The Barmen Declaration

It was hard times for the church, in Nazi Germany in 1934. Adolf Hitler had risen to power the previous year, and had immediately instituted a policy of “forcible coordination” – every segment of society was to be brought into conformity to national goals. Trade unions and political parties were eliminated, schools and clubs were rigorously controlled, there was compulsory youth training, and concentration camps were established for those who refused to toe the line. The churches were not exempt: they were all to be controlled by the government, and loyalty to Nazi policies would be affirmed as the essence of the Christian message.

In opposition to this, a group of church leaders gathered in Barmen Germany in May 1934, and issued this Declaration (which was incorporated into our Book of Confessions in 1967). The heart of the document gives us six strong affirmations of evangelical truth. Here is the first of the six:

Jesus Christ, as he is attested for us in Holy Scripture, is the one Word of God which we have to hear and which we have to trust and obey in life and in death.

We reject the false doctrine, as through the Church could and would have to acknowledge as a source of its proclamation, apart from and besides this one Word of God, still other events and powers, figures and truths, as God's revelation.

The Barmen Declaration never specifically names either Hitler or Nazism, but it's not hard to read between the lines here. We can see their shadows as the *other figure* and *other power* who claim that they can be the source of the church's proclamation. There were 183 delegates to the Barmen gathering; under the pressure of Nazism some of them later recanted their position, and the remainder ended up in concentration camps where many of them died. Nevertheless their testimony lives on: Jesus Christ is the one Word of God whom we hear, trust, and obey.

Here's a point to ponder, eight decades after Barmen: where today are we tempted to find an authority for our lives other than the Jesus revealed to us in scripture? How will we reject that temptation, and learn to follow Christ alone.

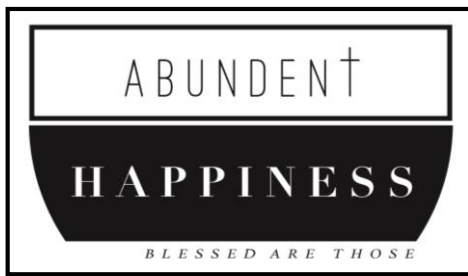
