1. Write down the things you love about God. Read Psalm 145:8-21 to jumpstart your thoughts.
2. Has there ever been a time in your life when something you did caused you to think that God had stopped loving you?

Read Romans 8:38-39.

Describe God's love according to these verses.

How does this describe God's unconditional love for you?

3. Let's take a look at some characteristics of God's "agape" love.

Read Romans 5:8

In this verse, how is God's love selfless, sacrificial and/or unconditional?
(You may also want to read Romans 5:6-7)

4. You have learned about God's love for you. Now let's examine how you might reflect His love to others.

"Phileo" love is often conditional and based on how others treat us. In Susan's talk, she quoted *1 John 4:17a*, "As we live in God, our love grows more perfect." What does it mean to "live in God"?

Read Psalm 145:8-10.

List the character qualities of God (These qualities also reflect your life when "lived in God").

Is there someone in your life who is challenging you to live out these qualities unconditionally in your relationship with them?

5. How do we love like God loves?

Read *1 John 4:19-21* and write your thoughts.

In this lesson, you have been faithful to learn God's Word. Now it's time to *Hit the Road*. By doing the *Hit the Road* portion of *Jumpstart*, you will take what you have learned and put it into action. Don't miss the most exciting part of the ride.



HIT THE ROAD

1. Write about a time in your life when you felt the most loved. What were the circumstances around that feeling? Record how you could replicate that for someone in your life, even if this person is difficult to love.

Read John 13:1-5, 14-15

In verses 14-15 Jesus suggests that we should do as he has done.

What was the one thing Jesus did for His disciples?

What is Jesus asking you, out of love, to do for someone else that might seem hard right now?

2. In 1 John 3:1, God's love is described as lavish. If someone was to lavish you today in love, what would that look like?

Think of someone who needs your love right now.

How could you extend lavish love to them today? This week, have some fun. Do one lavish thing for someone. Here are some words for lavish: extravagant, extreme, fancy, insane, excessive, over-the-top, steep and unconscionable. (Be prepared to share during Rearview Mirror what lavish thing you did.)

3. Jesus promises that the Holy Spirit teaches you everything about love. Sometimes extending love is a difficult thing even to those who are easy to love.

1 Corinthians 13:4-7 defines true love as: patient, kind, not jealous, not boastful, not rude. True love does not demand its own way, is not irritable and keeps no record of wrong. It never gives up or loses faith. Which one is the Holy Spirit speaking to you about today?

Find a smooth rock. Using a permanent marker, write the love quality you are asking the Holy Spirit to help you with this week. (Keep the rock near you this week to remind you how you are asking God to help you love better.)

HIT THE ROAD

John 13:1-5, 14-15 —

1 Before the Passover celebration, Jesus knew that his hour had come to leave this world and return to his Father. He had loved his disciples during his ministry on earth, and now he loved them to the very end. **2** It was time for supper, and the devil had already prompted Judas, son of Simon Iscariot, to betray Jesus. **3** Jesus knew that the Father had given him authority over everything and that he had come from God and would return to God. **4** So he got up from the table, took off his robe, wrapped a towel around his waist, **5** and poured water into a basin. Then he began to wash the disciples’ feet, drying them with the towel he had around him.

14 And since I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash each other’s feet. **15** I have given you an example to follow. Do as I have done to you.

1 John 3:1 — (New International Version)

See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him.

1 Corinthians 13:4-7 —
