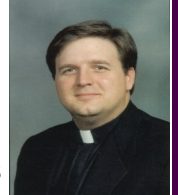

A LETTER FROM OUR RECTOR



Dear People of Saint Peters,

As some of you know, I have been invited to preach at an Episcopal Revival at a congregation in Tennessee (by the time you get this I will be back). This church is trying to find a way to reach out into the larger community to attract new members and strengthen existing members. To do this, they decided to "appropriate" the language of the community and use it to appeal to the community. It is quite a bold initiative!

What intrigues me most about this experience is the word itself: revival. The use of this word in Christian circles is largely attributed to the evangelical movement within Christianity. It was practiced as a way to not only renew the faith of Jesus Christ in a community, but also as a way to maintain excitement and enthusiasm for each individual spiritual life. Now, revivals may seem unique, but the need for renewal and reflection has always been a part of Christianity, going back to Jesus himself. Immediately following His baptism by John the Baptist, Jesus withdraws for prayer and reflection and it is in this context that he repels the temptations of the devil (*Matthew 4:1-11*). After sending his disciples out on a preaching and healing mission, he invites them to withdraw for prayer and reflection in a deserted place (*Mark 6:31*). The saints and mystics continued this tradition throughout the two millennia of Christianity and today, wise Christians do the same. The need for renewal is crucial for the healthy spiritual life. Yet it seems too few take advantage of it.

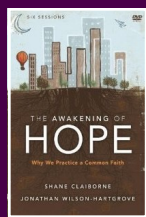
Certainly there is the business of modern life and the cacophony of constant voices: from communication devices like phones, radio, tv, and so much more—for me sometimes this constant experiences is like background static. There never seems to be a shortage of things to do, from the mundane tasks of maintaining a home to the many good books waiting on my nightstand—plus the many places to go and people to see. I suspect that I am by no means unique in this. To be sure, it is a blessing to have so many things available to entertain and delight. But sometimes the busyness can distract us from God.

Deserted places, (whether a monastery, a state park or even a place in our home away from distraction) are not just a location, but also a time and a mindset. Deserted places are uncluttered with tasks to do—they are a time to just be. Deserted places are an opportunity to withdraw from the regular pace of life and move from our time to God's time. A time without a full agenda in which we say, "Speak Lord for your servant listens." This is the beginning of renewal. This is the space where the still small voice of the Holy can be heard above all other voices. This is nothing short of quality time with God.

As we prepare to move from one season to the next, I pray you can find some time for renewal—to revive the joy and fulfillment of your faith in Jesus Christ. As always, all the clergy and I stand ready to help you along that path—it can be a retreat, it could be a good couple of hours walking in a lush park, it could be musical in nature or something else entirely. I hope you find a time and place to spend some quality time with God because I know God wants to spend some quality time with you.

Please keep me in your prayers and know that you are daily in mine. Faithfully, *Jeffrey+*

WHAT THE RECTOR IS READING



The Awakening of Hope: Why we practice a common faith by Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove and Shane Claiborne. From the book jacket “A revival is stirring in North America by people who've surrendered their whole lives to the Spirit, Christians committed to transforming themselves and the world around them. This movement marks a shift in the way people are engaging faith. This new generation doesn't think from belief to action but rather from action to reflection on beliefs, tending to care more about what faith does than what it tells us to believe.” This book offers an examination of some of the traditional spiritual practices of Christianity and how they are relevant and renewing for today.

VESTRY MINUTES

Art Show

- ECW luncheon totals were \$4,328.34 and the show raised \$20,117.24.
- Stuart made a motion to distribute funds to Cape Henlopen Food Basket, Community Resource Center, Primeros Pasos, LaCasita, Away Home, Crisis House, Gull House and Meals on Wheels. Terry seconded and all present agreed.
- Need leadership for next year. Julie Emery will stay for 2 more years. Planning starts in December.

Administration

- Thank you notes have been sent to Maureen Sutton for the flowers on the patio, Marj Lewis for her work with the Altar Guild and Julie Emery for all her work on the Art Show.
- Have talked to Roberta Lindsay about giving gift cards to charities.
- When reading announcements, please check to make sure you are not repeating ones already in the bulletin.
- Goals and Tasks for 2012-2017 were emailed to Vestry members.
- M.J. Hughes was introduced. She is interested in becoming a vestry member.

