A Sobering Reality

I am currently reading When Missions Shapes the Mission (David Horner, B&H Publishing Group, 2011). On page 82 of my iBooks version, a statement arrested that reading. "Although numerically the missions force is greater today than it has ever been, proportionate to the explosive expansion of the world's population, we go backward with each successive generation."

There are many good things occurring in the realm of world evangelism and global missions, and those are to be celebrated. An awakening to the need of completing the Great Commission began among younger generations some years ago. That awakening is one of the reasons the attendance at the National Missionary Convention began to increase some 15 years ago. There has also been a realization of the importance of focusing energy and resources on reaching unreached people groups and translating the Scriptures for thousands of groups that have never heard the gospel in their heart language. As I have the opportunity to build a true "world view of missions," I am amazed at God's power to inspire such creativity in methods of ministry to cross cultural barriers with His love and grace.

However, there are sobering realities as well. Mr. Horner provided a statistical endnote corroborating his statement above. While Christianity is the world's largest religion (when we include those considered "nominal" in their faith), there are still more than twice as many who are without hope of eternal life through Jesus! Even with the growing numbers of missionaries and the growing numbers of methods in introducing people to Jesus, "there are more lost people on earth now than there were people on earth in 1975." (*ibid*, page 108 of the iBooks version). We clearly have more to do.

I am also personally concerned about other trends I believe are growing. 1) While we need to focus upon the

unreached parts of the world, we cannot afford to ignore the "post-Christian" world." For example, we continue to need people to go to Europe and Australia. While the people of these (and other) continents may have had an opportunity to hear, these citizens are equal in their need for the gospel. 2) Of concern to me is the trend of decreasing the visibility of missions in the local congregation. While it is laudable for congregations and leaders to commit a certain percentage of giving to "missions," it is troubling when that portion of our priorities receives less and less attention within the church life. If our Sunday morning services are solely focused upon the local activities of the congregation, how can we ever expect the congregation to have a world perspective of the Kingdom of God? The needs of the world cannot be relegated solely to "the missions committee." 3) I am also troubled that we have confused the definition of "missions" and are actually decreasing the priority of "the world" within the local congregation. If we include local benevolence and other items local and national in emphasis. can we truly identify that part of our spending as "missions"?

I am incredibly excited about the increase in enthusiasm for missions. and I stand in awe of how God is raising up people to reach the lost, but we clearly have so much more to do! Think about that!

90 years + 10 years = Church of Christ in Poland

We gathered, all two thousand of us, from all over Poland, from Koszalin in the north, from Dabrowa Gornicza in the south, from Lublin in the east and from Glogow in the west, with guests from Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Kentucky, Tennessee, Indiana, Illinois, and Kansas. The service of celebration and thanksgiving on Sunday, June 16th, 2011 honored the founding of the first Church of Christ in Poland in 1921 and the ninety years of faithful witness through some of the most harrowing years, with special attention to the opening of the tenth decade. Those who could not make the trip to Warsaw could watch the live streaming from anywhere in Poland or anywhere in the world!




The service was held in the Congress Hall of the Palace of Culture in Warsaw. Originally built as an unwanted gift from Joseph Stalin during

the Russian occupation, the ornate structure glistens with white marble, golden fixtures and brilliant red velvet appointments. Non-Polish speakers benefited from translation earphones.

Vibrant songs of praise opened the service. We took communion together with individual disposable communion sets that were distributed as we arrived.



The focus shifted to the next ten years. With inspired vitality, the next decade was launched officially. Direction was shared, the new council of leaders was introduced and prayers were offered.

Representatives from other Christian faiths in Poland and the government representative brought congratulations and blessings. Polish





Christian Ministries, serving the churches for over fifty-seven years, was represented by Executive Director Wayne Murphy. He assured continued support and extended greetings on behalf of other mission organizations who partner with the Polish Christians.

As the praise music began again with their upbeat tempos, President Andrzej Bajenski said quietly, "Remember we are not a museum." And a soloist concluded with a rap version of an old hymn.

The new decade was launched indeed!

PREPARATION

The Annual Leadership Conference for the pastors and their associates was held for the three days preceding the celebration with the theme, "The Work of the 10th Decade." Early emphasis was placed on the Restoration Movement's history in America and its development in Poland.

