Luke 22:19 And He took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me
How significant is communion? Even Jesus took Communion before headed for the cross.
#1 The Names (The Names Are Significant)
Eucharist The English word comes from the Greek word eucharistos which means the "act of gratitude" "grateful language to God, as an act of worship" "giving of thanks"
There are so many things that we can be thankful for. The most important thing is that he sent his Son into the world to die on the cross for our sins even though we didn't deserve it.
Communion Ref: Ephesians 2:13
The Lord's Supper symbolizes the communion we have with C It also symbolizes the communion we have with each other.
Partaking of the Lord's Supper reminds us it is ground level at the foot of the cross. We are equally in need of God's grace.
#2 The Symbolism Is Significant Ref: Matthew 26:26-28 The Bread
The bread symbolizes his b that is about to be broken; it symbolized his l that is about to be taken. He is referring to the crucifixion; he is referring to his death.
In order for us to be saved, it was necessary for the Son of God to die.

When we partake of the bread, we are reminding ourselves of the sacrificial death of Jesus on the cross. He died for us, for our sins. Through his death the price for our sins was paid, for we <u>could</u>

not pay it ourselves.

The Wine.
The wine symbolizes the b of Christ. In the Old Testament we see again and again that blood is required for reconciliation to God. Ref: Hebrews 9:22; Romans 5:9; Eph. Col. 1:20; 1st Jn. 1:7
The communion, the piece of bread and the cup of juice symbolizes a supernatural power greater than we have the capacity to understand.
The body and blood of Jesus, broken for you, shed for you, so that you may have a victorious I I contend we need this meal for I
When you come to the Communion table on Sunday, and you eat the bread and drink the cup, it is to give you the p you need to fight you spiritual enemy.
Two key reasons we celebrate the Lord's Supper.
#1 We Look Backward
#2 We Look Forward Ref: Matthew 26:29
When we celebrate the Lord's Supper, we will not only look back to his sacrificial death on the cross, we look forward to the establishment of his h k on earth.
Taking the Lord's Supper in an unworthy manner refers to going through the motions without serious thought about what this event means.
