Set us free from a past that we cannot change;


open to us a future in which we can be changed;

Questions for Reflection (from the Bible Study Guide)

The actions of Cain we understand. Under the same circumstances, we probably would have the urge to act as Cain did. But God acts in unexpected ways with Cain. How does God respond to Cain in this story? What does this story affirm about God and God's dealings with humanity?

In part, this is a story about anger vented in violence. This unit states that “anger is always a cover for fear.” Think of times when you get angry. What is the fear behind that anger? What are constructive ways to react to anger?

Both this unit and the previous unit (about Adam, Eve, and the garden) present stories in which the human participants make hard choices with dire consequences. What are some other similarities between the two stories, both on the part of the human participants and of God's reactions to them?

This unit includes the statement: “How God relates to the brother or sister, to other workers or worshipers, is not our concern.” If that is so, what *is* our concern?
