DIGGING DEEPER

Larry's sermon on Sunday talked a lot about Noah's obligation to God. Noah's task of building the ark was simple in the sense that it was clear cut, yet it was difficult to accomplish. He spent around a hundred years building the ark. God probably isn't asking any of us to build a giant boat. However, He has also given us a task that is quite simple in some respects, yet extremely difficult in others. Mark Twain once said, "It ain't those parts of the Bible that I can't understand that bother me, it is the parts that I do understand." For many of us the challenge isn't studying the Bible, it's doing what it says.

Read Matthew 22:34-40.

1. In Jesus' ministry He was asked scores of questions, even though His teachings were often quite straightforward. Here, when Jesus is asked to boil everything down to one commandment, He responds with two. They can be summarized as "Love God" and "Love people." Who is someone you know and consider to be a person who really loves God? Who do you know who you believe exemplifies what it means to love people? Why did you pick the people you did?

2. Sometimes we emphasize one of these commands at the expense of the other. We either get so wrapped up in loving God and connecting with Him that we neglect to love our neighbors, or we get so focused on helping and loving others that we forget to spend time connecting with God. Which do you think you tend to spend the most time on? When was a time you went against your natural tendency and intentionally tried to obey the command that wasn't as "easy" for you?

3. Jesus' teaching in this passage is pretty simple. There aren't any complicated formulas, and no one needs to take notes. It's more about taking action. Why do you we sometimes make following Him more complicated than it needs to be?

4. Most churches have a mission statement that includes some version of "love God and love people." What are some activities of the church that focus on loving God? What are some things that are more directly aimed at loving people? Have you ever participated in any of these activities? Which are your favorites?

5. When have you put something off even though you knew it would be beneficial for you to do? What were your reasons? Looking back, do you think those were good reasons or not?
