yteries fascinate us — the unexplained, the irrational, the quirky side of life. Although they say that curiosity has the power to kill your cat, it seems that human beings are immune. We crave knowledge about how things work, who is responsible and why things happen as they happen. Here are some of the world's greatest mysteries that still capture my attention:

- 1. The Taos Hum. In the small town of Taos, New Mexico, and other places across the northern hemisphere, there is a certain buzz often heard on the horizon that can be compared to the sound of a distant diesel engine. Although it can be heard by the naked ear, various sound detection devices are not able to pick it up. This is known as the Taos Hum, and up to this day, no one still knows how this sound is being created.
- 2. The Sphinx of Giza. The greatest monolith statue in the world is part lion and part human. It has no inscriptions to tell the world when it was built and Egyptologists and geologists disagree. So who built it? When? Why?
- 3. The "WOW" Signal. On August 15, 1977, Jerry Ehman, a researcher with the SETI Project (Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence), picked up a radio frequency coming from deep space. He was able to get a 72-second signal from the constellation Sagittarius and was never able to get it again. To this day no one is sure about the origin of the signal. It derived its name, however, from the "wow!" that Jerry wrote in the margin of the printout.

- 4. The Nazca Lines. In the Nazca desert in Southern Peru, these geoglyphs were created 1,500 years ago. They include everything from spiders, monkeys, sharks, orcas, and flowers, the precision of which is incredible given that the Nazca had no way of examining their work from the air.
- 5. **The Easter Island Statues.** The 887 statues carved from rock over 500 years ago on a remote island in the South Pacific. The question of why is as mysterious as the question of how.
- 6. The Empty Tomb of Jesus. Certainly the disciples who ran to the tomb thought they were face-to-face with a mystery. They saw the linen wrappings that had covered the lifeless body of their master, and the cloth that had been pulled across his head was rolled up and set off to the side. What was truly mysterious was that there was no body in the tomb.

Then the disciples learned the truth. Soon we will come together to

proclaim that truth: "He is Risen!" On the first Easter morning, Jesus walked out of the tomb and the universe changed. Suddenly there was no mountain too high, no person too low, no challenge too wide and no path too long for the God who defeated death. On that one morning hope was infused into every moment of our lives, from first cry to last sigh.

I think the real mystery is why we aren't more excited by this. We think the church is about rules and morals and traditions and helping people learn the difference between right and wrong. We assume we are expected to be serious, studious and committed. All of this stuff is important but none of it is the main point. At its best, the church is a community that never gets tired of celebrating one simple and powerful thing — Jesus is alive. We are party guests in the house of the LORD. He is Risen! Now that's winning.

Prayer for Renewal Campaign 2015 Wrap-up



Arcadia Cares: Food for Kidz First Annual Packathon assembles over 60,000 meals

More than 300 volunteers from the Arcadia neighborhood and beyond converged on Gangsei Hall on Saturday, February 28, to volunteer at the First Annual Arcadia Cares: Food for Kidz Packathon. The final result was simply astonishing — more than 62,000 meals were packed for distribution to hungry children and their families in our local area and internationally.

Volunteers ranged from ages three to 80-plus, and represented a myriad of groups throughout the neighborhood, including Troop 6 Boy Scouts, Daisy and Brownie Troops, church, school and business groups, sports teams, and entire extended families. It was initially hoped to secure between 150-200 volunteers to make the event successful — however, volunteers poured into the gym on the morning of the event and the final count was over 300 participants.

The goal was 30,000 packed meals — the final count was 62,708 meals, double the goal! Of the meals packed, 80 percent were donated to Valley View Community Food Bank for local distribution to shelters and other needy venues. The Food for Kidz organization will ship the other 20 percent to Nicaragua. "The neighborhood came together for the very worthy cause of fighting hunger and showed that Arcadia really cares about helping others," said Steve Crofton, a member of the Arcadia Cares Committee.



Meet the Ellers!!



Uruguay

This is the last installment in a series focusing on the six countries served by the Ellers as missionaries.

