*The paraments on the altar and pulpit, along with the ministers’ stoles provide us with visual cues about the meaning of our faith. The color of the season is purple, used to indicate royalty and suffering alike, a reminder of Christ’s kingship and the suffering he endured for us all. Throughout Lent we undertake a journey of self-discovery leading to repentance and renewal. The symbol is comprised of the two Greek letters, chi and rho, the first two letters in the Greek word Christos, meaning Christ. The Acolyte brings light to the altar as a reminder of Christ, the Light of life, and leads us out of the sanctuary as a reminder that we are to take this light to the world. In the same way, we begin and end our worship following the cross as a symbol of God’s self-giving love for us all.*

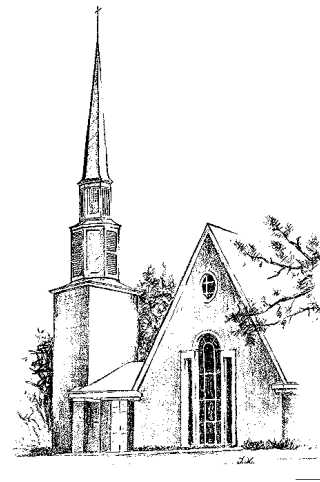

## WE WELCOME OUR GUEST WORSHIP LEADERS

We are privileged today to have several guests join us in worship. We are grateful for their particular gifts and for their willingness to share them with us.

Bishop Peter Witbooi and Rev. Sikawu Makubalo, of Johannesburg, South Africa, participated this weekend in the Responsible Outreach Conference hosted by Duke University Divinity School. The conference was organized by Allen Stanton, son of Cheryl and Joe Stanton. Allen is pursuing his Master of Divinity degree at Duke University Divinity School and will serve as our lay reader today.

Bishop Peter Witbooi's episcopal area includes the urban area of Johannesburg, mining communities, agricultural areas, and informal townships. Throughout his career, Bishop Peter has confronted Apartheid and been an advocate for a variety of social issues within South Africa. Bishop Witbooi has worked and continues to work closely with leaders across South Africa. He has a passion for missions, education, and anti-poverty efforts. We are grateful to have him preaching for us today.

Rev. Sikawu Makubalo began his ministry in a mining community outside of Johannesburg. Currently, he serves as the minister of a church in the northern suburbs of Johannesburg, working to integrate the congregation. He also serves as the chair of the missions and outreach committee for the Central District, working closely with Bishop Witbooi. He has a passion for reconciliation, building sustainable community partnerships, and working with impoverished areas. Rev. Makubalo spoke to the Discussion Class this morning.

We are grateful to have Phil Valera return as our guest organist. Phil is the Assistant Professor for Audio Recording Technology at Barton College's Department of Communication and Performing Arts. He has served as the Music Director/Organist at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Wilson from 2001 to 2011. Prior to coming to Wilson in 2000, he served as an organist/choirmaster in Lakeland, Florida, and Sarasota, Florida. A Massachusetts native, he received his music degrees from Boston University. He lives in Wilson with his wife Debbie.

## ANOTHER TASTE OF LAKESIDE

In 2004 the ladies of Lakeside Circle 10 published their first cookbook, *A Taste of Lakeside*. Virtually everyone in the church contributed recipes, over 500 recipes in all, creating a delicious snapshot of the great cooks and families in our church. From the sale of the cookbooks and gifts from the Circle membership, approximately \$15,000 has been given to support missions. From the 1,350 cookbooks ordered in 2004, fewer than 50 are left. Recently the group determined that it was time to create a new cookbook, and they are asking for everyone's support in making this project another great success.
