

Farewell Mr. Marxmiller



Jim Marxmiller – his name has been synonymous with Mountain View Academy for more than four decades. Jim and Karyn started working at MVA in the fall of 1973. That year, the average cost of a new home was just over \$32,000; a new car cost as little as \$2,900. Bell-bottoms were all the rage and Nixon resigned his presidency around the same time as Jim started teaching his first class in the classroom on the corner.

A lot has transpired since Jim first took up his position as science teacher on our campus. Not only has the average price of a house gone up ten-fold but generations of students have experienced California Jim's insights into the world of anatomy and physiology, chemistry, and biology. Hundreds of students have lugged their backpacks up into the Sierra foothills during campouts on the annual Backpacking Club trip.

Mr. Marxmiller has served as class sponsor, unofficial photographer, and NHS sponsor for over 20 years. He has lead 44 years of students to Pacific Union College's Biology Field Station and shown students the delights of California's tide pools; no doubt inspiring more than one student to choose a pro-

fession in the marine sciences field. Annual trips to Monterey Bay Aquarium further augmented his student's exposure and understanding of marine biology.

Mr. Marxmiller's lab has been the scene of multitudinous dissections of countless creatures but has also served as a lab for growing mushrooms, cheese, crystals.... A favorite amongst students was the cheese and mushroom experiments. The growing of things was not restricted to the classroom. An on-campus garden has been planted and harvested each school year for the last several years. The students in his class get to celebrate their harvest with a special evening meal, which gives the students an opportunity to dine on the fruits of their labor.

While time has changed Mr. Marxmiller's appearance some, it has not altered his nearly ever-present smile. His cheerful greeting travels everywhere with him. He is also known for his jocularism. That spirit of fun and adventure follows him into the classroom as well. His favorite motto is Observe and Be Curious. He has brought that into his teaching in myriad ways over


