## NEXT SUNDAY'S FOCUS: NOT YOUR FATHER'S MESSIAH

*We hear Jesus questioning His disciples about what others think of Him, then asking what they think of Him. Peter rushes to answer: "You are the Christ." Peter is both right and wrong. Jesus does prove to be the Messiah, but not exactly the one Peter thought was coming.*

### FIRST READING

*I gave my back to those who beat me (Isaiah 50:4c-9a).*  
This hymn speaks of a mysterious figure who would bring salvation to His people through His suffering. He would be gentle and humble and extend the promise of salvation to all the nations of the earth. Jesus considered Himself to be the fulfillment of this prophecy.

### SECOND READING

*Faith, if it does not have works, is dead (James 2:14-18).*  
James says a theoretical faith without action does no good and uses the absurd example of telling people who are starving and cold that they should keep warm and well fed while not doing anything to help them. Our good works must be performed to give expression to our faith. Words are cheap; it is actions that count. This is not really opposed

### GOSPEL

*You are the Christ... the Son of Man must suffer greatly (Mark 8:27-35).*  
Peter makes a profession of faith, proclaiming that Jesus is the Messiah — but he wanted Jesus to be a powerful conquering hero so that he might share the glory. But Jesus came to liberate us from sin and alienation. Jesus therefore, would not accept the title Messiah, because He realized that His followers did not really understand His mis-

This is obvious from a number of terms that He applied to Himself and His future suffering. His idea of being the Messiah was not one of power but rather one of service and even suffering for the sake of His people.

to the writings of Paul. He opposed works of the law, by which he meant doing things that would make God love us more. He felt that God's love was gratuitous, and we could never earn it. Yet even Paul spoke of the fact that once we experienced God's love, we must respond to it through works of faith filled love.

sion. He speaks rather of his role being the Son of Man who would suffer and die, and rise in three days (applying the Songs of the Suffering Servant to himself). Peter rejects that message and rebukes Jesus. Jesus tells Peter he is not acting in a godly manner, but like Satan (tempting Jesus). Jesus states the necessity for His followers to take up their cross and follow Him. To be a Christian is to be willing to die on the cross with Him.

### REFLECTION

"Who am I for you?" is a question we might ask another when a relationship becomes more serious. We want those we love to know and value who we are, just as we want to know and value them. A relationship deepens and grows from such exchanges. At this mid-point in Mark's Gospel, Jesus asks those who have been with Him since the beginning of His ministry what they think of Him. They

have heard Him preaching and teaching; they have seen Him casting out demons and curing those with various ailments of body and spirit. They have even seen Him raise a young girl who had died. So they have been with Him long enough to have formed an impression. Peter's answer is not given the warm welcome in Mark's Gospel that it gets in Matthew's, where Jesus responds by affirming that His heavenly Father has revealed this to Peter. Here Jesus gives a warning "not to tell anyone about Him," and then begins to teach him His own self-understanding. The notion of a Messiah was so caught up with military might and kingly authority that Jesus counters it with a different understanding, rooted in the Servant Songs of Isaiah. Jesus sees Himself so destined to be a suffering Messiah, something incomprehensible to His followers, as we shall see. But if they want to be His followers, they must take up the cross in their own life and lose their life for Jesus' sake.

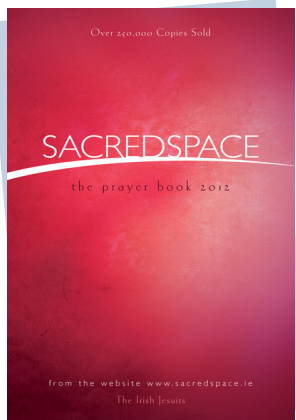

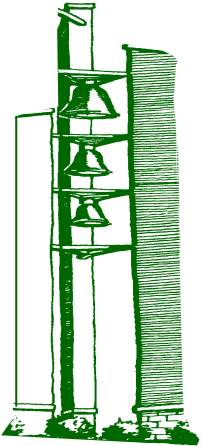

#### Veteran Cemetery Medallion Available

The Veterans Administration is now furnishing, upon receipt of claim, the Veteran Medallion for affixing to an existing privately-purchased head-

stone or marker placed at the grave site of an eligible deceased Veteran who is buried or entombed in a private cemetery. The medallion, free of charge, is made of bronze and available in three approximate sizes. Each medallion is inscribed with the word VETERAN across the top and the Branch of Service at the bottom. Eligibility includes:

- Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States who dies/died on active duty and is buried in a private cemetery in a grave marked with a privately purchased headstone or marker.
- Any deceased Veteran discharged under honorable conditions, who died on or after November 1, 1990, and is buried in a private cemetery in a grave marked with a privately purchased headstone or marker.
- A deceased Veteran discharged under conditions other than honorable, who died on or after November 1, 1990, and is buried in a private cemetery in a grave marked with a privately purchased headstone or marker, may also be eligible.

This also applies to Veterans entombed in a crypt or family monument. For details call Charmaine at 773-767-2166 or request information from your cemetery/personal funeral director or applications are in the parish office.

#### SAINT OF THE WEEK



### ST. THOMAS OF VILLANOVA 1488-1555

ST. THOMAS WAS FROM CASTILE IN SPAIN and received

his surname from the town where he was raised. He received a superior education at the University of Alcalá and became a popular professor of philosophy there.

After joining the Augustinian friars at Salamanca he was ordained and resumed his teaching—despite a continuing absentmindedness and poor memory. He became prior and then provincial of the friars, sending the first Augustinians to the New World. He was nominated by the emperor to the archbishopric of Granada, but refused. When the see again became vacant he was pressured to accept. The money his cathedral chapter gave him to furnish his house was given to a hospital instead. His explanation to them was that "our Lord will be better served by your money being spent on the poor in the hospital. What does a poor friar like myself want with furniture?"

He wore the same habit that he had received in the novitiate, mending it himself. The canons and domestics were ashamed of him, but they could not convince him to change. Several hundred poor came to Thomas's door each morning and received a meal, wine and money. When criticized because he was at times being taken advantage of, he replied, "If there are people who refuse to work, that is for the governor and the police to deal with. My duty is to assist and relieve those who come to my door." He took in orphans and paid his servants for every deserted child they brought to him. He encouraged the wealthy to imitate his example and be richer in mercy and charity than they were in earthly possessions.

Criticized because he refused to be harsh or swift in correcting sinners, he said, "Let him (the complainer) inquire whether St. Augustine and St. John Chrysostom used anathemas and excommunication to stop the drunkenness and blasphemy which were so common among the people under their care."

As he lay dying, Thomas commanded that all the money he possessed be distributed to the poor. His material goods were to be given to the rector of his college. Mass was being said in his presence when after Communion he breathed his last, reciting the words: "Into your hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit."

Thomas of Villanova was already called in his lifetime "the almsgiver" and "the father of the poor." He was canonized in 1658.

