Hanging of the Greens

Sunday, December 3

You are invited to bring the spirit of Advent to Haslett Community Church at Hanging of the Greens on Sunday, December 3rd 4:00 p.m. We will make and hang wreaths for the windows of the church. The youth will decorate the tree in the sanctuary and the youth room downstairs. There will be a crafty Christmas activity for all the young ones. Bring the whole family and some friends, too, for a night of gathering to prepare our church for the Advent and Christmas seasons. There will be a soup supper and brief worship service to center ourselves for this wonderful time in our lives together. We need lots of hands to create over 25 wreaths! If possible, please bring gloves and clippers. Please sign up on the Social Committee kiosk for Hanging of the Greens.



This month brings our annual joy of multiple Christmas Eve services as we'll again celebrate the miraculous gift of God becoming one of us in Jesus. Since this year is one of the rare times that Christmas Eve is on a Sunday, the first service will be at our regular 10am Sunday morning service time (instead of our usual Christmas Eve time of 4pm) and then again at 7 o'clock and 9 o'clock. Infant and toddler care will be

provided at the 10am and 7pm services, but not at the 9 o'clock one.

The 10am service (like our usual 4pm Christmas Eve service) will be a family service oriented to children. There will be costumes available for them to dress up as different characters in the Christmas story. The service will also be a bit shorter than our usual Sunday morning worship- probably about 45 minutes.

The 7pm service will be the same as it's long been with the same Christmas readings from Scripture, the same classic and favorite carols, and the same closing candlelight during "Silent Night". As we've done the last several years, though, at 9 o'clock we'll offer a service that's a bit different.

In it, the closing candlelight during Silent Night will be unchanged and, as always, Scripture's Christmas story will be featured. Yet we'll also include Christmas readings from contemporary sources and although the carols will again be classic and favorite, they won't all be the same as at 7pm. The overall mood will be more contemplative.

In all three services we'll rejoice again in the great gift of Emmanuel- God with us!



On the first Sunday in December, we begin the Advent season, that time of the church year in which we get ready to celebrate Christmas. As we all know, a big part of traditional Christmas preparation is preparing gifts that we'll give at Christmas time. As I suspect we also all know, this can frequently be a challenging task, especially as we try to get the gift that's "just right" for those we're giving to.

Garrison Keillor writes about what it's like to receive a Christmas gift that you feel is NOT right for you. He says, "A Christmas gift represents somebody's theory of who you are, or who they wish you were . . . but what if you see yourself as a suave dude and a swift intellect and then one year your wifeyour wife- gives you a pair of singing undershorts that perform 'O Tannenbaum' when you sit down . . . That's when you go through a sort of identity crisis.

"You'd like to get a gift that aims high . . . instead here is a pair of bedroom slippers with lights in the toes so you can see your way to the bathroom at night . . ."

That sort of thing can be hard to take. Gifts can painfully remind us that people we love and whom we know love us nevertheless sometimes see us very differently from the way we see ourselves.

What do we do with that? Garrison Keillor suggests that we learn not to expect too much from the gifts that others give to us. He says, "There is, for each person, a perfect gift, your heart's desire, (but) nobody can give it to you except yourself."

I wonder about that. A gift is simply something that we're given. Are we sometimes given things that we never would have asked for, things that we never would have chosen for ourselves, but that turn out to bring some of the best that we know?

I taught high school for eight years. One of my most vivid memories of that time is the day one of my students, Kenny Leonesio, spoke with great passion and conviction to our class about the incredible gift his brother had been to the life of his family. His brother had been born with Down's syndrome and people from outside the family sometimes expressed pity to them about him.

Kenny said the real pity would have been if his family had not received the gift of his brother. Because of him, they had come to know and share a depth and quality of love among themselves that they had never known before. They had been forced to make changes in their lives which they should

have made sooner. They had become much better people because of his brother's presence in their family.

In my years as a minister, I've sometimes heard people speak of serious illness or some other significant burden as a gift. Not one that they wanted or that they would ever have chosen for themselves, but one that helped to put their lives in truer perspective. These were gifts that unexpectedly helped to draw their families closer together and served to bring out the best in them.

It's similar to the gift we're getting ready to celebrate at Christmas time. We're once again preparing to celebrate the birth of Jesus which is certainly one of our biggest and best celebrations. Yet the Bible reminds us that at the first nativity the baby Jesus wasn't seen by many people as much of a gift at all.

Mary hears from the angel that she'll have a baby out of wedlock, and she's deeply troubled. Joseph hears from Mary that she's pregnant, and he's very unhappy. When the baby is born and King Herod hears of it, he's ready to kill.

It doesn't get much better when the baby grows up. At one point, some in his family think he's gone mad and want to put him away. The people in his hometown run him out of town. He's not the kind of Messiah most people want or expect.

He won't take up a sword to kick out the Romans. He hangs out with too many of the wrong kinds of people. He insists that the way to greatness is to be the servant of all.

Finally, the religious and political leaders of his day nail him to a cross. Those who profess to be his followers run away. As he dies, there's no one around who sees him as much of a gift at all.

But we see it all so much differently now! We see that this Jesus may not be the gift we would have thought we wanted or that we would have chosen for ourselves or that we would have identified as our heart's desire. Yet now we see that he's so much more than that. He is true God.

He is true God and the sign of God's great desire for us. Through him we're given unexpected and unasked for gifts that we wouldn't and couldn't give to ourselves. His gifts of the deepest hope, peace, joy, and love, put our lives into true perspective. They draw us closer together and bring out the best in us.

That's why our Christmas celebration is always among our biggest and best. It reminds us more than any other that indeed the Lord is come!"





third Sunday of each month during the school year with this month's meeting scheduled for Sunday, December 17th at 11:15am in the church library. The



hear his parents singing that song to each other. They usually did this only when they did not think he was around. Many years later his father lay dying in the hospital. When he got to the room where his father was, he saw his mother sitting next to his father's bed. She was holding his hand, stroking his head gently, and singing softly through her tears, "Have I told you lately that I love you?"

Romance is about the little things. Yes, it is. It is about brushing the snow off her car, making his favorite dessert, saying "thank you," watching the kids for the day, fixing the toaster, giving a hug for no special reason, and saying "I'm sorry."

The spiritual life is about the little things too. It's about getting up fifteen minutes earlier to pray. It's about subscribing to a religious magazine. It's about taking some blueberries to the elderly couple across the street. It's about volunteering for a church ministry. It's about trying to be more attentive with the kids.

When we die, we might find ourselves asking Jesus, "Have I told you lately that I love you? And hopefully, we just might hear Jesus say to us, "not only have you told me. You showed me in a million little ways your whole life long!".