Property

- Parish Hall/Church HVAC replacement: most of the work has been completed. Remaining is insulation in the church ceiling and of a dehumidifier in the parish hall step-up room. Fr. Jeff and Stuart held a walk-through with Atlantic Refrigeration, President Dave Jones. Some further improvements will be made, e.g. temperature sensors to be installed in the parish hall and a new thermostat in the church.
- St. Peter's Square wall: initial steps to repair, restore and preserve the wall along Market and Third Streets continue. It is hoped that Gary Gredell will brief prospective contractors in late August and that we will receive three four bids to consider post Labor Day. We continue to aim for a mid-September start. The Vestry's final approval will be sought before the restoration project is launched.
- Organ Loft & Electrical Work: Shore Electric has made all repairs and improvements in the sanctuary and sacristy areas, including improved lighting. Starting August 6 JGM & Associates Painting will make minor repairs in the wall and will repaint the loft the same color as the current paint. JGM will also repaint the chancel area above the wainscot. Lamb Studios will reinstall the stained glass window starting August 13.
- Parish Hall patio & walk, new ramp, rectory patio: Mike Lee (Moonlight Masonry) has completed all masonry repairs, including restoration of the foundation for the Marshall monument. He also installed a new parish hall entrance ramp to make it more easily accessible and ADA compliant.
- Working on getting the two oil tanks removed.
- The Lebanon cedar tree next to the Ryves Holt House is “ill”. Needs to come down. Helen Waite has brought an arborist in to examine it. Will cost around \$3,000 to have it taken down. Have a play set in the back yard of the Rectory that can be moved over for the children to play on with a sign saying “to play at your own risk”. The tree leaning over the patio area will also eventually taken down and replaced with an elm for a cost of around \$800. After much discussion, Karen will check into having the cedar tree wood donated to artist for their projects and Jeff will get another arborist to look at the tree.

We meet every Tuesday at 7:00 pm in the Church. We learn the discipline of centering prayer and read Thomas Keating's *Open Mind Open Heart*. Previous experience is not necessary—only the desire to experience the presence of God in our lives.

Local Outreach

- The Speer Foundation grant that will allow St. Peter's to sponsor a family with their matching funds has been implemented. St. Peter's Outreach has the \$2,100 as well as the volunteer mentors from our parish to support a family through this program.
- Habitat house will be dedicated on August 11th at 10 a.m. We are invited to attend the ceremony.

ECW

- The Art Show lunch and raffle were a success. Proceeds will be used for local charities and the adopted child attending Centro Infantil in San Miguel.
- Ladies Night Out took a break during the summer and will resume again in September. This social event is a popular event among the women of St. Peter's.
- The second quarterly meeting for Mission and Outreach was well attended. Representatives from many St. Peter's Committees gave information on their background and current achievements. Father Mark summed it up in an email: *Friends: Thanks to all who came to the Second Quarterly Meeting on Outreach and Mission. It was a fine evening of sharing and thinking and praying forward for outreach and mission. Those who couldn't come were missed. Those who came brought good news of all the work we do in Christ's name in this place and around the world. Our outreach and mission activities shape this parish in ways we don't often realize. The church that is always opening out and engaged with the world will grow from strength to strength. When we think of what mission and outreach is good for, it is good for us all – receivers and givers alike (hat tip to Sheila Bravo). I am proud to be counted among you, the ministers of the Good News of God's love. Mark*

- Road Map was presented and will be discussed in September.

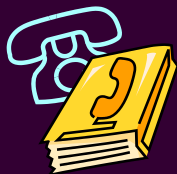
Rector's Report

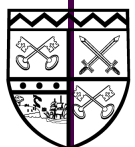
CHURCH DIRECTORY

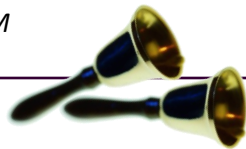

WAM THIS FALL

Dear Friends,

As Fr. Jeff and I plan the 2012-13 program year and schedule of services, I would like to discuss with you the future of WAM as a liturgical music ensemble in our parish. Since its founding, WAM's mission has been a response to a need to engage youth in our parish that were interested in a particular genre of contemporary music, especially wishing an alternative to the Young Life ministry. With the help of adult volunteers, WAM indeed provided a safe and nurturing environment for that particular group of young people and has served the parish well.