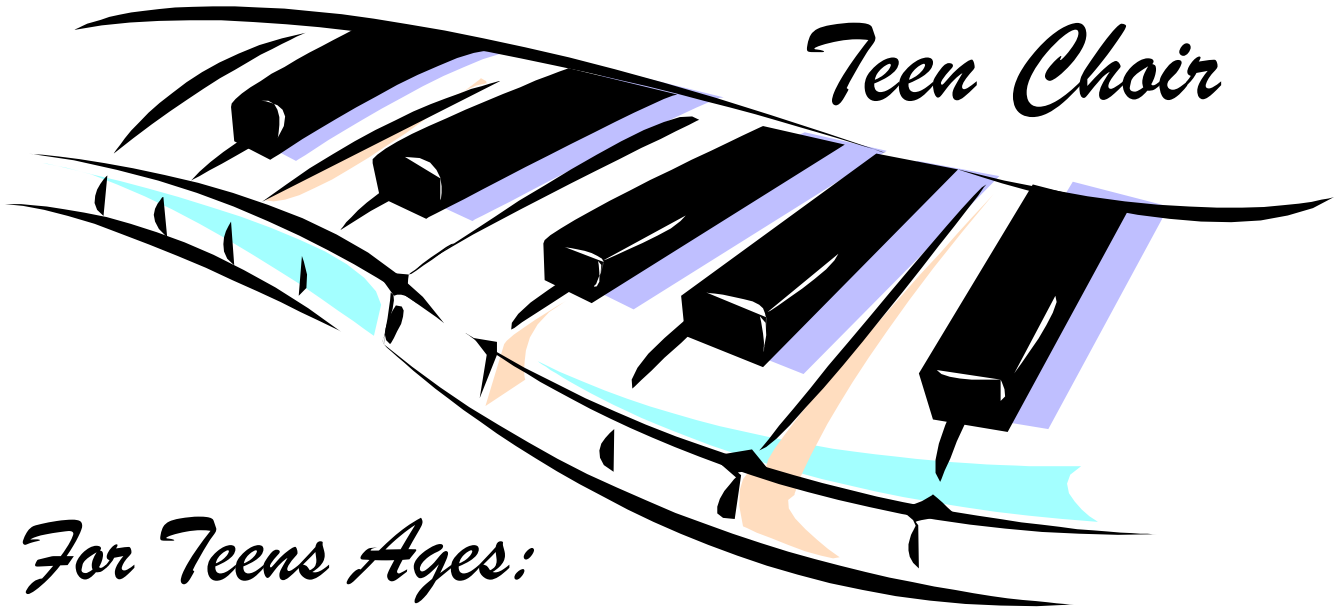

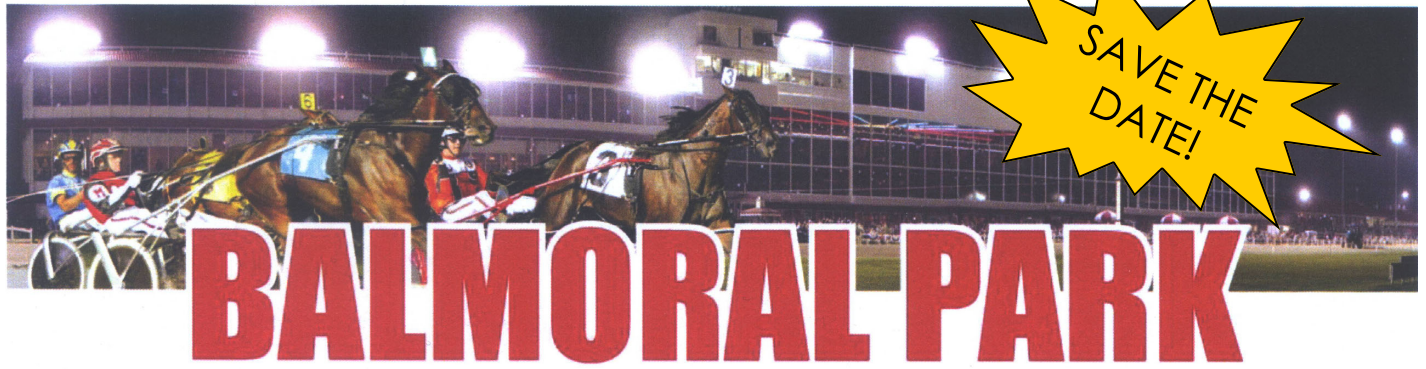

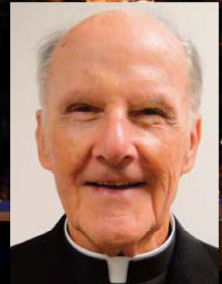
