oth my wife's siblings, my brother-in-law and sister-in law live in Cologne, Germany. In that city are a number of fine churches, including the massive Cologne Cathedral which dominates the city center. Not too far away there is a church building that has been designated as a Minor Basilica, named St. Ursula's. Every time we visit it seems we end up there, mainly to have a meal in the café next to the courtyard.

What makes St. Ursula's church so interesting is that it was built over an old Roman cemetery. Legend has it that St. Ursula and 11,000 virgins were martyred in Cologne by the Huns and their remains were interred in this cemetery. When the church was built, a mass of bones was discovered. They were thought to be those of the martyred Ursula and her virgin companions. Instead of reburying the remains, they arranged the bones in geometric patterns along the walls in side rooms next to the sanctuary. Many think the remains of saints, especially martyred ones, have some sort of supernatural power. I have to admit, as a Protestant, this is over-the-top veneration. There is no efficacy in human bones. But the thought behind it is a belief and hope in the resurrection.

In Jerusalem, on the western slope of the Mount of Olives, directly

across from the city's eastern gate, is the largest Jewish cemetery in the world. For thousands of years Jewish people have been buried there because of the belief that this is the spot where the trumpet of the final judgment and general resurrection would be sounded. The idea being that whoever is buried here, will rise from the dead first!

This just goes to show the fascination we have with life and death and with life after death. We have a natural intuition that this life is not all there is. Werner von Braun, the famous rocket scientist, believed in life after death because it was "essentially scientific." He stated: "Science has found that nothing can disappear without a trace. Nature does not know extinction. All it knows is transformation. If God applies the fundamental principle to the most minute and insignificant parts of the universe, doesn't it make sense that He applies it to the masterpiece of His creation, the human soul? I think it does."

Paul speaks of the resurrection of the dead as transformation from death to life. It happens in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye. The dead in Christ shall rise first, those who are alive on the earth will be changed. The corruptible puts on the immortal. That's what Easter is all about for us, Jesus destroyed death and brought immortality to

light!

One day, the bones in St. Ursula's Basilica, and in cemeteries along the Mount of Olives will rattle, shake, be gathered together and be changed by the power of God in Jesus Christ!

Paul, whom I call the Apostle of the resurrection, instructed Timothy, "It has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior, Christ Jesus, who <u>has destroyed death</u> and has brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. (2 Tim I:10 NIV)

It is Important to note in what Paul writes, "Jesus Christ has destroyed death ...," that the Greek word for destroyed means to "reduce to a state of inactivity." More importantly, it is a participle which has the force of past completed action! That means it has already happened. What Paul is driving at is that the terror and sting of death is taken away from the believer. We die, but we are with Christ. Our bodies waste away, but the God who created the world out of nothing will transform our corruption into everlasting life.

That's what we celebrate at Easter, Jesus rose from the dead. He brought life and immortality to light.