The significant role of the pastor's spouse was recognized again and again. Marysia Jakoniuk, the wife of a retiring pastor gave her testimony of God's goodness across the years of their ministry. The private self-assessment for pastors included consideration of the frequency of prayer for wife and children.

Elections were held for the council and president; votes were taken for issues. Pastors engaged in brainstorming sessions for strengths and vulnerabilities to give direction for the next decade. Plans were made to meet again soon.

Evenings were full of praise and inspiration. Wayne Murphy preached each evening. On the final evening, he challenged those present to think about accomplishing greater things. In John 14:12, Jesus said that the one who believes in Him will do greater things than He did. As Wayne concluded the message, he called three pastors to the platform. He introduced Andrzej Hara, pastor of the Grudziadz church which recently had become self-supporting. Wayne asked the audience, "Will your church be the next to become self-supporting?" He introduced Krzysztof Zareba, pastor of the Warsaw North church which started a new congregation, and Marek Sobotka, the pastor of the newly planted church. "Will your church be the next to plant a new church?" he asked.

Deepening knowledge of the church's past, awareness of current growth and potential, commitment and inspiration for the future. This was the Annual Leadership Conference for pastors of the Church of Christ in Poland.

estant Evangelical Churches into one but essential beliefs were lost. With the Lord's help during our visits to Poland in 1960 and 1963, the essential beliefs of the Church of Christ were restored.

There also was some misconception in America about Churches of Christ in Poland. Traveling for many years to Christian Churches and Churches of Christ, Bible colleges, conventions, service camps and schools to raise support for the work in Poland, we had to clear the picture of the Polish Churches of Christ and regain the confidence of the American brotherhood.

The next ten years? I am unsure what the next ten years will bring for Churches of Christ in Poland. We need to work together but be cautious



of ecumenism, remembering the lessons of the past. We must be faithful to the Lord in all things." --Paul

A Brief Nine Decade History of the Polish Churches of Christ

Delivered by Piotr Karel at the 90th Anniversary Celebration Service June 26, 2011

he psalmist wrote a pilgrimage psalm that reads like this:

If the Lord had not been on our side—let Israel say—²if the Lord had not been on our side when men attacked us, ³when their anger flared against us, they would have swal-



lowed us alive; ⁴the flood would have engulfed us, the torrent would have swept over us, ⁵the raging waters would have swept us away. ⁶Praise be to the Lord, Who has not let us be torn by their teeth. ⁷We have escaped like a bird out of the fowler's snare; the snare has been broken, and we have escaped. ⁸Our help is in the name of the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth. (Psalm 24)

Keeping in mind "had it not been the Lord" let us spend a few minutes looking back at the history of the Church of Christ in Poland.

"Had it not been the Lord" a teenager from a small village in the Podlasie region, who in 1910 left to America to earn his daily bread, would not have met a street evangelist who preached the good news about salvation in Christ to passersby in the heart of New York. Had it not been the grace of God, the heart of young Konstanty Jaroszewicz would not have burned with love for Christ and His Word telling him to start studies in Johnson Bible College.

Had it not been God's leading, he would not have made the decision to return to his home country in 1921 in order to tell his people about salvation in Jesus. In a tiny hut near Bialystok a small group of people hungry for the Gospel began to meet. There would not have been many more baptisms, and there would not have been new fellowships called Churches of Christ in many villages and towns of Bialostocczyzna, Podlasie and Polesie. In times of hard beginnings "when men rose up against us" God showed His faithfulness and provided help.

"Had it not been the Lord who was on our side" in the 20s and 30s of the 20th century... There would not have been a great blossom of new churches marked with dozens of new churches, hundreds of mission stations. There would not have been regional conventions, publishings, trainings, mission projects in neighboring

countries first held in Kobryn and later moved to Brest, near the Bug River. And about people like Konstanty Jaroszewicz, Jerzy Sacewicz, Boleslaw Winnik, Nikon Jakoniuk, Jan Bukowicz, Grzegorz Bajko, and many others, we would not think about the pioneers of the evangelical movement in eastern Poland during the interwar period. We don't even want to think what would happen **if it hadn't been God's care** during Second World War. After the war in our ruined country, cut off from the area where there had been over 80 churches, church leaders had to begin work in Poland all over.