Over the past several months it has become evident that the initiating circumstances and population WAM once served has changed. As happens regularly in parish life, we experience population "bubbles", that is to say a group that was once served by a particular ministry has moved on and is no longer among us. Such moments give us time to pause and consider the current situation, our motives, and ability of our music program offerings to best serve the parish's spiritual and liturgical needs. As true servant-ministers, we are called to consider and give priority to that which best serves the common good, not solely our personal desires. *(continued on next page)*

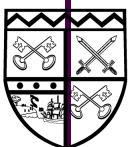

Join our Adult Choir in a short contemplative service of evening worship on the first Thursday of the month at 8:30 PM. Compline is the last service of the Daily Office typically celebrated by religious orders. Compline consists of psalms, short passages from scripture, an office hymn, a canticle (Nunc Dimittis), a litany, collects and additional prayers; all sung to plainsong chant. In keeping with the earliest practices of the monastic communities, Compline is offered when the work of the day is completed, and the quietness of evening settles over the hearts and minds of those who have come together in thankfulness for the blessings of the day which has passed and in anticipation of God's gift of a new day. The service lasts approximately 20 minutes and will be sung by the Choir of St. Peter's. Please join us for this peaceful and meditative liturgy.

(WAM This Fall continued)

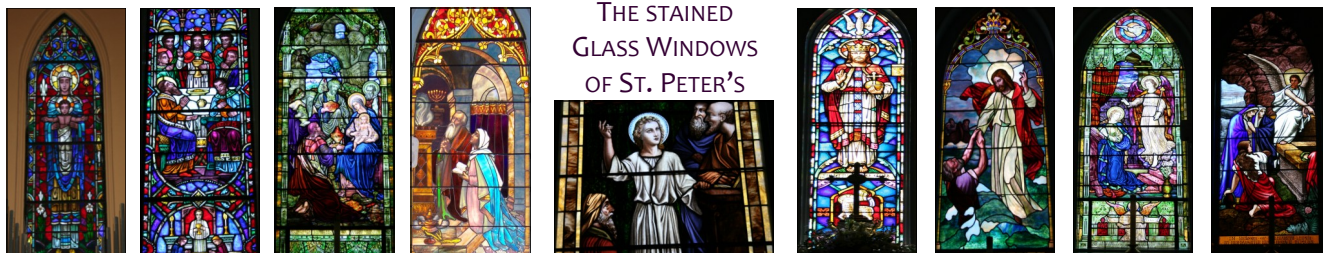
Following conversations with each current member of WAM and in consultation with Fr. Jeff, we believe the time has come to suspend WAM as an ongoing liturgical music ensemble. It is important to know that the discontinuation of WAM does not represent a shift away from the wonderfully eclectic styles of music which are a hallmark of our parish's liturgies. We will continue our commitment to quality music which is sing-able by the congregation, liturgically appropriate, and rendered to the best of our ability. As a result of the parish-wide worship survey taken earlier this year, a team has been assembled to explore the possibility of a concurrent alternative liturgy on Sundays at 10:00 AM in the Parish Hall. It is our hope that those musicians feeling called to provide music for this type of liturgy will become part of the planning process. In addition, some of the members of WAM are talking about forming a new group—if you are interested, please speak to Richard Jundt or myself.

I would like to personally thank all current and past members of WAM for helping this ministry to flourish and serve the youth of St. Peter's. 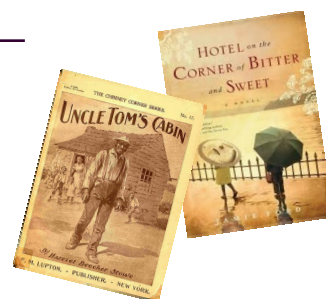

