editorial

"God's will is anything but safe"

I have heard, from many over these decades of ministry, that the most comfortable and safe place to be is in the center of God's will. I understand the sentiment. Safety is one of the universal hungers of the human heart.

I believe Jesus was addressing this hunger when he said, "I am the gate for the sheep." (John 10:7) The people hearing Jesus that day, understood the picture much more than most people in our generation. They instinctively knew that the pen for the sheep would normally be a small enclosure of rock stacked high enough for a wolf not to gain entry and to prevent the sheep from escape. They knew that the shepherd for those sheep would lie at night across the opening. Nothing would ever reach the sheep as long as he was the gate! God understands our hunger for safety and Jesus himself said he is our protector.

That being said, I am convinced that scripture teaches clearly that being in the center of God's will is not a "safe" place. When Jesus sent out the twelve (Matthew 10), he sent them out with a list of warnings. They were to proclaim that the kingdom of heaven was near. They were to "Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy and drive out demons." (Matthew 10:7-8) What should they expect in response for all these good works? They should expect people to arrest them, hand them over to local councils and flog them. They should expect people to testify against them, be hated and persecuted. (Matthew 10:17-23)

These twelve men were simply obeying a direct command from the Son of God. The people of Israel were praying for the kingdom of God to come. Can anyone describe a nation of people who would find healing diseases, bringing life to the dead and curing leprosy objectionable? Yet, Jesus warned that doing these things that people

wanted would result in terrible resistance. Jesus warned that obeying him (being in the center of God's will) would result in pain, humiliation and possible death!

God is good, but obeying God is not always going to be safe. C. S. Lewis had this exactly correct in The Chronicles of Narnia. Susan asked the Beavers, "Is he (e.g. Aslan) safe?" Mrs. Beavers replied, "If there's anyone who can appear before Aslan without their knees knocking, they're either braver than most or else just silly." Lucy then asked, "Then he isn't safe?" Then Mr. Beaver said this famous line about Aslan: "Course he isn't safe. But he's good."

There is no place on earth more blessed, more fruitful, more hopeful, more exciting, more productive or more joyful than living our lives in the center of God's will. God is using our lives for the greatest impact both in the immediate sense and the eternal sense. It is absolutely impossible to be anywhere more joyful. However, that joy is defined by the opposition of the world and the persecution sent from Satan and all the powers of Hell.

I hope every one of us, counts the cost and then chooses the joy of God. You think about that!

DID YOU KNOW... The Reality?

Over 200 years ago, THERE WAS A GREAT REVIVAL that took place in North Korea. Churches, and Seminaries were opened and the Gospel was being proclaimed. A great stirring of God's Presence was in that land before the war, before the separation from North and South.... God had blessed the nation. ("Pyongyang Great Revival (1907-1910) - Korea")

Then, the takeover by a Stalin type regime ... Kim, El Sung was the First Leader / Dictator. All the Churches were either destroyed or turned into Government buildings. Many Christians were arrested and either shot or put into concentration camps--believers went into hiding. There would never

be buildings with Crosses on them. The "Religion" now in the North is "Juche" which means "self-reliance," translated to mean: "you take care of yourself".

The Bible is forbidden and those who had a Bible -- or portions of one -- would have to hide it either in their home or in the yard, where other members of the family that were not Christians would be able to find them. The story goes: Little Children were quizzed by their teachers, "have any of you seen this book in your home?" The teacher continues ..." IF you have one in your home, please bring it to class tomorrow, and you will be rewarded with a prize." The Children, wanting a prize, and perhaps having seen a member of the household reading from this "black book," excitingly said to the teacher, "I have, teacher; I have seen that book." The next day, the parents just disappeared, and the children became the ward of the State. The parents no doubt dead for having "HIS BOOK" in their home.

There are so many horror stories, unbelievable persecution and punishment for doing anything against the State of North Korea. A must read: "The Eyes of the Tailless Animals" by: Lee, Sun Ook".

"The Gospel in a Word is ... 'LOVE'"

How can you witness, how can you share the gospel in a land where you cannot open the BIBLE to a North Korean citizen? IF you do so and are reported, that person will either be sent to the Concentration Camp or shot for "listening" to the Word of GOD, or by chance having a Bible or portions of one in his/her possession. How do we witness? The only means is by a smile, a touch, a silent prayer, or prayers at breakfast in the hotel with eyes open. "Walking the Land" and praying that one day the country of North Korea will be free. Showing kindness; helping the sick with medicines; and bringing in

tons and tons of rice, corn, and warm socks, gloves, blankets for the bitter cold, windy winters where the temperatures drop to a miserable 30 below zero. Through us and all the Christian visitors we are allowed to take inside and view our "work," the "Light of God's Holy Spirit" goes within us and shines in a country where NO belief of GOD is allowed. Here is a country of total darkness. The people are brain washed into believing that their hermit country of the North is the greatest of all countries. There are 25 million people in North Korea, and it is for those people that we work night and day! For those that we are allowed to work with, and areas we are allowed to travel, we feel privileged and honored to serve our Father in this way! The worse place to live in the world; yet, we "count it all joy!"

NORTH KOREA / PRESENT EFFORTS


For the past 11 years, your missionaries -- C. Y. and Patricia Kim -- have received the call to go into the communist country of North Korea. As far as we know, we are the ONLY "Foreign Workers" with the Christian Churches/Churches of Christ in the land of this immensely difficult country with residence visas (enabling us to live and work inside). HIS CALL was clear, and we knew beyond doubt, that HE was in it; and so we ventured to North Korea with great determination and zeal to do all we could to establish the ground work for others to follow and reap what we had sown.