Uruguay

- Encompassing a land area of 68,000 square miles, Uruguay, often called the heart-shaped country, is the same size as the State of Washington and one of the smallest countries in South America. Extensive grasslands are used for agriculture.
- Uruguay's population is 3.4 million, barely half as many as in Arizona, with nearly 2 million people living in Montevideo, which is the capital city. More than ninety percent of Uruguayans are European descendants and a quarter are under the age of 15.
- Uruguay has a literacy rate of 98 percent and enjoys relative stability, peace and prosperity. It has been ranked first in Latin America in quality of living and is one of the most liberal nations.
- Spanish is Uruguay's official and most common language.
- Roughly half of Uruguayans are Catholic, while 9 percent are non-Catholic Christian and 12 percent claim to be atheist. Uruguay is considered to be the most secular country in the Americas. Fewer than half of the residents attend church regularly.
- Football (soccer) is the most popular sport in Uruguay.

New Venues Available for Health Care

Where do you go to obtain health care? In the past, for routine visits most people went to their local doctor and at one time, physicians even made house calls. More serious conditions were treated at the community hospital. Hospital emergency rooms were used only for the most serious emergencies needing immediate treatment. As healthcare costs continued to climb, astronomically in some cases, alternatives to traditional healthcare services were explored. In the 1970s, the first urgent care centers appeared. Initially, many of the centers were started by emergency medical physicians as a means to provide convenient access to unscheduled medical care at significant savings compared to ER care. Now many of the facilities are owned by for-profit companies. Both the Urgent Care Association of America (UCAOA) and the American Academy of Urgent Care Medicine (AAUCM) have established these criteria for urgent care centers: accept walk-in patients during business hours; treat a broad spectrum of illnesses and injuries and perform minor medical procedures; have a licensed physician as medical director; be open seven days a week; have on-site diagnostic equipment; contain multiple exam rooms; and meet stated ethical and business standards. When selecting an urgent care center, look for one accredited by UCAOA or AAUCM.

It is estimated that approximately 14 to 27 percent of all ER visits could take place at an urgent care center. The extended hours are particularly helpful for those with less severe conditions who wish to avoid the ER. While most urgent care centers are open for longer hours than the typical doctor's office, they aren't open 24/7. Urgent care centers do not do surgical procedures. Most urgent care centers offer point-of-care dispensing which means that patients of urgent care healthcare practitioners can receive their prescriptions before leaving the office, but urgent care centers cannot refill prescriptions. Insurance reimbursement for medical care received at an urgent care center is comparable to general/family practice reimbursement,

but uninsured patients must pay the full amount at the time of service.

Life-threatening injuries should be treated at a hospital emergency room. Urgent care centers are cost-efficient and time-saving means of treating cuts, bruises, and minor wounds; minor burns; muscle strains and sprains; urinary tract infections; severe colds and flu; strep throat, ear and sinus infections; rashes; allergies and asthma and pink eye. Any condition causing significant pain, sudden loss or blurred vision, difficulty breathing, or severe bleeding should be treated at an ER.

The newest source of health care is the retail clinic. As Americans seek more convenient health care, at least five major retailers (CVS, Kroger, Target, Walgreen's, Walmart) are opening clinics. The retailers promote their in-store clinics on the basis of convenience. They are open seven days a week with extended hours and offer wait times of 15 minutes or less; proximity (almost everyone has a store within five miles of home; all have pharmacists who can work with nurse practitioners to manage patient care; stores across the city and country are linked electronically; they offer price transparency by clearly providing a list of services offered and the price of the service. In addition, prestigious health systems are participating in integrated networks of hospitals, medical groups, and retail-based clinics. Some retailers are also using the integrated clinics to teach customers about the Affordable Health Care Act.

Nothing is perfect and retail clinics and urgent care centers have a few disadvantages. First, the treating provider has no patient history to review. Patients may be referred back to their primary care physician, but there is no way to guarantee that the appointment will be made. Also, it is important to know if records from the visit are sent to the primary care physician.
