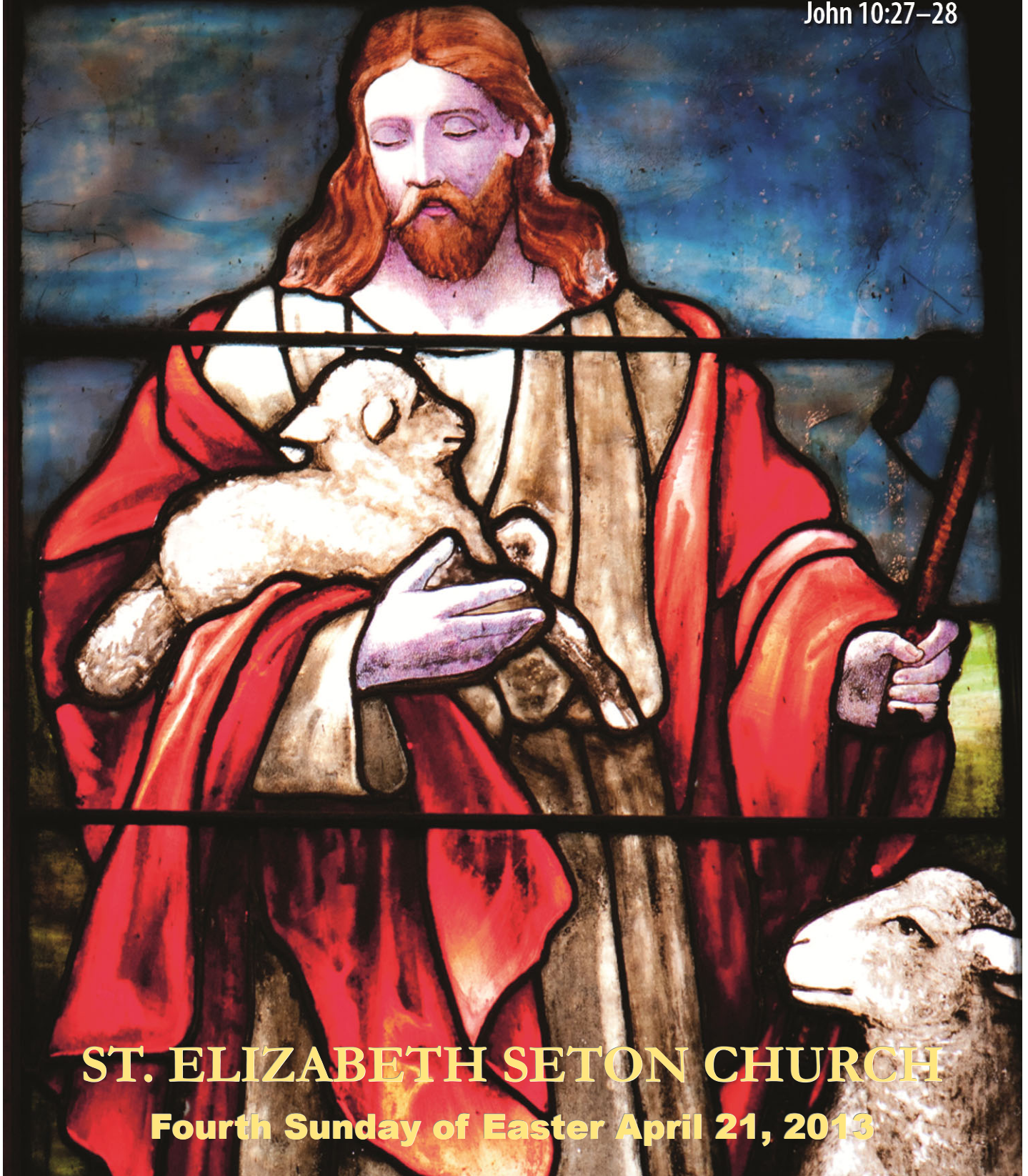

Reflections for
Fifth Sunday
of Easter
April 28, 2013

Your Commandment to love as You loved us, Lord Jesus, with a willingness to give generously, not counting the cost, is frightening to most of us most of the time. Give us your companionship, which we surely need, and increase our hope in the fulfillment You have promised. We place our trust in You.

