. In short, the only place where we can make an adjustment that will help alleviate the problem is with the income side of the equation.

We all know from our own personal experience, it is impossible to make any intelligent estimate of our financial situation without first knowing how much income we can rely upon having in the course of a year.