"If God had not been on our side" after the liberation, new churches in Olsztyn, Gdansk, and Lidzbark Warminski would not have been established. In 1946 the building, 50% destroyed, at Pulawska Street in Warsaw would not have been purchased. There would be no opening of renovated churches, chapels, houses of prayer, or the orphanage in Lidzbark Warminski. There would be no charity help from the United States meeting people's basic needs and reviving the Churches of Christ.

"If God had not been on our side" in early 50s when Poland was under the terror of Stalin and his agents – as psalmist says, "they would have swallowed us alive." One day all key leaders of evangelical churches in Poland were arrested and accused of cooperation with the nation's enemies – western countries. Some were released from prison only after three years. Today we remember and thank God for our fathers and grandfathers of the interwar period: Jerzy and Konstanty Sacewicz, Pawel Bajenski, Boleslaw Winnik, Mikolaj Korniluk, Teodor Lewczuk, Szymon Sacala, Jozef Wrobel and many other pastors and church leaders not mentioned by name.

"Had it not been the Lord" the cooperation among various evangelical churches under United Evangelical Church would not have been possible. The believers from five related evangelical churches would not have the chance to learn cooperation, respect, or diversity in minor issues. There would be no learning from one another, helping and receiving from one another. There would be no joint conventions, training, trips, or retirement home for the elderly in Ostroda and no opportunity for young people to take up theological studies.

"Had it not been the Lord" in 60s and 70s, there would be no – despite restrictions and control from the communist government – steady growth of church ministries. Many chapels would not have been built and many mission projects, exceeding abilities of small congregations, if it had not been for Polish Christian Ministries with its founders Pawel and Adela Bajko. There would not have been evangelism of young people through youth camps, which had been initiated by Jerzy Bajenski and a group of youth leaders. There would be no transformation of a run-down farm into a beautiful camp - Ostroda Camp.

"Had it not been the Lord" during stormy decade of 80s during deep economical crisis in Poland, there would not have been millions - worth of charity support from brothers and sisters in the US, which was received and distributed around

the country. Tons of food, hygiene products, and medical equipment were distributed to Polish families, social aid and medical centers. There wouldn't have been a young generation of leaders who were working dynamically in their local congregations but also – due to marshal law and lack of everything – were continually developing new ministries on national scale. There would not have been Christian Bible Institute, which in cooperation with TCM, trained about 3500 students and published over 80 theological books exceeding a quarter of million copies. There would not have been youth conferences that held many thousands of participants from various churches. And in the late 80s and early 90s there would not have been the amazing evangelistic rally in over 30 cities called Bible Under the Tent. There would not have been many foundations and Christian associations come into life; there would not have been new Christian publishing houses established and new ministries in mass media.

"Had it not been the Lord" in the 90s – when the nation became a sovereign country – "we would not have escaped as a bird out of a snare of the trapper and we would have been free." We would not have enjoyed the freedom. We would not have realized our dreams of the autonomous Churches of Christ. Had it not been the Lord, new churches would not have been planted all over the country. There would not have been churches of many hundreds that began to set a new tone for evangelism and promoted new, more effective approach to church development. We would not have participated in world-wide satellite missions or huge evangelistic projects. Vacation Bible Schools would not have drawn hundreds of children. In prisons there would not have been preachers and no believers would have served in the army or the police.

"Had it not been the Lord" in the first decade of third millennium... we would not have known how to use the freedom and the possibilities it had brought to properly develop the work of Christ on our Polish land. When secularism and practical materialism are devastating people's hearts and churches – thanks to God – we have noted a 30% growth in our Church. At the turn of the century the congregation in Warsaw became the biggest evangelical fellowship in Poland. New initiatives of church planting appeared. New ministries among the Jewish people started. Preschools and schools were established. Our church initiated the establishment of Evangelical Alliance in Poland.

"Had it not been the Lord" there would not have been many anonymous servants of Jesus Christ and dozens of local church ministries around the country, which cannot be mentioned due to time limitations.

"Had it not been the Lord" we would not have gathered together here in this great, historical hall in the Palace of Culture to consider the Work of the Tenth Decade. Seeing faithfulness of God in the past 9 decades we confess with the psalmist: "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth."