NEXT SUNDAY'S FOCUS: WORK FOR EVERYONE, GUARANTEED

The work of the church's first leaders continues in our day, as we discover in reading Acts.

This work will eventually usher in the new age spoken of in next week's second reading, but it begins even now when we live out the first and last commandment of John's Gospel.

FIRST READING

They called the Church together and reported what God had done with them (Acts 14:21-27).

In this passage, we hear of how the apostles strengthened Christians by exhorting them. They appointed elders in the community. (Note, that in the earliest days of the Church, there were no titles such as bishops, priests, and deacons.) Paul reminds the community that they must undergo many hardships in order to give witness to their faith. Very few of us will ever be arrested for being Christians, but we will all have a price to pay if we truly

give witness to our faith in word and deed. Picture trying to be a true Christian at home, at work, at school, on the road, etc. St. Therese called this *white martyrdom*, a martyrdom of pin pricks. The apostles continuously attribute all of their success to God. Again, this is essential to remember, for it is easy to be filled with pride when things go well. God is the source of every good thing.

SECOND READING

God will wipe away every tear from their eyes (Revelation 21:1-5a).

This passage describes what awaits us after our death. There will be a new heaven and a new earth. That which taught us about God will continue in the world to come (but without the limitations that we knew in this world). One of the other things that will not have limitations is our love. God has taught us the true

meaning of His love. That love (God's love for us and our love for God and each other) will be perfected in the world to come. Heaven, in fact, is not so much a particular time or place, as much as a relationship. We will be one with God and one with each other.

GOSPEL

I give you a new commandment: love one another (John 13:31-33a, 34-35).

The first part of this Gospel speaks of the fact that Jesus has proven that He is the fullness of God's love in His willingness to die on the cross for us. Now that we have learned this astounding lesson of love, we must live it. We do this by observing God's commandments. We are God-like inasmuch as we love God and one another for God is love.

REFLECTION

We go from Acts' record of the early days of the Church to a vision of the final coming of God's kingdom. In Acts, those first days were a time of building up and strengthening the community. Paul and Barnabas moved from town to town: Elytra, Conium, Antioch, Epicedia, Pamphylia, Pergo, and Attala. Their work was preaching to convert, lifting the spirits of believers and encouraging their perseverance, and appointing local leaders. Revelation offers an idealized vision of how the work begun then will turn out: a new heaven and earth, a holy city where God will dwell with the human race and will wipe away all tears caused by death and pain. Of particular interest is the phrase "the sea was no more," the sea being a symbol of chaos and destructive powers. How will this come about? How will this activity be sustained through persecution, sin, and human weakness? The Gospel holds the sky—by living the new commandment Jesus gave to His disciples: "Love one another as I have loved you." In this way, Christ continues to be glorified and God glorified Him. The names of the cities may have changed. Now the work continues in Arlington, Baltimore, Newton, Flossmoor, Arroyo Grande, San Jose, among others. But whether cities or towns, a new creation will only result if a community of believers, under the dedicated leadership, perseveres in loving as Christ loved. When this happens, the seeds of Resurrection life are certain to bear fruit.

Jesus, Our True Shepherd

The reading from Acts shows that Paul's policy was to preach to the Jews first, because they were the chosen people. But when they reject his message, he turns to the Gentiles. In this way the prophecy that the light of salvation would reach the ends of the earth was fulfilled.

Jesus is the True Shepherd, and will not allow anyone to snatch from his care the sheep that belong to him. He will give them eternal life. What does belonging to him entail? It entails listening to his voice and following him.

