Christmas is certainly an unforgettable experience in South Sudan! Without all the commercialization it's easier to see Christ at the center of the holiday. There is no tradition of gift-giving at this time of year, so you won't find tribesmen running through the market trying to find presents. A new set of clothes is often bought, but even that isn't necessary. So what's so special about Christmas here? Community! South Sudanese don't think as much about *family* gatherings as about *community* gatherings.

At the Hope4Sudan Compound, a bull is purchased for the Christmas celebration each year. It's slaughtered after a late night prayer meeting on Christmas Eve. The boarding boys then start cooking the meat over open fires at 4 a.m. so it will be ready to eat by late afternoon on Christmas Day. This slow-cooked beef, along with beans and *nyatap* (cornmeal mush) is served to more than a thousand tribesmen who come to celebrate together. Prior to the grand feast there's a celebration service in the church with singing and dancing Toposa-style. A Christmas you're sure to never forget!

During our recent itineration in the States we met Travis and Jessi Lowe out of Bluefield, West Virginia.

After speaking in their church, our friendship continued developing. When God gave them a burden to come over and see the work here, plans soon began to formulate.

Just last month, God brought the Lowes to South Sudan. They ministered to us while also scouting out the place in preparation for a future team. Their team, which is being planned for next year, will help teach and train our young men on church leadership and the Holy Spirit.