SPY Mission Trip to Mexico

Sixteen St. Peter's parishioners joined four young people from San Miguel to become the first SPY Mexican Mission Team. The young people and their sponsors spent their week leading a summer camp for the students at Centro Infantil San Pablo, a free preschool for children from low income families. Assisted by the youth, Teresa Caruso and Jean Reale performed health screenings on the students and also did blood pressure and blood sugar testing on family members of the students. The team also worked on mattress's for mattress project at our companion parish of St. Paul's. In addition to working with the students at CISP the missionaries learned about additional non-profits working in San Miguel, including a new school for the deaf opening this fall, a computer program for youth, and a feeding program for children. The team enjoyed all that San Miguel had to offer, from lots of terrific local food, to the artisans market, the beautiful Parroquia and Jardin in the center of town, a soccer match with a local team and a magnificent horseback riding adventure in the mountains above San Miguel. Many thanks to those who helped support our mission, for without them this trip could not have happened; Roberta & Oscar Rambeau, Adrian Ross, Patricia & Leonardo Palacios of San Miguel, Tony & Darlene Marinello, Susan Robinson & Doug Craig, The Welch Clan, Karen Kohn, Nathalie Willard, Sandy White. 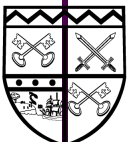

As summer draws to a close here in Lewes and locals can once again start moving with a certain level of ease, we'd like to take this opportunity to return to the topic of St. Peter's investments. You may recall from our June article that the Primary Investment Account is the "set of funds which have been invested in the U.S. financial system via corporate bond and stock market purchases." This account, along with five others, is managed on behalf of the parish by an investment professional at LPL Financial and overseen by the parish's Financial Advisory Committee (FAC) according to a long-standing investment policy designed to grow the investments with minimum risk to the principal in the accounts.

"Being the richest man in the cemetery doesn't matter to me. Going to bed at night saying we've done something wonderful, that's what matters to me."

In the course of managing its income, St. Peter's Church manages a number of necessary distinctions between the revenue streams: unrestricted funds and restricted funds, the latter subdivided into temporary restricted and permanently restricted. As the name implies, unrestricted funds comprise income whose usage is not limited to a specific purpose in the financial processes of the church. These funds include pledges, loose collection, and contributions. These funds are the bulk of the revenue support in our church budget. In contrast, the funds in the six investment accounts are considered restricted funds. They have been set aside to support a specific purpose or ministry in the parish. In the case of the Primary Investment Account, the restriction indicates that to the extent possible, the church budget should only draw interest income from the Primary Investment Account, leaving the principal untouched. Similarly, the FAC oversees an investment account for maintenance of the Church Yard—which is "St. Peter's Square", the graveyard and grounds around the church and parish hall in downtown Lewes—as well as a separate account for the maintenance of the Pilottown Cemetery. Additional restricted accounts include the Family Ministry Account and the Taste of the Fruit of the Vine account.

While the Primary, Church Yard, and Pilottown accounts are "permanently restricted"—their structure includes a principal amount and the ideal intention that interest income will suffice to fund maintenance activities—the Family Ministry and Fruit of the Vine accounts are "temporarily restricted". The Family Ministry Account supplies funds to the annual budget to compensate for the expenses incurred over the year to support the Family Ministry Coordinator. Unless additional funds are "earmarked" to support the Family Ministry Program, this account will be closed at the end of 2013 and support of the Family Ministry Program will need to be incorporated into the general church budget. In contrast, the Fruit of the Vine account gathers income from the annual fundraiser of the same name. These funds are earmarked to offset the annual expenses of our local outreach program. The investment account was established in part to allow contributors to donate stocks and other existing investment vehicles to the St. Peter's Church in lieu of cash contributions.

Apart from these "large" restricted funds, St. Peter's also maintains a handful of "small" restricted funds, including an Organ Fund (originally created to renovate the organ during George Bayley's tenure) and the Major Renovations fund (consisting of interest income from a family bequest managed by Mellon Bank and designated to support significant property maintenance projects at the church and parish hall). Temporarily restricted funds look quite similar to these smaller permanently restricted funds, but their "timeline" is significantly smaller. These accounts are often called "flow-through" accounts because they accrue revenue for a specific, short-term event—for example, the SPY Mission Trip to Mexico—and their proceeds offset the expenses for those events. Unused funds from these accounts are either incorporated into the general budget after all expenses have been paid or retained in the account to contribute to a succeeding event (for example, the next SPY mission trip).

