SIGHT, SOUND AND SILENCE: STILL LENT

The psalmist implores us to "be still and know...." This Lenten season we will explore the ways in which sights, sounds, and silence can influence and deepen our faith. Our Lenten journey begins on March 6 at 6:30 p.m. with our Ash Wednesday service which includes communion and the imposition of ashes.

As a family of faith, we will enjoy a pancake supper preceding worship. Join us in Robbins Hall between 5:15-6:15 p.m. for a Shrove Tuesday (on Wednesday) fellowship meal.

We have also been invited to join sister churches for Lenten Midweek Services throughout the season. Each week we will gather with our friends from Englewood Methodist, First Methodist, and St. Andrews Episcopal churches for a brief noon Lenten service followed by lunch together. Each service will be led by the host church with a minister from one of the other churches offering a reflection.

The first Midweek Service will be held on Wednesday, March 13, at Englewood United Methodist Church. Rev. Matt Seaton will preach. A luncheon will follow.

THIS I BELIEVE: DEVOTIONS FOR A LENTEN JOURNEY

Our Lenten devotions this year will use the prompt "This I Believe," based on the NPR series of the same name. As we still our souls long enough to look closely and listen carefully, we become more fully present to God and are better able to discern God's presence in our lives. We invite you to reflect on your life and write your own personal statement of belief, focusing on the principles which guide your thoughts and actions. Consider sharing a story which illustrates what you've come to believe, how you reached these beliefs, and how your beliefs have grown or changed through the years.

Last spring we wrote poems titled "Where I'm From" which shared something about the roots which anchor our lives. In doing so, we discovered new things about one another and were blessed by the experience of opening our lives a bit more to the people with whom we worship and serve week by week. In the same way, this year's devotions will give us a better understanding of what has shaped our faith and allow us an opportunity to share our stories.