Our Shepherd Francis

In today's Gospel, Jesus, the Good Shepherd says to us, "I know my sheep. They listen to my voice and follow me." Cardinal George came to our parish last Sunday as a good shepherd concerned of his flock here at St. Elizabeth Seton. He wanted to know us better. He presided at the 11:30am Mass. His friendly presence and teaching supported us in our faith. He assured us about his prayers for us in this specific time as we wait for the coming of our new pastor, Fr. Bill Corcoran. After Mass, Cardinal George was well received by parishioners who lined up in the Narthex after Mass to speak with him. He then attended the reception in the Church Hall prepared by our Social Action Ministry.

Congratulations To Our Confirmandi

On Saturday, April 20th, our parish welcomed Bishop George Rassas who confirmed 121 of our young people at a 9:30am and 1:30pm ceremony. THE DAILY BREAD OF HUMAN LOVE

LONGING FOR WHOLENESS AND GOODNESS IS AT THE VERY CENTER OF WHO WE ARE. THE WAYS FOR ACHIEVING THEM ARE UP FOR GRABS. Some people choose to focus on themselves, amassing as much money or wealth as they can since these seem to promise them security and pleasure. Some people control other people, thinking power can make them whole. Still others withdraw within themselves, trying to shut out the evil and sadness and loss of hope which surround us.

AND SOME GET IT RIGHT: the only true way to wholeness and goodness is to follow Jesus along the path of self-sacrifice, willingly to be a lamb for the sake of others. We hardly need to look for opportunities to give ourselves over for the sake of others; they abound in our daily living. Easter further reminds us that when we sacrifice ourselves for others, we are never alone; the Good Shepherd is always with us *holding us tightly in his hand*.

WE WORSHIP AN INFINITE GOD, yet we believe love to be finite. Love shared with another, says the hateful voice in our heads, means less love for us. We behave as though love were a pie. When the last piece is gone, so is the hope of, the chance for, pie.



Room For All

Jesus said:

*"My sheep hear my voice;
I know them, and they follow me.*

*I give them eternal life,
and they shall never perish.*

THIS REFUSAL TO SEE the plenty before us is at the heart of today's first reading. "When the Jews saw the crowds," many of them Gentile converts, "they were filled with jealousy." Theirs is not a theological argument about the need to be circumcised before being baptized. It is the universal human fear that love which is not grabbed and held, is love lost.

JOHN HAS A VERY DIFFERENT VISION. It is "of a great multitude... From every nation, race, people, and tongue." They are standing before the throne of the Lamb, where they worship day and night. There are so many John cannot count them, nor does he try to catalog them in any way, either by number or race or tribe. They are simply the ones who remained faithful to Christ even in "the time of great distress." For all these faithful

there is room at the throne.

JOHN'S VISION IS JESUS' MISSION. He comes to call his sheep. His sheep, like John's great multitude, are not divided into categories. Neither are they restricted for lack of either love or space. They are simply those who hear the shepherd's voice and follow.

JESUS SAYS,

*"No one can take them out of my hand."
And in Jesus' hand there is room for all.*

*Lord, we are the people whom you shepherd.
Enable us always to respond vigorously to your inspiration,
whatever be the cost of personal comfort and ambition.

Father William Corcoran, pastor of St. Linus Parish, Oak Lawn; Vicariate 5 Dean of Deanery D, Southwest suburbs.

Kin:

"I'm very close to my four sisters, their husbands and my 10 nieces and nephews. I would be lost without them."

Roots:

"My parents and all their siblings were Irish immigrants." Both his parents were from County Mayo. "Dad was from Castlebar and Mom from Ballyhaunis."

Growing up:

"Dad was a foreman for Peoples Gas for 39 years; Mom was a homemaker. I had asthma as a child so I wasn't into athletics. I read, played board games with friends or biked. To this day I love cycling. I was born in 1956, the Baby Boom, and scores of kids lived on my block. There were 210 in my eighth grade at Little Flower School."

Vocation:

"When I was in first grade there was an art project where we drew what we wanted to be when we grew up. About a half dozen of us thought they were going to be priests. It wasn't unusual. As an altar server the liturgy and prayer was something I thought I wanted to do. I tested that out at Quigley South then at Niles and Mundelein. It continued to appeal to me."

