Fence Me In!





During her first marriage to a career officer in the US Army, she was fortunate to be able to live in Panama (3 years), Nicaragua (1 year), Belgium (3 years) and Spain (5 years). This is why she speaks Spanish so well! Stateside she has lived in Colorado, California, Arkansas, Kansas, North Carolina and Virginia. Pat was an Army wife for 22 years. She met Emmet while Pat was working as a Physical Therapist in an Occupational Medicine department in Albuquerque. They were married for 14 years.