Here we are working within a "tiny opening" in the country of North Korea. Here we are sowing seeds and hoping that many years later (or by GOD's grace, tomorrow), we can see the seeds spring forth to provide fruit for HIS

Kingdom... through our labors. 25 million souls live in the country of North Korea and it is for them that we have taken the challenge and entered one of the most dangerous areas to spread the Good News.

Since we are not allowed to share the WORD; we use the following humanitarian works to make contact with the people on a personal basis; showing them how much we care... bringing relief to their suffering, their hunger, and helping with their daily needs! These people are not our enemies. Through Him we want to show HIS love, His Compassion, His Tears for their difficult, unbearable situation.

Within the last 11 years we were able to build and operate through the help of those who have supported and upheld us through prayer! We absolutely cannot do it without YOU and most definitely without HIS ABIDING, PROTECTING, WISDOM!





The Morning Star Children's and Home for Youth:

God teaches us to take care of orphans. HE made the way and we now have built an Orphanage that houses up to 100 children from the ages of infants

- seventeen years old. Here, children have been taken off the streets from begging, and we have made a home for them. For the first time they can eat three meals a day. They can take baths and have clean clothes to wear. Nourish-

ing foods are served and warm beds are slept in! These orphans are allowed to attend public school (something out of the norm). We are making a difference; many of the children have contracted Tuberculosis. We take medicines in on a regular basis; and due to the severity, some of the children have died.

We also have a Youth Home where there are 64 rooms to receive orphans over the age of 17 years old.

We have been able to feed 4,000 children from Day Care to Middle School children every school day within a radius of 35 kilometers, giving fresh made soy bean sweet bread in the Name of

the Father! Cooperating with an already established Milk Factory, CRAM WORLD-WIDE is helping in producing 10,000 cups of Soy Milk among the Day Cares – Middle Schools with a cup of milk daily within a radius of 50 kilometers.

Canaan Clinic, Pi Pa Clinic, Yoo Hyun Dong Clinic's -

We are outfitting these clinics with everything they would need to carry out medical procedures, right down to

every needle, suture. And every building material has been brought in from CHINA. North Korean Doctors of OB/ GYN, Family Practice, Dentists, Minor Surgery and Internal Medicine assist in

the care of the patients. We are providing a bag of rice for each employee and side dishes every month.

We are privileged to enter North Korea with healing through medicines and foreign doctor's visits, showing care to the three different communities of 7,700 residents. Without our presence and the financial help to keep these clinics that we have built sustained, the population in these rural areas would not have their medical needs met.

Canaan Kindergarten and Day Care Center -

Both the *Kindergarten* and *Day Care Centers* have been built to show the rural areas that our hearts are for the children. There are *fifty children in each facility* for whom we provide not only schooling, but also nourishing lunches

as well as bread daily, vitamins, and clothing twice a year, including shoes and rain gear since the children have to walk to school. We have been observed with great respect in the little community as people who care! Also, it provides a way that the mothers can work, as we care for their children.

Good News Farm -

The Farm is a self-supporting program which helps **many farmers** with raising 100 beef cows used for plowing hundreds of acres for seeding. We also give two cows to the Orphanage each year for consumption. We are showing HIS love by clothing, feeding and providing for the farmers some of their daily needs.

So, why are we there again?...

To be a "light" in a dark, dark country, both spiritually and materially. We

take in flashlights that don't require batteries -- all you need to do is shake them. We also take in cranked



lamps that produce "light." Literally thousands of these lights have gone in to North Korea to provide the necessary lighting for the paths the people travel either by walking or riding bikes. There are no street lights -- the city gets a low grade of lighting while the rural areas suffer . . . they nearly have none. *The Light of Jesus Christ is the answer!*

One day ... as we continually pray for Revival to come again through the tireless efforts of many who are laboring in that country as frontier workers ... may HIS love for the North Korean People prevail, and the "Good News" once again be preached.

Reports from the Field

KENYA: Maasai clinic receives half-million dollar grant

CMF International's
Maasai Health Services
clinics recently received
a grant of \$516,000 from
the Presidents' Emergency Fund through
the Centers for Disease
Control (CDC) to provide
HIV/AIDS services in the
Maasai area of Kenya.

CMF began working with the Maasai in Kenya in 1977 and established a medical dispensary within a few years, so medical work has been a part of CMF's ministry there for 30

years. There are now 8 clinics and dispensaries in the Maasai areas of the country. In 2009 these clinics saw 71,000 patients, not including a large number of children who received immunizations and women who received follow-up pregnancy visits. In 2007, one of the clinics won a firstplace award from the Kenyan government for its Voluntary Counseling and Testing program.

Retired CMF missionary Dr. Glynn Wells was

the primary physician in the early years of the Maasai clinics. Dr. Suzie Snyder, who still serves as a member of the board for Maasai Health Services, succeeded him. Since Dr. Snyder's return to the U.S. to serve as CMF's Director of Member Care and Affiliation. the clinics have been run completely by Kenyans. Many of these leaders were students from the Maasai churches who were encouraged in their educational and career

pursuits by CMF missionaries.

The funds will be dispersed to the clinics through September 2011. They will be used for HIV/AIDS education, prevention, medication, staff training and assistance to get to rural villages where there are no clinics.