Mentors:

"Msgr. Bernard Brogan was pastor for most of my young years at Little Flower. He was a wonderful preacher and bulletin writer. He communicated with people extremely well. You knew what was going on in the parish. It has inspired me to do some things with our bulletin."

Pastoral style:

"I definitely try to get out of the way and let people do their jobs. I don't micromanage, but I insist on strong communication."

Have your academic degrees aided your priesthood?

"I think my studies helped me look at things from a long perspective. That gives a lot of hope. Also studying societies you see the great good that can be done by a common effort — a very Catholic concept. We're a church and a community and we're connected to the Lord and to one another."

That Ph.D.:

"My degree is in 20th-century urban America. My dissertation was on the revival of Irish identity after World War II."

Immigrants yesterday and today:

"I think my studies deepened my appreciation for all immigrants including those coming to our country today. Basically their common desire is tied in to 'work.' If you can work you can marry. If you can marry you can have children. If you have a wife or husband and kids you have 'a life.' So the immigrants simply wanted to be able to work. That helps me connect with a lot of our current immigrants."

Irish ties:

"I've been blessed to visit Ireland 20 times since 1969. The first trip was for my cousin Father Brian Murphy's ordination in England. Six trips were for funerals; seven for weddings."

And your affinity to labor?

"I have a good business mind and a deep appreciation for labor issues. At times companies do not appreciate the asset they have in the men and women who make up their business. I think being very pro-labor helps my business-mindedness." The financial disclosure model he designed for St. Linus Parish has been used by the archdiocese as a reporting model for all parishes.

Typical day off:

"It's a mix of rest, exercise and being with friends and family."

Leisure: "I'm reading a novel at the moment, Ken Follett's 'World Without End.' The next book on my desk is about the Irish famine. I tend to read history and regular novels. I just finished 'A Team of Rivals' about Abraham Lincoln. A great book. I thought I'd read it in honor of his 200th birthday."

Lenten practice?

"I've encouraged all of us to call people we know who are not practicing the faith and tell them, 'I'm praying for your intentions.' Not strongarming anyone. Over the course of Lent share different things with them you hear in church. They aren't coming to church, so we're bringing church to them."

SACRED SPACE REFLECTION

Something to think and pray about this week...

TODAY IS VOCATION SUNDAY.

The first thing we need to acknowledge on this day is that every single person here has a vocation, every single person here has been and is being called by God through the Holy Spirit to offer their special gifts to the rest of the community. Here are three helpful questions each of us can ask ourselves.

What is my vocation?

What is my special gift?

What contribution am I making to the life of this parish – inside the Church and outside?

Vocation Sunday is for all of us. Each one of us would profit by reflecting on what our particular calling is and how to respond to it for the well-being of the whole parish community.

The second thing we can do is to be a help to others as they respond to the particular call that God is giving them through God's Spirit. We sometimes talk about a "vocation crisis". There is no vocation crisis in the sense that everyone has a vocation. There is no vocation crisis in that far more lay people are now being formed for pastoral service in the Church than in the past.

There is a crisis in that many are not aware of their vocation or, if they are, they are not responding to it. We can pray today that every one of us will be sensitive to the guidance of the Spirit in our lives and respond with generosity.

If we all actively responded to our call we will indeed continue to be a dynamic heartfelt community.

