Social isolation is one of the fastest growing health concerns in the U.S. According to a 2016 article in the New York Times, the number of adults who say they are lonely has risen from 20% to 40%. Locally, the CDC reports that 20.9% of adults in Contra Costa County have inadequate social support.

From increased risk of heart disease and stroke to exacerbated mental health problems such as depression, loneliness is making us sicker and sadder everyday. And again, according to the New York Times, "isolated individuals are twice as likely to die prematurely as those with more robust social interactions.

Traditionally, the Church was the place where you went in order to save your soul. In our own context, a healthy local church could be the place that might **save your life.** 

The question for us, as we move forward towards creating a new model of being church is how we might reach those folks for whom being part of a healthy community could be life-saving.

At the same time, we have plenty of work to do



to maintain and strengthen our church's vitality.

## Leadership Changes in the Mira Vista Community

At our Semi-Annual meeting on June 18th, Brian Campbell-Miller became the new Moderator for Mira Vista Church. Brian's background in law and real estate will no doubt be helpful as he seeks to lead the Church Council and the congregation into a new model of ministry. Brian and his husband Howard first came to Mira Vista in 2015 and were married here in the church on November 28th of that same year.

During the same meeting, the membership of Mira Vista renewed the **Designated Term Ministry of Rev. Dr. Melinda V. McLain** for another three years. This will allow more time for the implementation of *the GOOD table* keeping the option after these three years still open for converting to a settled call.

In addition, the Church Council has hired **Tom Emanuel** to be our new part-time **Associate** 



Minister for Worship Arts. This new position is an 11-month contract and uses budget monies originally designated for another field ed student plus funds from savings in the music leadership category. The position allows for about 10 hours a week of Tom's time and presence while he is in his final year of studies at Pacific School of Religion. Tom will continue to provide wonderful leadership in worship and will also assist in research and writing tasks associated with *the GOOD table*. Without the academic requirements associated with a field ed position, Tom will be more available to be engaged in these professional tasks.

And finally, the long transition and search for a **new Music Director** is complete. **Tim K. Murphy** joins our community on July 2nd. Tim is an accomplished pianist who has played for

## Good News Report: Creating the GOOD table

In the first year of my Designated Term ministry here at Mira Vista, we met to consider how we might create a new model of ministry that would: reach out and serve more people in our community, meet our own spiritual needs, and be sustainable over time. We also identified our three main passions: food, justice, and the arts. The emerging big idea then became that our church should become a community café that we are now calling the GOOD table: food for body, mind, and spirit.

The **Lean Start-Up process** helped us begin to develop a business plan for the new enterprise and we were also fortunate to become clients of the **New Business Law** practicum at U.C. Berkeley's, Boalt Hall to learn more about the legal ramifications of being a non-profit church operating a business.

In developing the business plan, a triple bottom line emerged that our café would be **financially sustainable**, offer measurable

**social services**, and as a church, provide for the **spiritual well-being** of the community.

Our current version of the business plan for *the GOOD table* describes the new venture:

Objective: to create a sustainable model of community ministry for the members of Mira Vista United Church of Christ that will extend beyond the current members into the future.

Goals: reduce food insecurity,

encourage generosity, decrease social isolation, foster spiritual growth, and celebrate ethical living by creating strong community connections between diverse peoples.

Solution: develop and operate a community café utilizing the "pay-what-you-can" or "pay-it-forward" philosophy and innovative forms of public hospitality focused on food, education, justice, and the arts. We envision a coffee shop with daytime co-working space, pay-what-you-can lunches, and a venue for live music, education, meditation, innovative worship, and special events.

This past year has been spent networking, refining the business plan, and creating "pop-ups" of various parts of the proposed model. At the same time, we have begun to "monitor" the real estate market in El Cerrito/Richmond. Colleen Rodger, Brian Campbell-Miller, have met with Margaret Kavenaugh-Lynch, member of the planning department for the city of El Cerrito to consider our real estate needs and develop a strategy. We have also legally secured the fictitious business name of the GOOD table in Contra Costa County with the assistance of Patsy Severson.

Some of the significant outside relationships developed include: **Dorene Allen** of PSR's Ignite Institute who also teaches social entrepreneurship at the University of San Francisco and at U.C. Berkeley. Dorene has

done a first pass of the business plan and believes we are 80% ready to move forward.

Jim Becker of the Richmond Community

Foundation has expressed his support on behalf of the foundation for the project. In particular, Jim believes that the foundation may be able to partner with us on a pop-up of the food model. We have received some consulting about food service from Carol Gilliland, a chef caterer who operates a business called The Loveable Feast.

We have now had multiple "pop-up" live music events on first Sunday evenings in partnership with our friends at El Cerrito
Natural Grocery (NGC) with jazz duo, Amy
Ukena and Hans Raag including a lovely evening on New Year's Day! For these events,
Howard Campbell created a logo for the
GOOD table and some marketing materials.
We have gotten a few names for our mailing list and very positive comments from folks about our proposed café during these events.
We are considering offering another Sunday evening live music event with Ray Capiral going forward.

I have been holding **community office hours** on Thursday afternoons at Catahoula Coffee, a community-minded local coffee roaster that I hope will become our coffee supplier. This "pop-up" has been interesting and has attracted members, friends from the wider community, and occasional opportunities for ministry to strangers in the coffee shop.

The most financially risky part of the venture is **food service**. On the other hand, being able to serve food is critical to our social service goals, so it is a problem we definitely need to solve. It is unlikely that we will find a building with an existing commercial kitchen, so smart renovation and a well-defined plan are critical to our financial success.

Over the next few months, I hope to **design** and implement a food "pop-up" to test potential locations, experiment with "pay-what-you-can" vs. "pay-it-forward" and look for a signature cuisine that will be popular with the community, flexible, healthy, and easy to serve.

From our retreat with **Bob Pearson** of the **One World Everybody Eats** organization, we
adopted some additional goals for our food
service including **keeping food waste** at a
minimum plus using **local**, **organic**, **and sustainable ingredients**. We would also like
to use **minimal packaging** and **easily cleaned and/or compostable serving vessels**. While this part of the model still feels
daunting, I am hopeful that it will come together
before the end of the year.

On the marketing front, I have created a Facebook page for *the GOOD table* and am now using that to promote our pop-ups and to create an online presence for the project. A UCC colleague who does web consulting, **Bet Hannon**, also secured the domain name **thegoodtableca.org** for us for 99 cents.

This is a big dream and a big project for such a small community. As we go forward, I am hopeful that we will find all the expertise and human resources we need to make it a reality.