In the end, the structure of these restricted and unrestricted revenue streams allows the leadership of St. Peter's Church to remain faithful to the desires of the faith community, preserving the wishes and motivations of the contributors of that community. While the leadership appreciates the financial management flexibility afforded by unrestricted contributions and pledges, we are also faithful stewards of the dreams and aspirations embodied in contributions, gifts, and bequests designated by the giver to support specific areas of our parish life (e.g., the music program, the church yard, the Family Ministry Program). We also appreciate the faith you place in us and our financial management capabilities when you make your contributions.

OUR LITTLE CORNER OF GOD'S WORLD

My goodness .. here it is September already and I have to wonder if summer goes faster than it used to or if it only seems that way because I go slower with each passing year. Regardless of which it is I usually feel a bit sad to realize that before long the first official day of fall (September 22nd) will be here and my favorite season will be over.

Of course I'm sure there are many folks who are happy to see Labor Day arrive because it means that summer "visitors" will be leaving, kids will be returning to school, parking meters will no longer need to be "fed" and it might even be safe to venture out onto Rt. 1 on the weekends. But, along with all these good seasonal changes there comes an addition that I find extremely annoying and unwelcome.

Normally, I'm not an inhospitable person. I enjoy having visitors and guest .. even those who stop by or drop in unexpectedly. I do, however, draw the line at the arrival of the *Drosophila Melanogaster*s who seem to think that my casa is their casa....WRONG! Not only do they show up individually, but, once here they see to it that numerous relatives and offspring also take up residence in our house. In the past, I suffered (NOT in silence) their presence until I learned of an easy and efficient way to terminate their stay here. I simply offer them a special "cocktail" and in a very short time they're gone.

Okay....have I piqued your curiosity yet? If so, I'll get to the subject of this article without further delay.

EASY FRUIT FLY TRAP:

- 1) Put apple cider vinegar in a container
- 2) Add a few drops of dish washing detergent.
- 3) Place the container(s) on counter tops, windowsills or wherever you notice the flies "hanging out."

In no time at all you should have a fruit fly free environment. Also, regular cleanings of the dishwasher trap and garbage disposal help to eliminate other favorite breeding grounds of DMs/fruit flies.)

I'm assuming many of you also have visits from the *Drosophila Melanogaster*s (more commonly known as **fruit flies**) once air conditioners are turned off and we enjoy fresh air flowing in through screened windows as well as the last of summer's harvest. However, a more common way for the flies to get into our homes is as passengers (in the form of eggs) on fresh fruit. If the fruit becomes overly ripe it begins to ferment, producing yeast and an alcohol rich "sludge" that the eggs (now turned to larvae) feast upon. This goes on for 5 or 6 days, then the little devils crawl out of the "sludge" and hatch into flies and the entire cycle starts over again. *(The preceding was a condensed version of the whole process. There is plenty of information on fruit flies on the internet should you need/want to know more.)*

My "cyber-search" also listed several sites that offered various methods of eliminating fruit flies once they've moved in and taken over. My favorite (probably because it's so easy to make and maintain) is the "cocktail" I referred to above. The only items needed are apple cider vinegar, dish detergent and a small container. (I use plastic caps since they're the right size to place on my narrow kitchen windowsills and I usually replenish the liquid every other day or so. I would think, though, that a larger container doesn't need as much attention.)

Don't worry about the accumulation of dead critters deterring other flies from entering the trap -- apparently they don't have very large brains so they don't realize they're about to meet their demise when they head for what appears to be a treat. Not only is this a "no brainer" way of dealing with the "DMs" but by using this method to remove these pests from my environment I'm not adding any harmful chemicals (like those found in commercial pesticides, traps, etc.) to my little corner of God's world. And, really, shouldn't we all strive to treat this wonderful world .. God's gift to us .. as gently as possible?

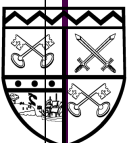

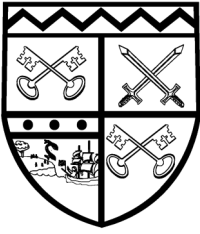