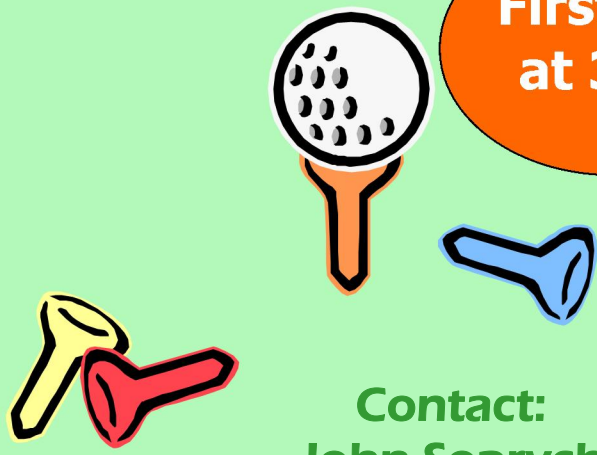

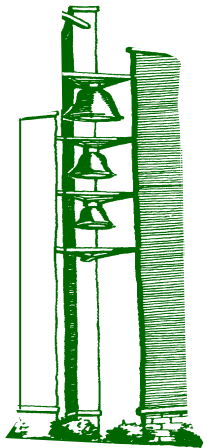

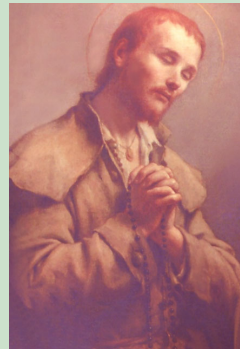

SAINT OF THE WEEK



ST. BENEDICT JOSEPH LABRE D. 1783

BENEDICT JOSEPH LABRE WAS TRULY ECCENTRIC, one of God's special little ones. Born in France and the eldest of 18 children, he studied under his uncle, a

parish priest. Because of poor health and a lack of suitable academic preparation he was unsuccessful in his attempts to enter the religious life. Then, at 16 years of age, a profound change took place. Benedict lost his desire to study and gave up all thoughts of the priesthood, much to the consternation of his relatives.

He became a pilgrim, traveling from one great shrine to another, living off alms. He wore the rags of a beggar and shared his food with the poor. Filled with the love of God and neighbor, Benedict had special devotion to the Blessed Mother and to the Blessed Sacrament. In Rome, where he lived in the Colosseum for a time, he was called "the poor man of the Forty Hours Devotion" and "the beggar of Rome." The people accepted his ragged appearance better than he did. His excuse to himself was that "our comfort is not in this world."

On the last day of his life, April 16, 1783, Benedict Joseph dragged himself to a church in Rome and prayed there for two hours before he collapsed, dying peacefully in a nearby house. Immediately after his death the people proclaimed him a saint.

He was officially proclaimed a saint by Pope Leo XIII at canonization ceremonies in 1883.

COMMENT:

In a modern inner city, one local character kneels for hours on the sidewalk and prays. Swathed in his entire wardrobe winter and summer, he greets passersby with a blessing. Where he sleeps no one knows, but he is surely a direct spiritual descendant of Benedict, the ragged man who slept in the ruins of Rome's Colosseum. These days we ascribe such behavior to mental illness; Benedict's contemporaries called him holy. Holiness is always a bit mad by earthly standards.



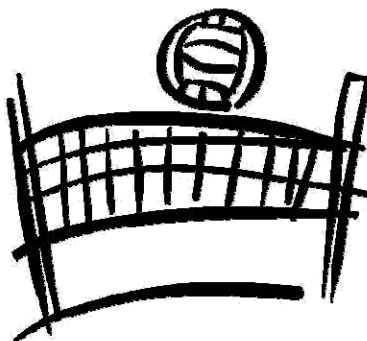

- **Ministry of Care** is available to give Communion to the housebound, to visit and pray for hospitalized and/or to arrange for the Anointing of the Sick. Please call the Pastoral Center for assistance.
- **In the Hospital?** Because of HIPAA Privacy regulations hospitals can no longer contact the parish regarding your hospitalization. It is the responsibility of you or a family member to notify our parish. We desire to offer whatever spiritual support we can. Please call the Pastoral Center.
- **Sacrament of Marriage** Couples planning to marry are encouraged to make arrangements at least six months in advance.
- **Wedding Workshops** are offered throughout the year. They provide engaged couples with guidelines and suggestions for the celebration of the Sacrament of Marriage. The workshop covers topics ranging from readings and music to flowers and video taping.
- **Adult Choir** sings at all 10am Sunday Masses, as well as at a number of special liturgies.
